Church-Rosser Properties of Normal Rewriting

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Goal

An abstract rewriting framework that

- captures the main existing forms of rewriting
- provides with a notion of critical pair
- yields a Church-Rosser result in the terminating case ...
- that captures the existing Church-Rosser results for (first/higher)-order rewriting
- provides flexibility in the higher-order case

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Rewriting by examples – Plain

$$(x+y)^{-1} \rightarrow y^{-1} + x^{-1}$$

 $x+0 \rightarrow x$
 $(x+y)+z \rightarrow x+(y+z)$

Plain rewriting:

$$(1+2)^{-1} + 0 \rightarrow (2^{-1} + 1^{-1}) + 0 \rightarrow 2^{-1} + (1^{-1} + 0) \rightarrow 2^{-1} + 1^{-1}$$

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Rewriting by examples – Modulo

$$(x+y)^{-1} \rightarrow y^{-1} + x^{-1}$$

$$0+x \rightarrow x$$

$$(x+y)+z = x+(y+z)$$

$$x+y = y+x$$

Rewriting modulo:

$$(1+2)^{-1} + 0 \rightarrow (2^{-1} + 1^{-1}) + 0 \rightarrow 2^{-1} + 1^{-1}$$

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Rewriting by examples – Normal

$$(x + y)^{-1} \rightarrow y^{-1} + x^{-1}$$

$$0 + x \rightarrow x$$

$$(x + y) + z = x + (y + z)$$

$$x + y = y + x$$

$$0 + x = x$$

Normal rewriting:

$$(1+2)^{-1} + 0 \rightarrow (1+2)^{-1} \rightarrow 2^{-1} + 1^{-1}$$

[Barendregt and Klop]:

$$\omega 1 = (\lambda x.(x \ x)) \ \lambda s.\lambda z.(s \ z)$$

$$\longrightarrow (\lambda s.\lambda z.(s \ z) \ \lambda s.\lambda z.(s \ z))$$

$$\longrightarrow \lambda z.(\lambda s.\lambda z.(s \ z) \ z)$$

$$\longrightarrow \lambda z.\lambda z.(z \ z) - wrong$$

$$\stackrel{(\geq 1)^{*}}{\underset{\beta}{\longrightarrow}} \lambda Z.(\lambda S'.\lambda Z'.(S' Z') Z)$$

 β -reduction is modulo α -conversion

[Barendregt and Klop]:

$$\omega \mathbf{1} = (\lambda x.(x x)) \lambda s.\lambda z.(s z)$$

$$\longrightarrow (\lambda s.\lambda z.(s z) \lambda s.\lambda z.(s z))$$

$$\longrightarrow \lambda z.(\lambda s.\lambda z.(s z) z)$$

$$\longrightarrow \lambda z.\lambda z.(z z) - wrong$$

$$\stackrel{(\geq 1)^{*}}{\underset{\alpha}{\longrightarrow}} \frac{\lambda Z.(\lambda S'.\lambda Z'.(S' Z') Z)}{\lambda Z.\lambda Z'.(Z Z')}$$

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 β -reduction is modulo α -conversion

Rewriting with recursors in Coq

$$\begin{array}{rcl} \textit{rec}(0, u, f) & \rightarrow & u \\ \textit{rec}(s(y), u, f) & \rightarrow & @(f, y, \textit{rec}(y, u, f)) \\ @(\lambda z. u, v) & \rightarrow & u\{z \mapsto v\} \end{array}$$

rewrite:

$$egin{aligned} &\textit{rec}(s(0),1,\lambda xy.+(x,y))
ightarrow \ &\mathbb{Q}(\lambda xy.+(x,y),0,\textit{rec}(0,1,\lambda xy.+(x,y)))
ightarrow \ &\mathbb{Q}(\lambda xy.+(x,y),0,1)
ightarrow +(0,1)
ightarrow 1 \end{aligned}$$

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Mix of plain rewriting for recursors and rewriting modulo for binders

Higher-order rewriting [Nipkow]

rules (differentiation):

$$diff(\lambda x.sin(f(x))) \rightarrow \lambda x.cos(f(x)) * diff(f)$$

$$diff(\lambda x.x) \rightarrow \lambda x.1$$

rewrite:

 $diff(\lambda x.sin(x)) \stackrel{\stackrel{1\cdot1\cdot1}{\beta}}{\longrightarrow} diff(\lambda x.sin(\lambda y.y x)) \longrightarrow \\ \lambda x.cos(\lambda y.y x) * diff(\lambda y.y) \\ \longrightarrow \lambda x.cos(x) * diff(\lambda y.y) \\ \longrightarrow \lambda x.cos(x) * \lambda x.1 \\ \longrightarrow \lambda x.cos(x)$

Higher-order rewriting is nothing but normal rewriting modulo alpha, beta and eta.

- is my rewriting calculus terminating ?
- is my rewriting calculus confluent ?

We focus on:

- Confluence assuming termination
- General abstract results
- Application to first-order rewriting
- Application to higher-order rewriting
- A treatment of binders as a particular case
- Flexibility of higher-order definitions

Main definitions/result for abstract plain rewriting

Conversion:
$$u \stackrel{*}{\longleftrightarrow} v$$

Local peak:
$$u \leftarrow s \rightarrow v$$

Joinability:
$$u \xrightarrow{*} t \xleftarrow{*} v$$

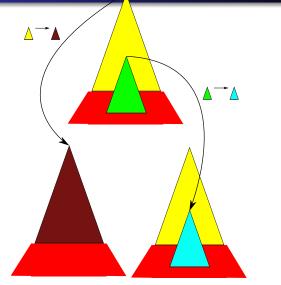
Church-Rosser:

convertible pairs are joinable.

Newmann:

Assume plain rewriting terminates. Then it is Church-Rosser iff local peaks are joinable.

Main definition/result for concrete first-order rewriting



Knuth-Bendix: joinability of critical peaks is just enough for terminating plain rewriting

- To AC-rewriting: [Peterson & Stickel]
- To rewriting modulo: [Jouannaud & Kirchner]

- To higher-order rewriting: [Nipkow & Mayr]
- etc ...

Normal rewriting with (R,S,E)

Definition:
$$s \xrightarrow[R\downarrow_{S_E}]{} t$$
 iff $s = s\downarrow_{S_E} \xrightarrow[R]{} u \xrightarrow[S_E]{} u\downarrow_{S_E} = t$

General Assumptions

- (a) S is Church-Rosser modulo E
- (b) $R_{SE} \cup S_E$ is *E*-terminating,
- (c) Rules in *R* are *S_E*-normalized,
- (d) Equations in *E* are regular.

For Nipkow's higher-order rewriting:

- *E* is α -conversion
- *S* is made of β -reduction and η -expansion
- *R* is made of rules $I \rightarrow r$ such that *I* and *r* have
- the same base type and / is a pattern [Miller].

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Main property expected from normal rewriting

Joinability:
$$t_1 \xrightarrow{!} \overset{*}{\underset{S_E}{\longrightarrow}} \overset{*}{\underset{R\downarrow_{S_E}}{\longrightarrow}} u \xleftarrow{*}{\underset{E}{\longrightarrow}} v \xleftarrow{*}{\underset{R\downarrow_{S_E}}{\longleftarrow}} \overset{!}{\underset{S_E}{\longleftarrow}} t_2$$

Church-Rosser: every conversion is joinable.

Theorem

Let (R, S, E) satisfy (a,b,c,d), and critical cases be joinable. Then normal rewriting is CR.

Further requirements:

- First and higher-order rewriting as instances;
- A proof independent from any term structure.

an abstract set of terms \mathcal{T} an abstract set of positions \mathcal{P} equiped with a partial order $>_{\mathcal{P}}$ and a minimum $_{\Lambda}$

A domain is any downward closed set of positions P_p with minimum p

Rewrite relations become ternary:

Positional rewriting modulo

Rewriting with *R* modulo *E* at *p*

$$\xrightarrow{p} := \overset{(\geq_{\mathcal{P}} p)^*}{\underset{E}{\leftarrow}} \xrightarrow{p}$$

Disjoint redexes axiom

$$\langle \frac{p}{X} \xrightarrow{q} Q \subseteq \frac{p}{Y} \langle \frac{q}{X}$$
 if $p \# q$

Ancestor redex axiom

$$\underset{X}{\overset{P_{\rho}}{\leftarrow}} \xrightarrow{q}{\overset{Q}{\rightarrow}} \subseteq \underset{Y}{\overset{(>_{\mathcal{P}}\mathcal{P})^{*}}{\leftarrow}} \underset{X}{\overset{q}{\leftarrow}} \underset{Y}{\overset{(>_{\mathcal{P}}\mathcal{P}_{\rho})^{*}}{\leftarrow}} \text{ if } q >_{\mathcal{P}} P_{\rho}$$

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where X, Y are arbitrary rewriting relations.

Normal rewriting terms in $\downarrow_{S_{\mathcal{F}}}^{p}$ normal form at q below p:

$$s \xrightarrow{p}_{R_{S_{F}\downarrow}} t := s \xrightarrow{q \ge \mathcal{P}^{p}}_{R_{SE}} u \downarrow_{S_{E}}^{p} t$$

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Critical patterns for abstract normal rewriting

Critical local rewrite peak: $v \xleftarrow{P_p}{R} u \xrightarrow{q}{R_{SE}} w$ s.t. $q \in P_p$ and $u = u \downarrow_{S_E}^p$

Critical local simplification peaks:

$$v \stackrel{P_p}{\longleftrightarrow} u \stackrel{q}{\underset{S_E}{\longrightarrow}} w \quad \text{s.t.} \quad q \in P_p$$

Critical local cliffs: $s \xleftarrow{P_{p}}{E} u \xrightarrow{q}{R_{SE}} t$ s.t. $q \in P_{p} \setminus \{p\}$

Critical local simplification cliffs:

$$v \xleftarrow{P_p}{S} u \xrightarrow{q}_{R_{SE}} w$$
 s.t. $q \in P_p \setminus \{p\}$ and $u = u \downarrow_{S_E}^q$

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Applications

- Plain first-order rewriting
- First-order rewriting modulo
- First-order normal rewriting new
- Plain higher-order rewriting (modulo α)
- Solution Higher-order rewriting (modulo $\alpha\beta\eta$) in λ^{\rightarrow} :
 - with $\beta\eta^{-1}$ at base types
 - with $\beta\eta^{-1}$ at arbitrary arrow types (may need β -extensions) – new - with $\beta\eta$ at arbitrary arrow types (may need extensions) – new
- HOR with AC-operators (modulo ACαβη)
 to be carried out

Conclusion

A clean, flexible framework for normal rewriting obtained via a novel abstract notion of positional rewriting.

> Further work: formalization in Coq extension to CIC

Current limitation: applies to tree rewriting

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
