

PROOF OF LEMMA 1 OF THE PAPER THE GEOMETRY OF SOUND-SOURCE LOCALIZATION USING NON-COPLANAR MICROPHONE ARRAYS

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In this annex we present the formal proof of the lemma 1 ennounced in the paper.

1. INTRODUCTION

We first recall the assumptions on the propagation model. The sound wave is emitted at S and is assumed to travel through the direct-path at a constant speed until the M microphones, placed at $\{M_1,\ldots,M_M\}=\mathfrak{M}$. Hence, the time of arrival is $t_m=\|S-M_m\|/\nu$, where ν is the sound speed and $\|\cdot\|$ is the Euclidean norm. Consequently the time difference of arrival or time delay between the m^{th} and the n^{th} microphones is:

$$t_{m,n}(S) = t_n - t_m = \frac{\|S - M_n\| - \|S - M_m\|}{\nu}.$$

2. PROOF OF LEMMA 1

Lemma 1 The set of sound-source locations $S \in \mathbb{R}^N$ satisfying $t_{m,n}(S) = \hat{t}_{m,n}$ is:

- (i). empty if $|\hat{t}_{m,n}| > t_{m,n}^*$, where $t_{m,n}^* = \|\mathbf{M}_m \mathbf{M}_n\|/\nu$,
- (ii). the half line $m{L}_{m,n}^{MX}$ (or $m{L}_{m,n}^{MIN}$), if $\hat{t}_{m,n}=t_{m,n}^*$ (or if $\hat{t}_{m,n}=-t_{m,n}^*$), where $m{L}_{m,n}^{MX}=\{m{H}_{m,n}+\mum{V}_{m,n}\},\ m{L}_{m,n}^{MIN}=\{m{H}_{m,n}-\mum{V}_{m,n}\},\ \mu\geq 1/2,\ m{H}_{m,n}=(m{M}_m+m{M}_n)/2$ and $m{V}_{m,n}=m{M}_m-m{M}_n$,
- (iii). the hyperplane passing by ${m H}_{m,n}$ perpendicular to ${m V}_{m,n}$, if $\hat{t}_{m,n}=0$ or
- (iv). one sheet of a two-sheet hyperboloid with foci M_m and M_n for other values of $\hat{t}_{m,n}$.

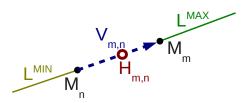


Figure 1: Geometry associated with the two microphone case, located at \boldsymbol{M}_m and \boldsymbol{M}_n (see Lemma 1). $H_{m,n}$ is the mid-point of the the microphones (in red) and $V_{m,n}$ the vector $\boldsymbol{M}_m - \boldsymbol{M}_n$ (in dashed-blue). $L_{m,n}^{\text{MAX}}$ and $L_{m,n}^{\text{MIN}}$ are the two half lines represented in green and yellow respectively.

Proof: It is easy to see $-t_{m,n}^* \leq t_{m,n}(S) \leq t_{m,n}^*$, $\forall S \in \mathbb{R}^N$, which proves (i). (ii) is proven by rewriting $S = H_{m,n} + \mu_1 V_{m,n} + \sum_{k=2}^N \mu_k W_k$, where $(V_{m,n}, W_2, \ldots, W_N)$ is an orthogonal basis of \mathbb{R}^N , and deriving with respect to the μ_i 's. In order to prove (iii) and (iv) and without loss of generality, we can assume $M_m = e_1$, $M_n = -e_1$ and $\nu = 1$. Equation (1) rewrites:

$$(\hat{t}_{m,n})^2 + 4x_1 = -2\hat{t}_{m,n} \left((x_1+1)^2 + \sum_{k=2}^N x_k^2 \right)^{\frac{1}{2}},$$

where $(x_1, \ldots, x_N)^T$ are the coordinates of S. By squaring the previous equation we obtain:

$$a(4-a) + 4a \sum_{k=2}^{N} x_k^2 - 4(4-a)x_1^2 = 0,$$
 (3)

where $a = (\hat{t}_{m,n})^2$. Notice that if $\hat{t}_{m,n} = 0$ we get $x_1 = 0$, which corresponds to the satement in (iii). For the rest of values of a, that is $0 < a < (t_{m,n}^*)^2 = 4$, equation (3) represents a two-sheet hyperboloid, since all coefficients are strictly positive except the one of x_1^2 . Because 0 < a < 4, we can rewrite (3) as:

$$x_1^2 = \frac{a(4-a) + 4a\sum_{k=2}^N x_k^2}{4(4-a)}. (4)$$

We observe that the set of solutions of (3) can be split into two subsets $\mathcal{S}_{m,n}^+$ and $\mathcal{S}_{m,n}^-$ parametrized by (x_2,\ldots,x_N) , corresponding to the two solutions for x_1 of equation (4). These two sets are the two sheets of the hyperboloid defined in (3). Moreover, one can easily verify that $t_{m,n}\left(\mathcal{S}_{m,n}^+\right) = -t_{m,n}\left(\mathcal{S}_{m,n}^-\right)$, so either $t_{m,n}\left(\mathcal{S}_{m,n}^+\right) = \hat{t}_{m,n}$ or $t_{m,n}\left(\mathcal{S}_{m,n}^-\right) = \hat{t}_{m,n}$, but not both. Hence the set of points S satisfying $t_{m,n}(S) = \hat{t}_{m,n}$ is either $\mathcal{S}_{m,n}^+$ or $\mathcal{S}_{m,n}^-$, so one sheet of a two-sheet hyperboloid. \square
