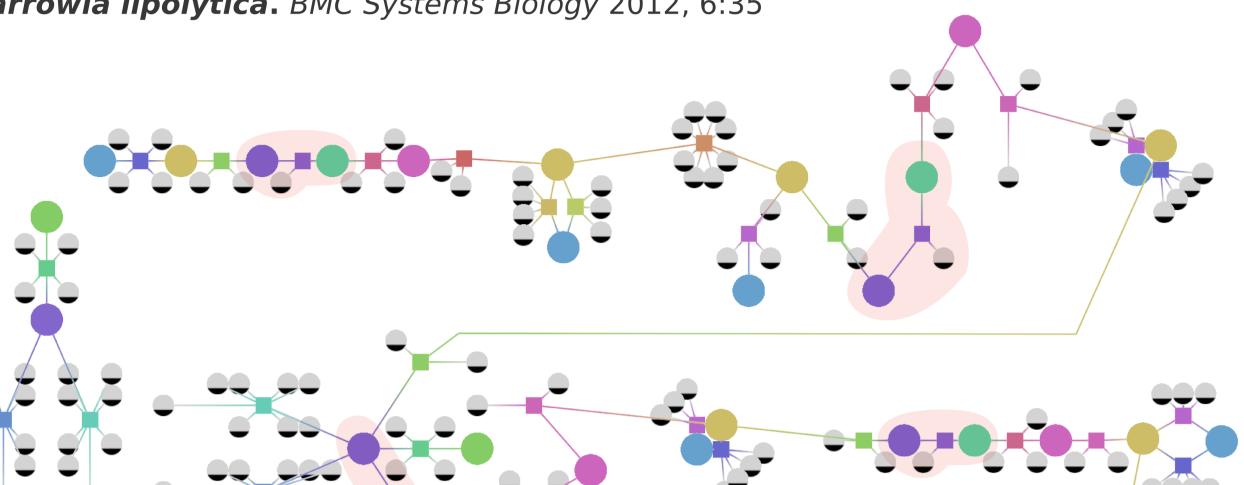

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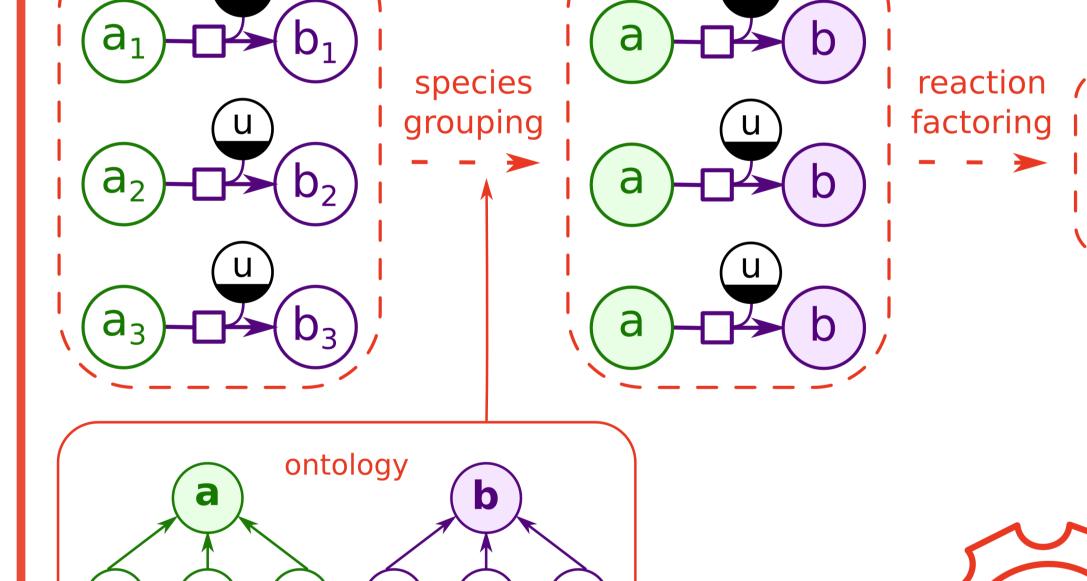

Metabolic network generalization method

The generalization method groups chemical species present in the network into semantically equivalent classes, based on their hierarchical relationships in the ChEBI ontology, and merges them into a generalized chemical species. For instance, (S)-3-hydroxydecanoyl-CoA, (S)-3-hydroxyhexacosanoyl-CoA and (S)-3-hydroxylauroyl-CoA

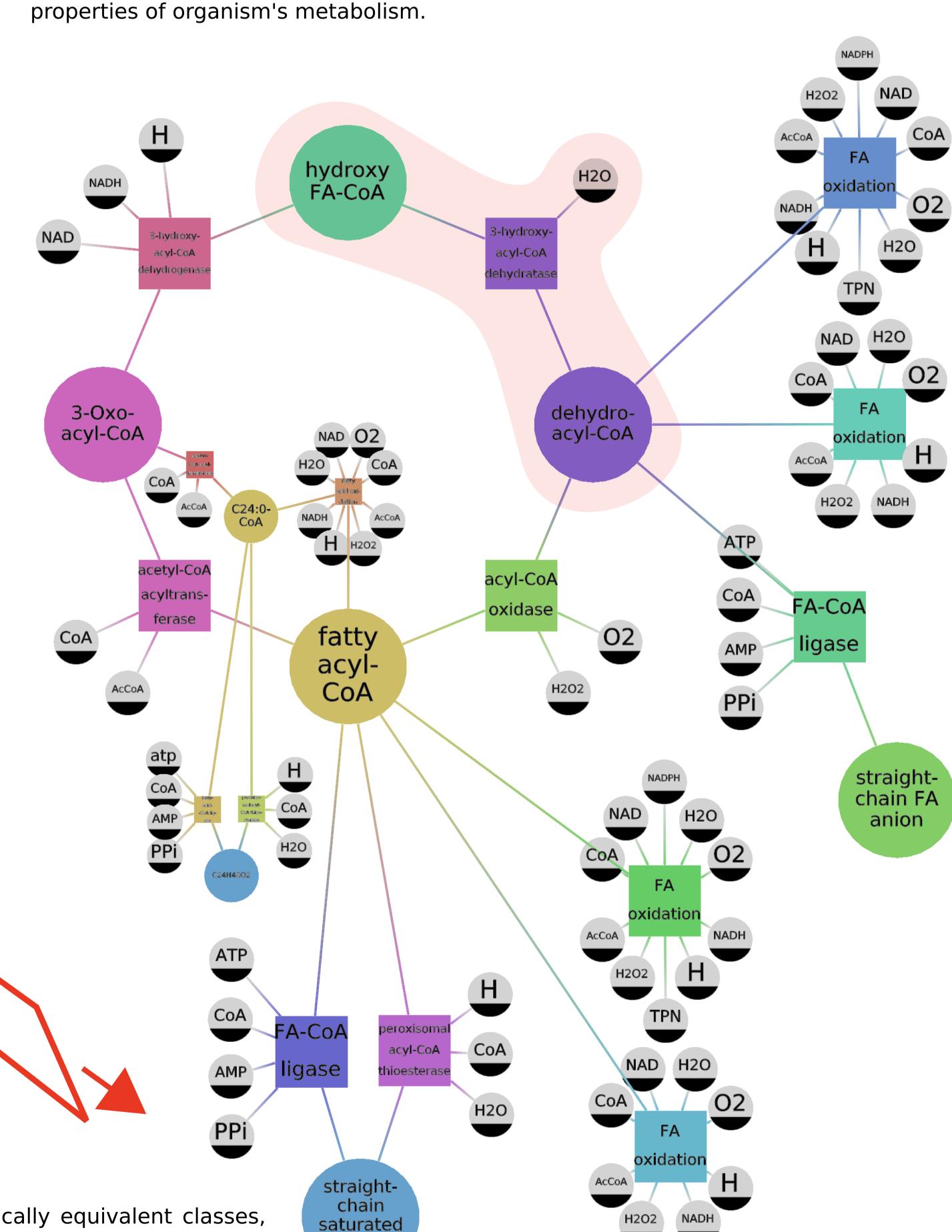
After the species generalization, reactions that share the same generalized reactants and the same generalized products, are factored together into a generalized reaction.

Generalization of the Yarrowia lypolitica fatty acid oxidation network

The generalized network (in the center) describes the β-oxidation of fatty acids pathway, happening inside the peroxime compartment of the yeast Yarrowia lypolitica, in a more generic way: Fatty acyl-CoA (yellow) is transformed into dehydroacyl-CoA (violet), then into hydroxyacy fatty acyl-CoA (green), 3-ketoacyl-CoA (magenta), and back to fatty acyl-CoA (with a shorter carbon chain). The initial network (top left) describes the same process in more details, specifying those reactions for each of the fatty acyl-CoA species present in the organisms' cell (e.g. decanoyl-CoA, dodecanoyl-CoA, etc.).

The more precise network is needed for simulation, while the more general one is clearer to a human, and reveals the main properties of organism's metabolism.



Generalized network comparison

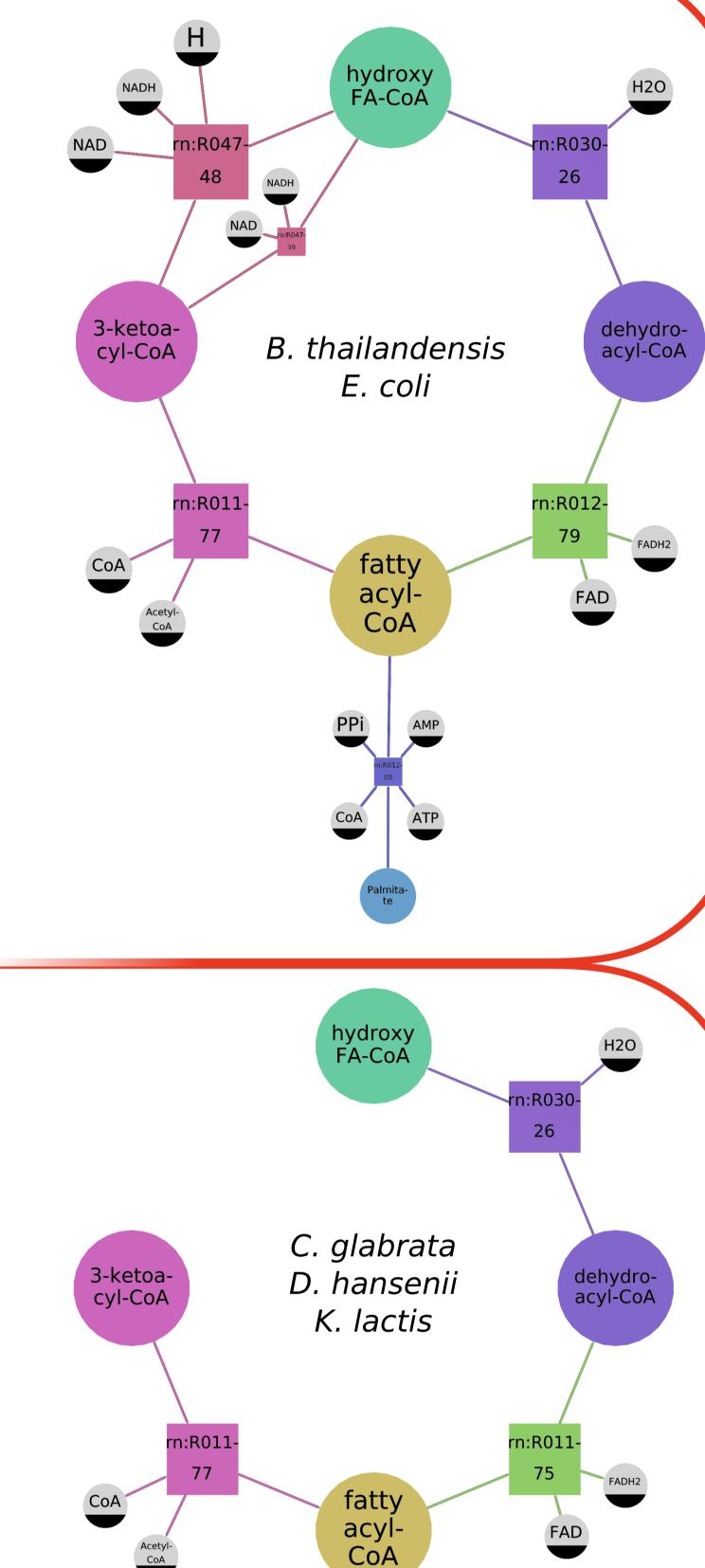
Along with β -oxidation of fatty acids of Yarrowia lypolitica, we have generalized (on theright) this pathway for several glabrata (BMID45737), Debaryomyces hansenii (BMID61271), Kluyveromyces (BMID109830), Lachancea (BMID43788), thermotolerans Saccharomyces cerevisiae (BMID89673), Zygosaccharomyces (BMID110595); bacteria: and Burkholderia thailandensis (BMID103487) Escherichia coli and (strain 55989 / EAEC) (BMID83160). The networks were taken from the path2model (http:// project www.ebi.ac.uk/biomodels-main/ path2models).

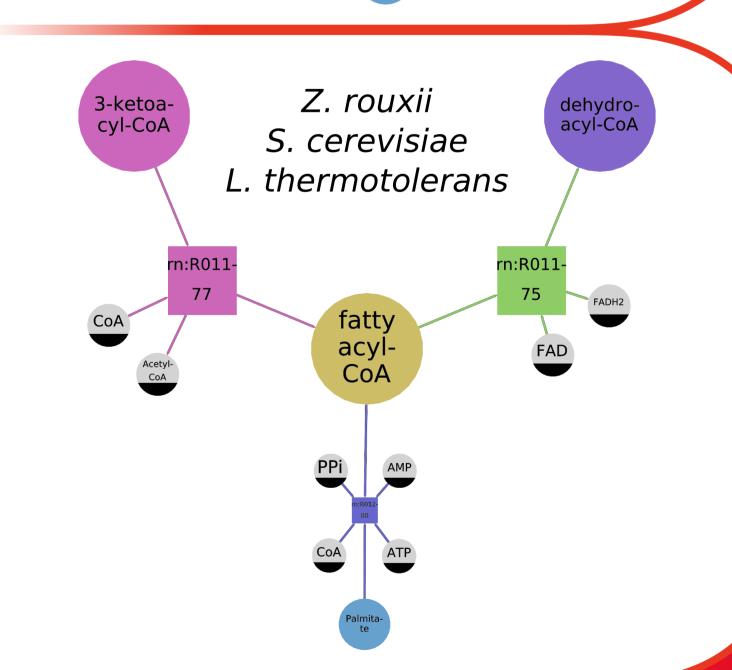
In all the yeast generalized networks, but the one of Y. Iypolitica, β -oxidation is not a cycle, This is caused by the missing reactions operating with hydroxy fatty acyls-CoA (green).

The generalized network of Y. Iypolitica highlights the fact that there is a particularity concerning C24:0-CoA (tetracosanoyl-CoA) (yellow): There exists a "short-cut" reaction (orange), producing it directly from another fatty acyl-CoA (yellow), avoiding the usual four-reaction β -oxidation chain. This reaction is not present in the other networks.

The bacteria networks show a reaction alternative to the standart *hydroxyacyl-CoA dehydrogenase*, that does not produce a proton.

The generalization of a metabolic network highlights its particularities, and makes erroneous reactions and gaps easier to grasp for a human.
