## Signal Processing over Graphs

 $G=(V, E)$ a symmetric graphAdjacency matrix: $A_{i j}=w_{i j}, i j \in E$
Degree matrix: $D=\operatorname{diag}\left(d_{1}, \ldots, d_{N}\right), d_{i}=\sum_{j} w_{i j}$ Laplacian matrix: $L=D-A$
Normalized Laplacian: $\mathscr{L}=D^{-1 / 2} L D^{-1 / 2}$
$X: V \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ or $\mathbb{C}$ a graph signal


Fourier: $F=\left[\chi_{0} \cdots \chi_{N-1}\right]^{*}, \widehat{X}=F X$
Example: $L=F^{*} \Lambda F$
Some successes (non-exhaustive growing list):

## Why (Non-)Stationarity?

- Stochastic signals
- Toy Example: Denoising $\Rightarrow$ Noise statistical invariance to an absolute time
- Non-stationarity: phase changes $\Rightarrow$ Ruptures, anomalies, failure diagnosis, etc...

Which tools for (non-)stationary graph signals?

## Stationary Temporal Signals

- Stationary: Statistical invariance to an absolute time

$$
\mathbb{P}[x(t)=x]=\mathbb{P}[x(t-\tau)=x]
$$

and for higher orders:

$$
\begin{gathered}
\mathbb{P}\left[x\left(t_{1}\right)=x_{1} \text { and } \cdots \text { and } x\left(t_{k}\right)=x_{k}\right]= \\
\mathbb{P}\left[x\left(t_{1}-\tau\right)=x_{1} \text { and } \cdots \text { and } x\left(t_{k}-\tau\right)=x_{k}\right] .
\end{gathered}
$$

$\Rightarrow$ Strict-Sense Stationary (SSS) signal $x$

- Time shift $T_{\tau}\{x\}(t)=x(t-\tau)$ invariance:

$$
x \text { and } T_{\tau}\{x\} \text { are statistically equal }
$$

## Stationary Graph Signals?

- Straightforward definition:

$$
x \text { and } T_{\tau}\{x\} \text { are statistically equal }
$$

- Question:

$$
\text { What is } T_{\tau} ?
$$

- $T_{\tau_{i}}=\Delta_{i}$, the Generalized Translation? [Shuman et al. 2013]
- $T_{\tau}=A^{\tau}$, the Graph Shift? [Sandryhaila et al. 2013]
$\Rightarrow$ These operators are not isometric: $\|A X\|_{2} \neq\|X\|_{2} \neq\left\|\Delta_{i} X\right\|_{2}$


## Definition (Graph Translation)

New isometric operator:

$$
T_{\mathscr{G}}^{\tau}=e^{-\iota \tau \sqrt{L}}
$$

## Remarks

- Coherence with the Time Shift:

$$
\begin{gathered}
T_{\tau}\left\{e_{\omega}\right\}=e^{-l \tau \omega} e_{\omega} \quad \Rightarrow \quad T_{\mathscr{G}}^{\tau} \chi_{I}=e^{-l \tau \sqrt{\lambda_{l}}} \chi_{l} \\
\widehat{T}_{\mathscr{G}}^{\imath}=\operatorname{diag}\left(e^{-l \sqrt{\lambda_{0}}}, \ldots, e^{-l \sqrt{\lambda_{N-1}}}\right)
\end{gathered}
$$

- Supports other graph Fourier transform:
- $T_{\mathscr{G}}^{\tau}=e^{-\imath \tau \sqrt{\mathscr{L}}}$
- Complex operator
- Not a real problem for stationarity
- Analytical signals?
$T_{g}$ is NOT an operator shifting energy from one vertex to another.


## Definition of Stationary Graph Signals

## Definition (SSS Graph Signal)

A stochastic graph signal $X$ verifying $\forall \tau, X \stackrel{\mathrm{~d}}{=} T_{\mathscr{G}}^{\tau} X$.
Definition (WSS Graph Signal)
A stochastic graph signal $X$ is Wide Sense Stationary iff:

$$
\left\{\begin{array}{l}
\mu_{X}=\mathbb{E}[X]=\mathbb{E}\left[T_{\mathscr{G}} X\right]=\mu_{T_{g} X} \\
R_{X}=\mathbb{E}\left[X X^{*}\right]=\mathbb{E}\left[\left(T_{\mathscr{G}} X\right)\left(T_{\mathscr{G}} X\right)^{*}\right]=R_{T_{\mathscr{g}} X}
\end{array}\right.
$$

## Spectral Characterisation

## Theorem

A stochastic graph signal $X$ is WSS iff

$$
\begin{align*}
\forall I, \lambda_{l} \neq 0 & \Rightarrow \mathbb{E}[\widehat{X}(I)]=0  \tag{i}\\
\forall I, \lambda_{l} \neq \lambda_{k} & \Rightarrow \mathbb{E}\left[\widehat{X}(I) \widehat{X}^{*}(k)\right]=0 \tag{ii}
\end{align*}
$$

## Remark on (i) (First Moment)

First moment condition: $\mathbb{E}[X] \propto \chi_{0}$

- $L=F^{*} \Lambda F \Rightarrow \chi_{0}=[1, \ldots, 1]^{T}$
- $\mathscr{L}=F^{*} \Lambda F \Rightarrow \chi_{0}=\left[1 / \sqrt{d_{1}}, \ldots, 1 / \sqrt{d_{N}}\right]^{T}$


## Remark on (ii) (Second Moment)

if $\forall I \neq k, \lambda_{l} \neq \lambda_{k}$, then (ii) $\Leftrightarrow S=\mathbb{E}\left[\widehat{X} \widehat{X}^{*}\right]$ diagonal

## Discussion

- Complex Operator: But real WSS signals exists
- R Non Toeplitz: $R_{i, j}=\mathbb{E}\left[X_{i} X_{j}^{*}\right] \neq \mathbb{E}\left[X_{i+k} X_{j+k}^{*}\right]=R_{i+k, j+k}$
- Alternative Definition of Translation?
$\Rightarrow$ Yes, as long as $T=e^{-l \Omega}$, and $T \chi_{0}=\chi_{0}$

## Graph Translation

$$
T_{\mathscr{G}}^{\tau}=e^{-l \tau \sqrt{L}}
$$

## Wide-Sense Stationary Graph Signal

$X$ and $T_{g}$ have equal first and second moments:

$$
\begin{gathered}
\mathbb{E}[X]=\mu_{X}=\mu_{T_{\mathscr{g}} X} \\
\mathbb{E}\left[X X^{*}\right]=R_{X}=R_{T_{\mathscr{G}} X}
\end{gathered}
$$

## Spectral Characterisation

$$
\begin{aligned}
& \mathbb{E}[\widehat{X}(I)]= \begin{cases}\mathbb{E}[\|X\|] & \text { if } I=0 \\
0 & \text { otherwise }\end{cases} \\
& \left.\mathbb{E}\left[\widehat{X} \widehat{X}^{*}\right]=S_{X} \text { diagonal (if } \forall I \neq k, \lambda_{l} \neq \lambda_{k}\right)
\end{aligned}
$$

## Stationary White Noise on Graph

Signal with flat power spectrum:

$$
S=\mathbb{E}\left[\widehat{X} \widehat{X}^{*}\right]=\sigma^{2} I
$$



Empirical $R$ (50k realisations)


A realisation


Empirical S (50k realisations)

## WSS Graph Signal

Low pass WSS graph signal:

$$
S_{/ /}=\mathbb{E}\left[\left|\widehat{X}_{\|}\right|^{2}\right]= \begin{cases}1 & \text { if } / \in\{1,2,3\} \\ 0 & \text { otherwise }\end{cases}
$$



Empirical $R$ (50k realisations)


A realisation


Empirical S (50k realisations)

## Non Stationary Graph Signal

Same as previously, with additive noise on $X(1)$ with distribution $\mathscr{N}(0,1)$.
