Seismic imaging : time-domain or harmonic-domain?

- Time-domain : imaging condition complicated but low computational cost
- Harmonic-domain : imaging condition simple but huge computational cost

Forward problem of the inversion process

- Elastic wave propagation in harmonic domain: Helmholtz equation
- Reduction of the size of the linear system


## Motivation

Seismic imaging in heterogeneous complex media

- Complex topography
- High heterogeneities


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Use of unstructured meshes with FE methods

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Use of unstructured meshes with FE methods
DG method

- Flexible choice of interpolation orders ( $p$ - adaptativity)
- Highly parallelizable method
- Increased computational cost as compared to classical FEM

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## 2D Helmholtz elastic equations

First order formulation of Helmholtz wave equations
$\mathbf{x}=(x, y) \in \Omega \subset \mathbb{R}^{2}$,

$$
\left\{\begin{array}{l}
i \omega \rho(\mathbf{x}) v(\mathbf{x})=\nabla \cdot \sigma \cdot \underline{\underline{\sigma}}(\mathbf{x})+f_{s}(\mathbf{x}) \\
i \omega \underline{\underline{\sigma}}(\mathbf{x})=\underline{\underline{C}}(\mathbf{x}) \underline{\underline{\varepsilon}}(v(\mathbf{x}))
\end{array}\right.
$$

- Free surface condition : $\underline{\underline{\sigma}} \mathbf{n}=0$ on $\Gamma_{\text {/ }}$
- Absorbing boundary condition : $\underline{\underline{\sigma}} \mathbf{n}=v_{p}(\mathbf{v} \cdot \mathbf{n}) \mathbf{n}+v_{s}(v \cdot \mathbf{t}) \mathbf{t}$ on $\Gamma_{a}$
- v : velocity vector
- $\underline{\underline{\sigma}}$ : stress tensor
- $\underline{\underline{\varepsilon}}$ : strain tensor


## 2D Helmholtz elastic equations

First order formulation of Helmholtz wave equations
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- Free surface condition : $\underline{\underline{\sigma}} \mathbf{n}=0$ on $\Gamma_{\text {/ }}$
- Absorbing boundary condition : $\underline{\underline{\sigma}} \mathbf{n}=v_{p}(\mathbf{v} \cdot \mathbf{n}) \mathbf{n}+v_{s}(v \cdot \mathbf{t}) \mathbf{t}$ on $\Gamma_{a}$
- $\rho$ : mass density
- C : tensor of elasticity coefficients
- $v_{p}$ : P-wave velocity
- $v_{s}$ : S-wave velocity
- $f_{s}$ : source term, $f_{s} \in L^{2}(\Omega)$

## Definitions

- Jump $\llbracket \rrbracket$ of a vector $v$ through $F$ :

$$
\llbracket v \rrbracket=v^{+} \cdot \mathbf{n}^{+}+v^{-} \cdot \mathbf{n}^{-}=v^{+} \cdot \mathbf{n}^{+}-v^{-} \cdot \mathbf{n}^{+}
$$

- Jump of a tensor $\underline{\underline{\sigma}}$ through $F$ :


$$
\llbracket \underline{\underline{\sigma}} \rrbracket=\underline{\underline{\sigma}}^{+} \mathbf{n}^{+}+\underline{\underline{\sigma}}^{-} \mathbf{n}^{-}=\underline{\underline{\sigma}}^{+} \mathbf{n}^{+}-\underline{\underline{\sigma}}^{-} \mathbf{n}^{+}
$$

\int_{K} i \omega \underline{\underline{\sigma}}^{K}: \underline{\underline{\xi}}+\int_{K} \mathbf{v}^{K} \cdot \nabla \cdot\left(\underline{\underline{C}}^{K} \underline{\underline{\xi}}\right)-\int_{\partial K} \widehat{\mathbf{v}}^{\partial K} \cdot \underline{\underline{C}}^{K} \underline{\underline{\xi}} \cdot \mathbf{n}=0
\end{array}\right.
$$

$\underline{\underline{\sigma}}^{K}$ and $\widehat{\mathrm{v}}^{K}$ are numerical traces of $\underline{\underline{\sigma}}^{K}$ and $\mathrm{v}^{K}$ respectively on $\partial K$

\int_{K} i \omega \underline{\underline{\sigma}}^{K}: \underline{\underline{\xi}}+\int_{K} \mathbf{v}^{K} \cdot \nabla \cdot\left(\underline{\underline{C}}^{K} \underline{\underline{\xi}}\right)-\int_{\partial K} \widehat{\mathbf{v}}^{\partial K} \cdot \underline{\underline{C}}^{K} \underline{\underline{\xi}} \cdot \mathbf{n}=0

where $\tau$ is the stabilization parameter $(\tau>0)$

## Local HDG formulation

We replace $\widehat{\mathbf{v}}^{K}$ and $\left(\underline{\underline{\widehat{\sigma}}}^{K} \cdot \mathbf{n}\right)$ by their definitions into the local equations

$$

\int_{K} i \omega \rho^{K} \mathbf{v}^{K} \cdot \mathbf{w}+\int_{K} \underline{\underline{\sigma}}^{K}: \nabla \mathbf{w}-\int_{\partial K} \underline{\underline{\sigma}}^{K} \cdot \mathbf{n} \cdot \mathbf{w} \\
\quad+\int_{\partial K} \tau \mathbf{l}\left(\mathbf{v}^{K}-\lambda^{\partial K}\right) \cdot \mathbf{w}=0 \\
\int_{K} i \omega \underline{\underline{\sigma}}^{K}: \underline{\underline{\xi}}+\int_{K} \mathbf{v}^{K} \cdot \nabla \cdot\left(\underline{\underline{C}}^{K} \underline{\underline{\xi}}\right)-\int_{\partial K} \lambda^{\partial K} \cdot \underline{\underline{C}}^{K} \underline{\underline{\xi}} \cdot \mathbf{n}=0

$\underline{\Lambda}=\left(\underline{\Lambda}^{F_{1}}, \underline{\Lambda}^{F_{2}}, \ldots, \underline{\Lambda}^{F_{n f}}\right)^{T}$, where $n_{f}=\operatorname{card}\left(\mathcal{F}_{h}\right)$
Discretization of the local HDG formulation

$$
\mathbb{A}^{K} \underline{W}^{K}+\mathbb{C}^{K} \underline{\Lambda}=0
$$

## HDG formulation of the equations

Transmission condition
In order to determine $\lambda^{K}$, the continuity of the normal component of $\underline{\underline{\sigma}}^{K}$ is weakly enforced, rendering this numerical trace conservative :

$$
\int_{F} \llbracket \underline{\underline{\sigma}}^{K} \cdot \mathbf{n} \rrbracket \cdot \eta=0
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Replacing ( $\hat{\underline{\sigma}}^{K} \cdot \mathbf{n}$ ) and summing over all faces, the transmission condition becomes :

$$
\sum_{K \in \mathcal{T}_{h}} \int_{\partial K}\left(\underline{\underline{\sigma}}^{K} \cdot \mathbf{n}\right) \cdot \eta-\sum_{K \in \mathcal{T}_{h}} \int_{\partial K} \tau \mathbf{I}\left(\mathbf{v}^{K}-\lambda^{\partial K}\right) \cdot \eta=0
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$$

Discretization of the transmission condition

$$
\sum_{K \in \mathcal{T}_{b}}\left[\mathbb{B}^{K} \underline{W}^{K}+\mathbb{L}^{K} \underline{\Lambda}\right]=0
$$

## Main idea of the algorithm using the HDG formulation

1. Construction of the linear system \(\mathbb{M} \wedge=0\) with \(\mathbb{M}=\sum_{K \in \mathcal{T}_{h}}\left[-\mathbb{B}^{K}\left(\mathbb{A}^{K}\right)^{-1} \mathbb{C}^{K}+\mathbb{L}^{K}\right]\)
``` for \(K=1\) to \(N b_{\text {tri }}\) do

Compute matrices \(\mathbb{B}^{K},\left(\mathbb{A}^{K}\right)^{-1}, \mathbb{C}^{K}\) and \(\mathbb{L}^{K}\)
Construction of the corresponding section of \(\mathbb{K}\) end for

1. Construction of the linear system \(\mathbb{M} \underline{\Lambda}=0\)
2. Construction of the right hand side \(\mathbb{S}\)

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1. Construction of the linear system \(\mathbb{M} \wedge=0\)
2. Construction of the right hand side \(\mathbb{S}\)
3. Resolution \(\mathbb{M} \underline{\wedge}=\mathbb{S}\)

\section*{Main idea of the algorithm using the HDG formulation}
1. Construction of the linear system \(\mathbb{M} \underline{\Lambda}=0\)
2. Construction of the right hand side \(\mathbb{S}\)
3. Resolution \(\mathbb{M} \underline{\wedge}=\mathbb{S}\)
4. Computation of the solutions of the initial problem
for \(K=1\) to \(N b_{t r i}\) do
Compute \(\underline{W}^{K}=-\left(\mathbb{A}^{K}\right)^{-1} \mathbb{C}^{K} \underline{\Lambda}\)
end for

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Marmousi test-case

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\section*{Plane wave}


Computational domain \(\Omega\) setting
- Physical parameters:
- \(\rho=2000 \mathrm{~kg} \cdot \mathrm{~m}^{-3}\)
- \(\lambda=16 \mathrm{GPa}\)
- \(\mu=8 \mathrm{GPa}\)
- Plane wave :
\[
u=\nabla e^{i(k \cos \theta x+k \sin \theta y)}
\]
where \(k=\frac{\omega}{v_{p}}\)
- \(\theta=0\)
- Three meshes :
- 3000 elements
- 10000 elements
- 45000 elements
