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Why a random fluid dynamics?

- Take into account unresolved processes (small scales)
- Physical justification of empirical models
- Predicting possible distinct scenarios, extreme-events, ...
- Quantification of modeling errors for **data assimilation**:

ensemble forecasts

Randomized dynamics

• Stochastic flow:

$$\mathrm{d} \boldsymbol{X}_t = \boldsymbol{w}(\boldsymbol{X}_t, t) \mathrm{d} t + \boldsymbol{\sigma}(\boldsymbol{X}_t, t) \mathrm{d} \boldsymbol{B}_t$$

• Stochastic flow:

$$\mathrm{d} \boldsymbol{X}_t = \boldsymbol{w}(\boldsymbol{X}_t, t)\mathrm{d} t + \boldsymbol{\sigma}(\boldsymbol{X}_t, t)\mathrm{d} \boldsymbol{B}_t$$

with infinite-dimensional Brownian motion

$$\boldsymbol{\sigma}(\bullet, t) \mathrm{d}\boldsymbol{B}_t \stackrel{\triangle}{=} \int_{\Omega} \mathrm{d}\boldsymbol{z} \ \breve{\boldsymbol{\sigma}}(\bullet, \boldsymbol{z}, t) \mathrm{d}\boldsymbol{B}_t(\boldsymbol{z})$$

• Stochastic flow:

$$\mathrm{d} \boldsymbol{X}_t = \boldsymbol{w}(\boldsymbol{X}_t, t)\mathrm{d} t + \boldsymbol{\sigma}(\boldsymbol{X}_t, t)\mathrm{d} \boldsymbol{B}_t$$

with infinite-dimensional Brownian motion

$$\boldsymbol{\sigma}(\bullet, t) \mathrm{d}\boldsymbol{B}_t \stackrel{ riangle}{=} \int_{\Omega} \mathrm{d}\boldsymbol{z} \ \boldsymbol{\check{\sigma}}(\bullet, \boldsymbol{z}, t) \mathrm{d}\boldsymbol{B}_t(\boldsymbol{z})$$

• A tracer is a function conserved along the flow:

$$D_t \Theta(t, \boldsymbol{X}_t) \stackrel{\triangle}{=} \mathrm{d} \left[\Theta(t, \boldsymbol{X}_t) \right] = 0$$

Ito-Wentzel formula (Kunita 1997)

If both X and Θ are semimartingales (w.r.t. time) and Θ is twice differentiable w.r.t. space

Then

 $d \left[\Theta(t, \boldsymbol{X}(t, y))\right] = d_t \Theta + (\nabla \Theta)^T d\boldsymbol{X} + \frac{1}{2} tr(H_{\Theta} d < \boldsymbol{X}, \boldsymbol{X}^T >)$ $+ d_t < (\nabla \Theta)^T, \boldsymbol{X} >$

$D_t \Theta = 0$

Advection of tracer Θ $d_t \Theta + \boldsymbol{w}^* \cdot \boldsymbol{\nabla} \Theta dt + \boldsymbol{\sigma} d\boldsymbol{B}_t \cdot \boldsymbol{\nabla} \Theta = \boldsymbol{\nabla} \cdot \left(\frac{1}{2} \boldsymbol{a} \boldsymbol{\nabla} \Theta\right) dt$

$$\mathbf{d}_{t}\Theta + \mathbf{w}^{\star} \cdot \nabla\Theta \mathbf{d}t + \boldsymbol{\sigma}\mathbf{d}\boldsymbol{B}_{t} \cdot \nabla\Theta = \left[\nabla \cdot \left(\frac{1}{2}\boldsymbol{a}\nabla\Theta\right) \mathbf{d}t\right]$$

$$oldsymbol{a} = oldsymbol{\sigma} oldsymbol{\sigma}^{\mathrm{T}}$$

 $oldsymbol{w}^* = oldsymbol{w} - rac{1}{2} (oldsymbol{\nabla} \cdot oldsymbol{a})^{\mathrm{T}}$

$$\boldsymbol{\sigma}(\bullet, t) \mathrm{d}\boldsymbol{B}_t \stackrel{\triangle}{=} \int_{\Omega} \mathrm{d}\boldsymbol{z} \ \boldsymbol{\breve{\sigma}}(\bullet, \boldsymbol{z}, t) \mathrm{d}\boldsymbol{B}_t(\boldsymbol{z})$$

- Parametric or non-parametric estimation
- Observations can be:
 - Small-scale eulerian velocity $(\boldsymbol{\sigma}(\boldsymbol{x}_i, t_j) \mathrm{d} \boldsymbol{B}_{t_j})_{ij}$
 - Small-scale Lagrangian velocity $\left(oldsymbol{\sigma}(oldsymbol{X}_{t_j}(oldsymbol{x}_i),t_j) \mathrm{d}oldsymbol{B}_{t_j}
 ight)_{ij}$
 - Tracer (solution of the SPDE) $\left(\Theta(oldsymbol{x}_i,t_j)
 ight)_{ij}$
- In the following simulations, very simple model (without estimations)

$$\boldsymbol{\sigma} \mathrm{d}\boldsymbol{B}_{t} = \int_{\Omega} \mathrm{d}\boldsymbol{z} \ \boldsymbol{\nabla}^{\perp} \boldsymbol{\check{\psi}}(\bullet - \boldsymbol{z}) \mathrm{d}\boldsymbol{B}_{t}(\boldsymbol{z}) = \boldsymbol{\nabla}^{\perp} \boldsymbol{\check{\psi}} \ast \mathrm{d}\boldsymbol{B}_{t}$$
$$\widehat{\boldsymbol{\check{\psi}}}(\boldsymbol{k}) = A \ \mathbf{1}_{\{\kappa_{1} < \|\boldsymbol{k}\| < \kappa_{2}\}} \|\boldsymbol{k}\|^{-\alpha}$$

Random reduced order model from stochastic Navier-Stokes equation

Why a reduced order model?

Very fast simulation of very complex system (e.g. for industrial application)

What is a reduced order model?

• Physical model (PDE) simplified using observations

$$\boldsymbol{v}(\boldsymbol{x},t) = \overline{\boldsymbol{v}}(\boldsymbol{x}) + \sum_{i=0}^{n} b_i(t)\boldsymbol{\phi}_i(\boldsymbol{x}) + \sum_{i=n+1}^{N} b_i(t)\boldsymbol{\phi}_i(\boldsymbol{x})$$

$$oldsymbol{a}(oldsymbol{x},oldsymbol{x},t) = oldsymbol{z}_0(oldsymbol{x}) + \sum_{i=0}^n b_i(t)oldsymbol{z}_i(oldsymbol{x})$$
 $oldsymbol{z}_i(oldsymbol{x}) = rac{1}{t} \int_0^t b_i(t) \mathrm{d} < oldsymbol{\sigma}(oldsymbol{x},t)oldsymbol{B}, oldsymbol{\sigma}(oldsymbol{x},t)oldsymbol{B} >$
