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Elastodynamic problem

Equation of motion and the constitutive equation

$$\rho \partial_{tt} \boldsymbol{u} - \nabla \cdot \boldsymbol{\sigma} = \boldsymbol{f}, \qquad \boldsymbol{\sigma} = \boldsymbol{\mathsf{C}} \boldsymbol{\varepsilon}, \quad \boldsymbol{\varepsilon} := \frac{\nabla \boldsymbol{u} + (\nabla \boldsymbol{u})^T}{2}$$

with $\boldsymbol{u}(\boldsymbol{x},0) = \boldsymbol{u}_0(\boldsymbol{x}), \ \partial_t \boldsymbol{u}(\boldsymbol{x},0) = \boldsymbol{v}_0(\boldsymbol{x}) \ \text{and} \ \boldsymbol{u}_{\mid \partial \Omega} = \boldsymbol{0}.$

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1. Partition the domain $\Omega \times [0, T]$

$$\begin{split} \mathbf{V} &:= \left\{ \mathbf{w} \in \mathbf{L}^2(\Omega) \,:\, \mathbf{w} \mid_{\mathcal{K}} \in \mathbf{H}^1(\mathcal{K}) \quad \forall \mathcal{K} \in \mathcal{T}_H \right\} \,, \\ \mathbf{\Lambda} &:= \left\{ \boldsymbol{\tau} \; \mathbf{n}^{\mathcal{K}} \mid_{\partial \mathcal{K}}, \; \forall \mathcal{K} \in \mathcal{T}_H \,:\, \boldsymbol{\tau} \in \mathcal{H}(\operatorname{\mathsf{div}}; \Omega; \mathbb{S}) \right\} \,. \end{split}$$



Notation:

- $(\cdot, \cdot)_{K}$ $L^{2}(K)$ product;
- $\langle \cdot, \cdot \rangle_{\partial K}$ dual product $\boldsymbol{H}^{-\frac{1}{2}}(\partial K) \times \boldsymbol{H}^{\frac{1}{2}}(\partial K);$

•
$$(\cdot, \cdot)_{\partial \mathcal{T}_H} := \sum_{\kappa \in \mathcal{T}_H} \langle \cdot, \cdot \rangle_{\partial \kappa};$$

•
$$u^{(n)} := u_{|I_n|}$$

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2. A hybrid variational problem Find $(\boldsymbol{u}, \boldsymbol{\lambda})$ that, for $n = 1, \cdots, n_T$, satisfies $\begin{cases}
d_{tt}(\rho \boldsymbol{u}^{(n)}, \boldsymbol{w})_{\mathcal{K}} + (\sigma(\boldsymbol{u}^{(n)}), \varepsilon(\boldsymbol{w}))_{\mathcal{K}} - \langle \boldsymbol{\lambda}^{(n)}, \boldsymbol{w} \rangle_{\partial \mathcal{K}} = (\boldsymbol{f}, \boldsymbol{w})_{\mathcal{K}}, \quad \forall \boldsymbol{w} \in \boldsymbol{H}^1(\mathcal{K}), \\
(\mu, \boldsymbol{u}^{(n)})_{\partial \mathcal{T}_H} = 0, \quad \forall \boldsymbol{\mu} \in \boldsymbol{\Lambda}, \\
\boldsymbol{u}^{(n)}(t_{n-1}) = \boldsymbol{u}^{(n-1)}(t_{n-1}), \\
d_t \boldsymbol{u}^{(n)}(t_{n-1}) = d_t \boldsymbol{u}^{(n-1)}(t_{n-1}),
\end{cases}$

where $u_n := u^{(n)}(t_n) = u(t_n)$ and $v_n := d_t u^{(n)}(t_n) = d_t u(t_n)$.

Theorem

The problem is well-defined for $\mathbf{f} \in H^1(0, T; \mathbf{L}^2(\Omega)), \ \mathbf{u}_0, \mathbf{v}_0 \in \mathbf{H}^1_0(\Omega) \text{ and } \sigma(\mathbf{u}_0) \in H(\operatorname{div}; \Omega; \mathbb{S}).$ The solution is unique in $C(0, T; \mathbf{V}) \cap C^1(0, T; \mathbf{L}^2(\Omega)) \times L^2(0, T; \mathbf{\Lambda}).$

Moreover, u solves the original problem and

$$\boldsymbol{\lambda} = \boldsymbol{\sigma}(\boldsymbol{u}) \boldsymbol{n}^{K}$$
 on $\partial K, \forall K \in \mathcal{T}_{H}.$

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3. Split the solution

$$\boldsymbol{u}^{(n)} = T_n(\boldsymbol{\lambda}^{(n)}) + \hat{T}_n(\boldsymbol{z}_n), \quad \boldsymbol{z}_n := (\boldsymbol{u}_{n-1}, \boldsymbol{v}_{n-1}, \boldsymbol{f}).$$

where T_n and \hat{T}_n are linear operators

$$T_n: L^2(I_n; \mathbf{\Lambda}) \to L^2(I_n; \mathbf{L}^2(\Omega)),$$

$$\hat{T}_n: \mathbf{V} \times \mathbf{L}^2(\Omega) \times L^2(I_n; \mathbf{L}^2(\Omega)) \to C(I_n; \mathbf{V}) \cap C^1(I_n; \mathbf{L}^2(\Omega)).$$

For each $K imes I_n$, $oldsymbol{u}_{oldsymbol{\lambda}}^{(n)} := \mathcal{T}_n(oldsymbol{\lambda}^{(n)})$ is the solution of

$$\begin{cases} d_{tt}(\rho \, \boldsymbol{u}_{\boldsymbol{\lambda}}^{(n)}, \boldsymbol{w})_{\mathcal{K}} + (\boldsymbol{\sigma}(\boldsymbol{u}_{\boldsymbol{\lambda}}^{(n)}), \boldsymbol{\varepsilon}(\boldsymbol{w}))_{\mathcal{K}} = \langle \boldsymbol{\lambda}^{(n)}, \boldsymbol{w} \rangle_{\partial \mathcal{K}}, \ \forall \boldsymbol{w} \in \boldsymbol{H}^{1}(\mathcal{K}), \\ \boldsymbol{u}_{\boldsymbol{\lambda}}^{(n)}(t_{n-1}) = d_{t} \boldsymbol{u}_{\boldsymbol{\lambda}}^{(n)}(t_{n-1}) = \boldsymbol{0}, \end{cases}$$

and $\boldsymbol{u}_{\boldsymbol{z}}^{(n)} := \hat{T}_n(\boldsymbol{z}_n)$ is the solution of

$$\begin{cases} d_{tt}(\rho \, \boldsymbol{u}_{z}^{(n)}, \boldsymbol{w})_{\mathcal{K}} + (\boldsymbol{\sigma}(\boldsymbol{u}_{z}^{(n)}), \boldsymbol{\varepsilon}(\boldsymbol{w}))_{\mathcal{K}} = (\boldsymbol{f}, \, \boldsymbol{w})_{\mathcal{K}}, \, \forall \boldsymbol{w} \in \boldsymbol{H}^{1}(\mathcal{K}), \\ \boldsymbol{u}_{z}^{(n)}(t_{n-1}) = \boldsymbol{u}_{n-1}, \\ d_{t} \, \boldsymbol{u}_{z}^{(n)}(t_{n-1}) = \boldsymbol{v}_{n-1}. \end{cases}$$

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Global-Local formulation²

Global-Local formulation

Find λ that, for $n = 1, \cdots, n_T$, satisfies

$$(oldsymbol{\mu}, \mathcal{T}_n(oldsymbol{\lambda}^{(n)}))_{\partial \mathcal{T}_H} = -(oldsymbol{\mu}, \hat{\mathcal{T}}_n(oldsymbol{z}_n))_{\partial \mathcal{T}_H}, \quad orall oldsymbol{\mu} \in oldsymbol{\Lambda},$$

where

$$\begin{aligned} \mathbf{z}_n &:= (\mathbf{u}_{n-1}, \mathbf{v}_{n-1}, \mathbf{f}), \\ \mathbf{u}_n &:= T_n(\lambda^{(n)})_{|t_n} + \hat{T}_n(\mathbf{z}_n)_{|t_n}, \\ \mathbf{v}_n &:= d_t T_n(\lambda^{(n)})_{|t_n} + d_t \hat{T}_n(\mathbf{z}_n)_{|t_n}, \end{aligned}$$

This is equivalent to the hybrid problem using

$$\boldsymbol{u}^{(n)} := T_n(\boldsymbol{\lambda}^{(n)}) + \hat{T}_n(\mathbf{z}_n).$$

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One-level MHM method

Global discretization

- $\Lambda_H \subset \Lambda$ and basis $\{\psi_i\}_{i=1}^{m_{\Lambda}}$.
- $\mathbb{P}_0(I_n; \mathbf{\Lambda}_H) \subset L^2(I_n; \mathbf{\Lambda}).$

$$oldsymbol{u}_{H}^{(n)} := \sum_{j=1}^{m_{\mathbf{A}}} lpha_{nj} T_n(\psi_j) + \hat{T}_n(\mathbf{z}_{H,n})$$

For
$$n = 1, \cdots, n_T$$
 , find $\alpha_n \in \mathbb{R}^{m_{\Lambda}}$ such that

$$\sum_{j=1} \alpha_{nj} (\boldsymbol{\psi}_i, \boldsymbol{T}_n(\boldsymbol{\psi}_j)_{|\mathbf{t}_n}) \partial \tau_H = -(\boldsymbol{\psi}_i, \hat{\boldsymbol{T}}_n(\mathbf{z}_{H,n})_{|\mathbf{t}_n}) \partial \tau_H, \quad \forall i = 1, \cdots, m_{\boldsymbol{\Lambda}},$$

where

$$\mathbf{z}_{H,n} := (\mathbf{u}_{H,n-1}, \mathbf{v}_{H,n-1}, f), \ \mathbf{u}_{H,n} := \mathbf{u}_{H}^{(n)}(t_{n}), \ \mathbf{v}_{H,n} := d_{t}\mathbf{u}_{H}^{(n)}(t_{n})$$

and initial conditions

 $\boldsymbol{u}_{H,0} := \boldsymbol{u}_0$ and $\boldsymbol{v}_{H,0} := \boldsymbol{v}_0$.

Two-level MHM method

Discretization in $K \times I_n$:

- $\mathbf{V}_h(K) \subset \mathbf{H}^1(K), \ \forall K \in \mathcal{T}_H;$
- Newmark- (γ, β) in $I_n, \forall n = 1, \cdots, n_t$.

$$\begin{split} \eta_{j}^{(n)} &\approx T_{n}(\psi_{j})_{|t_{n}}, \quad \eta_{0}^{(n)} \approx \hat{T}_{n}(\mathbf{z}_{h,n})_{|t_{n}}, \quad \dot{\eta}_{j}^{(n)} \approx d_{t} T_{n}(\psi_{j})_{|t_{n}}, \quad \dot{\eta}_{0}^{(n)} \approx d_{t} \hat{T}_{n}(\mathbf{z}_{h,n})_{|t_{n}}, \\ \boldsymbol{u}_{h,n|_{K}} &:= \sum_{j=1}^{m_{A}} \alpha_{nj} \, \eta_{j}^{(n)} + \eta_{0}^{(n)}, \quad \boldsymbol{v}_{h,n|_{K}} := \sum_{j=1}^{m_{A}} \alpha_{nj} \, \dot{\eta}_{j}^{(n)} + \dot{\eta}_{0}^{(n)}, \quad \boldsymbol{\sigma}_{h,n|_{T}} := \boldsymbol{\sigma}(\boldsymbol{u}_{h,n})_{|_{T}}. \end{split}$$

MHM method

For $n=1,\cdots,n_T$, find $\alpha_n\in\mathbb{R}^{m_h}$ such that

$$\sum_{j=1}^{m_{\Lambda}} \alpha_{nj} (\boldsymbol{\psi}_i, \boldsymbol{\eta}_j^{(n)})_{\partial \mathcal{T}_H} = -(\boldsymbol{\psi}_i, \boldsymbol{\eta}_0^{(n)})_{\partial \mathcal{T}_H}, \quad \forall i = 1, \cdots, m_{\Lambda},$$

where $\mathbf{z}_{h,n} := (\mathbf{u}_{h,n-1}, \mathbf{v}_{h,n-1}, \mathbf{f})$, $\mathbf{u}_{h,0} \approx \mathbf{u}_0$ and $\mathbf{v}_{h,0} \approx \mathbf{v}_0$.

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The MHM method

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Two-level MHM method

- $\boldsymbol{u}_{h,n} \in \boldsymbol{H}^1(\mathcal{T}_H), \ \forall n = 1, \cdots, n_T \quad (\boldsymbol{H}^1(\Omega)\text{-non-conforming})$
- Strong symmetric σ_h
- **High-order** local approximations in space $\mathbf{V}_h(K)$
- Use of different local parameters (h, p) and $(\Delta \tau = \frac{\Delta t}{n_{\tau}}, \gamma, \beta)$ to different $K \times I_n$
- Energy-conservative local method \Rightarrow energy-conservative MHM

Final conclusions and remarks

An analytical problem

Isotropic homogeneous media with exact solution $\boldsymbol{u} = [u_1, u_2, u_3]^T$:

$$\begin{cases} u_1(t, x, y, z) &= \frac{1}{2}(1 - \cos(\omega t))\sin(2\pi x)\sin(2\pi y)\sin(2\pi z), \\ u_2(t, x, y, z) &= -\frac{1}{2}(1 - \cos(\omega t))\sin(2\pi x)\sin(2\pi y)\sin(2\pi z), \\ u_3(t, x, y, z) &= \frac{1}{2}(1 - \cos(\omega t))\sin(\pi x)\sin(\pi y)\sin(\pi z). \end{cases}$$



$$\begin{split} \mathbf{\Lambda}_{H} &:= \left\{ \boldsymbol{\mu}_{H} \in \mathbf{\Lambda} \,:\, \boldsymbol{\mu}_{H} \,|_{F} \in \left[\mathbb{P}_{\ell}(F)\right]^{2} \quad \text{for all } F \in \partial \mathcal{T}_{H} \right\} \\ \mathbf{V}_{h}(K) &:= \left\{ \mathbf{v}_{h} \in C(\overline{K}) \,:\, \mathbf{v}_{h} \,|_{\tau} \in \left[\mathbb{P}_{k}(\tau)\right]^{3} \quad \text{for all } \tau \in \mathcal{T}_{h}^{K} \right\} \end{split}$$

Final conclusions and remarks

Convergence results

Figure : Experiments with $\ell = 3$ and k = 5.



Error convergence observed numerically:

- $O(\Delta t^2)$ in all norms.
- O(H^{ℓ+2}) in the L²(Ω)-norm, O(H^{ℓ+1}) in the H¹(T_H)-norm and O(H^ℓ) in the div-norm.

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Multiscale scenario ³



Figure : The physical domain divided in layers.

Problem:

- Flat case.
- Single shot.
- Two-dimensional problem at a slice (inline = 0 m).

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• Free surface boundary condition.

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Final conclusions and remarks

MHM configuration

- Edges divided in 4 equally spaced parts.
- \mathbb{P}^1 approximation in each part of edge.
- Local meshes with 4096 \mathbb{P}^3 elements (h = H/64).



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MHM solution



Figure : Isolines of $|u_h|$ solution at t = 0.15.

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Global energy

$$E_h := \frac{1}{2} \sum_{K \in T_H} (\rho \mathbf{v}_h, \mathbf{v}_h)_K + (\boldsymbol{\sigma}_h, \boldsymbol{\varepsilon}(\boldsymbol{u}_h))_K$$



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Comparison with a Galerkin solution



Figure : Isovalues of the von Mises stress for MHM (top) and a reference solution (bottom), at t = 0.15.

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Final conclusions and remarks

- The MHM method provides a natural level of parallelism.
- It allows local mesh refinement and high-order approximations.
- Optimal convergence in time and super convergence in space for displacement, velocity and stress.
- It conserves energy depending on the local level.
- It is robust on non-aligned mesh with interfaces.

Ongoing work:

- Local time step validation.
- Error and stability analysis.
