





Data-driven cortical clustering to provide a family of plausible solutions to the M/EEG inverse problem

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MOTIVATION

- Active source is represented as one connected cortical region, rather than a dipole.
- Several separated cortical regions can fit the data with similar accuracy. While convex optimization based methods give a single solution, we explore a family of plausible solutions.
- Estimate not only the position, but also extension of the region.

ASSUMPTIONS

- Data model: y = Lx + N (L is a lead field)
- Source space: cortical mesh
- Brain activity \mathcal{X} : single region with a constant amplitude over this region; one time sample

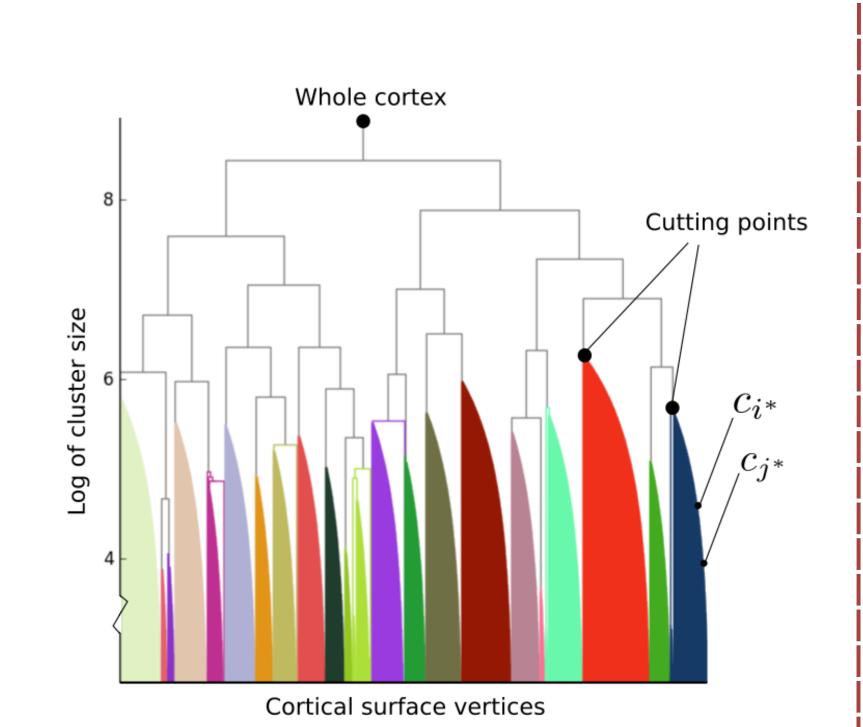
METHOD

Adapting hierarchical clustering algorithm [1] to fit M/EEG data:

- Mesh vertices represent initial clusters. Mesh edges define the cluster neighborhood.
- Among all inter neighbors clusters, find clusters $\,{c_{i^*}}\,,\,{c_{i^*}}\,$ which minimize:

$$E(i,j) = \min_{a} \|y - a \cdot (L(c_i) + L(c_j))\|_2 + R(i,j)$$

- Merge these clusters: $c_k = c_{i^*} \cup c_{j^*}, \ L(c_k) = L(c_{i^*}) + L(c_{i^*})$
- Repeat until the whole cortex is one cluster.
- Cut the tree to obtain separated "growing" regions.
- Select best regions by thresholding data fitting error.

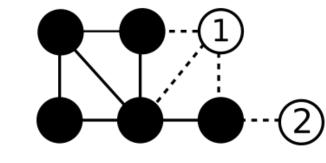


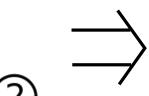
Regularization

- Size
 - Cortical atlas
- Structural connectivity
- Shape: penalize regions with "sharp" borders and holes

B(i,j) is the number of vertices in $oldsymbol{c_i}$ which have at least one neighbor in $oldsymbol{c_j}$

$$R(i,j) = \lambda \cdot (|c_i| + |c_j|)^2 \cdot \frac{\min(|c_i|, |c_j|)}{B(i,j) + B(j,i)}$$

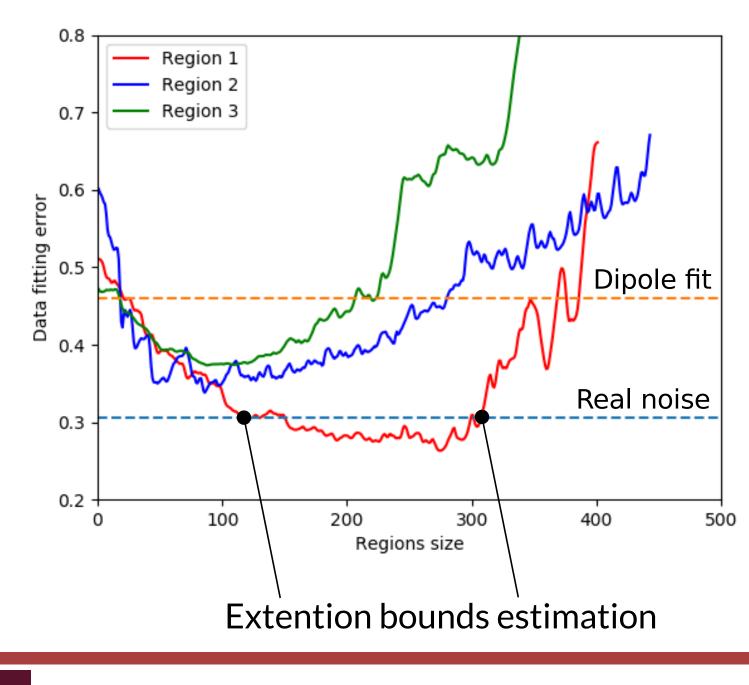




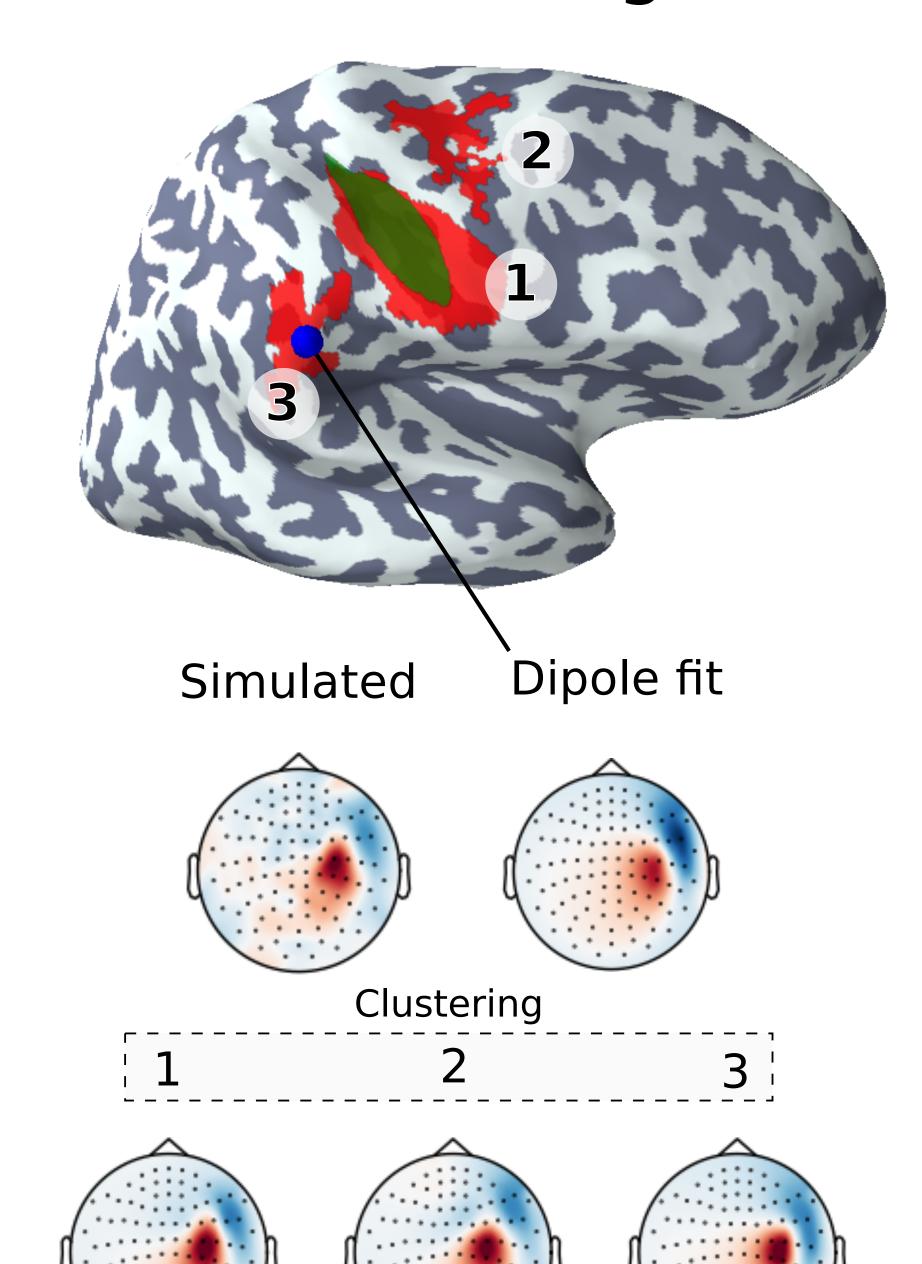
 $\Rightarrow R(\bullet, 1) < R(\bullet, 2)$

RESULTS

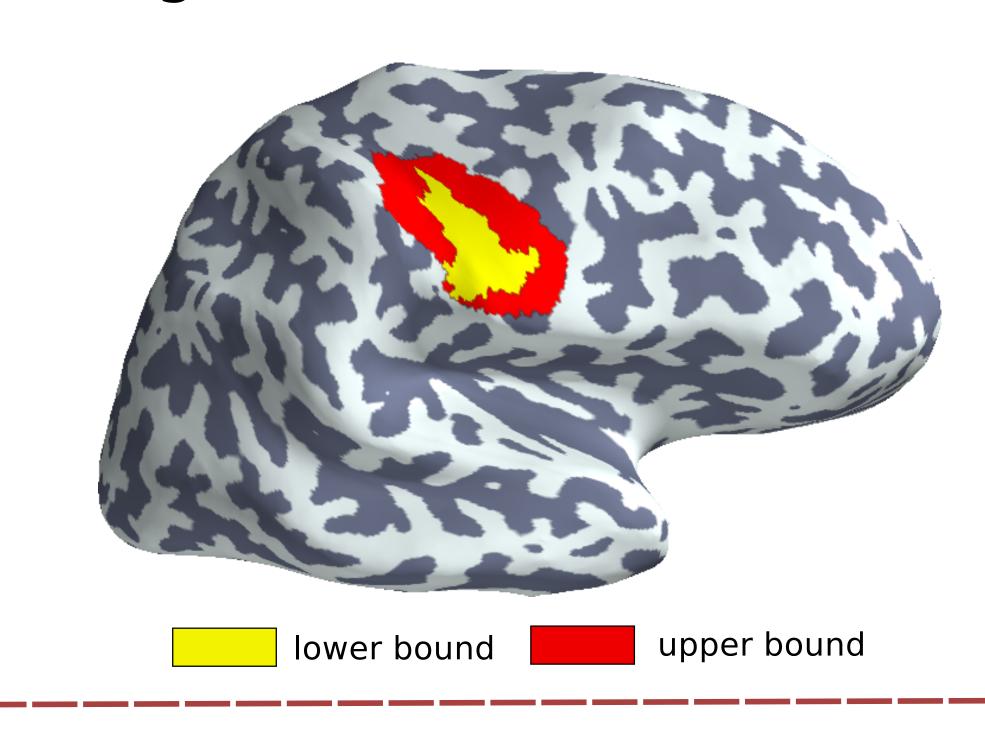
- Simulated MEG signal of one active region (green) with additive Gaussian noise.
- Clustering gives better data fitting error than dipole fit, even with free orientation.
- Dipole fit gives dipole outside the simulated region, but clustering is able to reconstruct the region.
- Clustering gives better spatial information than minimum norm estimate (MNE).
- Regularization is needed to avoid overfitting.
- Clastering gives not one but several candidate regions for the solution and estimates their size.



Clustering

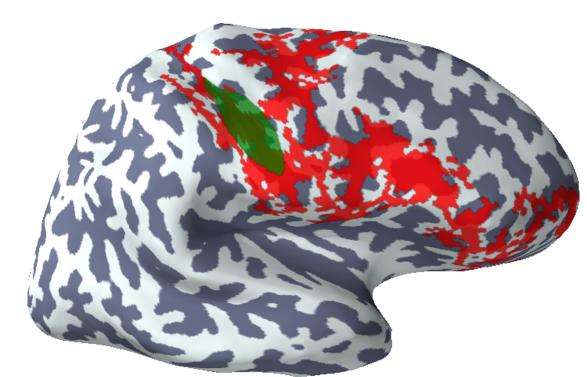


Region extension estimation

CONCLUSIONS

New approach for the M/EEG inverse problem which:

- Deals with a "growing region" source, which allows to explore space of solutions.
- Gives several candidates for solution and their extensions.

Future work:

- Regularization term to be investigated.
- Application to the real data.
- Multiple source case by adapting the MUSIC method [2].
