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# Averaging for minimum time control problems and applications 

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Joint work with J.-B. Caillau and J.-B. Pomet from INRIA Sophia Antipolis, France.

## Coordinates $(I, \varphi)$

- $I \in U\left(\subset \mathbb{R}^{5}\right)$ : geometric elements of the ellipse,
- $\varphi \in S^{1}$ : position on the orbit.

Equations of motion In first approximation,

$$
\dot{I}=0, \quad \dot{\varphi}=\omega(I)>0
$$

$I$ is a slow variable compared to $\varphi$.

$$
\begin{array}{lll}
\min _{t_{f},|u| \leq 1} & t_{f} \\
\text { s.t. } & \dot{I}=\varepsilon F_{0}(I, \varphi, \varepsilon)+\varepsilon \sum_{i=1}^{3} u_{i} F_{i}(I, \varphi, \varepsilon), & I(0)=I_{0} \\
& \dot{\varphi}=\omega(I)+\varepsilon G_{0}(I, \varphi, \varepsilon)+\varepsilon \sum_{i=1}^{3} u_{i} G_{i}(I, \varphi, \varepsilon), & I\left(t_{f}\right)=I_{f}
\end{array}
$$

$0<\varepsilon \ll 1$, and $I_{0}, I_{f}$ are given. $\varphi(0)$ and $\varphi\left(t_{f}\right)$ are free. $F_{i}(\cdot, \varphi, \cdot), G_{i}(\cdot, \varphi, \cdot) \quad i=0 \ldots 3$ are $2 \pi$-periodic w.r.t. $\varphi, u \in \mathbb{R}^{3}$.
$F_{0}, G_{0}$ modeled perturbations

- high order terms in the gravitational potential of the Earth,
- luni-solar perturbation, ...


Let $f(X, \psi, \varepsilon), g(X, \psi, \varepsilon)$ be two vector fields $2 \pi$-periodic w.r.t. $\psi \in S^{1}$. Unperturbed system $\quad \dot{X}=0, \quad \dot{\psi}=\omega(X)$
Perturbed system

$$
\dot{X}=\varepsilon f(X, \psi, \varepsilon), \quad \dot{\psi}=\omega(X)+\varepsilon g(X, \psi, \varepsilon)
$$

where $X \in C \subset \mathbb{R}^{n}$. There are $C^{\prime \prime} \subset C$ and $\tau>0$ s.t.

$$
Y^{\prime}=\bar{f}(Y), \quad \bar{f}(X)=\frac{1}{2 \pi} \int_{0}^{2 \pi} f(X, \psi, \varepsilon=0) \mathrm{d} \psi
$$

have a well-defined solution defined on $[0, \tau]$ for every initial condition $Y(0) \in C^{\prime}$.
Theorem 1. $\exists \varepsilon_{0}>0,0<\varepsilon<\varepsilon_{0}$ and for every initial condition in $C^{\prime} \times S^{1}$, the perturbed system has a solution on $[0, \tau / \varepsilon]$ s.t.

$$
|X(t)-Y(\varepsilon t)|=O(\varepsilon)
$$

PMP: a minimizing trajectory is projection of an extremal $\left(I(),. \varphi(),. p_{I}(),. p_{\varphi}().\right)$ solution of the Hamiltonian system

$$
\begin{gathered}
H\left(I, \varphi, p_{I}, p_{\varphi}, \varepsilon\right)=p_{\varphi} \omega(I)+\varepsilon K_{0}\left(I, \varphi, p_{I}, p_{\varphi}, \varepsilon\right) \\
K_{0}:=H_{0}+\sqrt{\sum_{i=1}^{3} H_{i}^{2}}, H_{i}\left(I, \varphi, p_{I}, p_{\varphi}, \varepsilon\right)=p_{I} F_{i}(I, \varphi, \varepsilon)+p_{\varphi} G_{i}(I, \varphi, \varepsilon), i=0, \ldots, 3 .
\end{gathered}
$$

## Extremal system

$$
\begin{gathered}
\dot{I}=\varepsilon \frac{\partial K_{0}}{\partial p_{I}}, \quad \dot{p_{I}}=-p_{\varphi} \omega^{\prime}-\varepsilon \frac{\partial K_{0}}{\partial I} \\
\dot{\varphi}=\omega+\varepsilon \frac{\partial K_{0}}{\partial p_{\varphi}}, \quad \dot{p_{\varphi}}=-\varepsilon \frac{\partial K_{0}}{\partial \varphi}
\end{gathered}
$$

Theorem 2. Normalizing on $\boldsymbol{H}=\boldsymbol{\varepsilon}$ (normal extremals), we have

$$
p_{\varphi}=-\varepsilon h\left(I, \varphi, p_{I}, \varepsilon\right)
$$

$$
0=\frac{\partial}{\partial p_{I}}\left(H\left(I, \varphi, p_{I},-\varepsilon h\left(I, \varphi, p_{I}, \varepsilon\right), \varepsilon\right)-\varepsilon\right)=\varepsilon \frac{\partial K_{0}}{\partial p_{I}}-\varepsilon \frac{\partial h}{\partial p_{I}} \frac{\partial H}{\partial p_{\varphi}}
$$

$\Rightarrow \dot{I}=\varepsilon \frac{\partial h}{\partial p_{I}} \dot{\varphi}$, and similarly, we have: $\dot{p}_{I}=-\varepsilon \frac{\partial h}{\partial I} \dot{\varphi}$.
$\Rightarrow$ Reparametrization w.r.t.: $s=\varepsilon\left(\varphi-\varphi_{0}\right)$.

Definition 3. The average boundary value problem is

$$
\begin{aligned}
& \frac{\mathrm{d} \bar{I}}{\mathrm{~d} s}=\frac{\partial \bar{h}}{\partial p_{I}}, \quad \frac{\mathrm{~d} \bar{p}_{I}}{\mathrm{~d} s}=-\frac{\partial \bar{h}}{\partial I} \\
& \bar{I}(0)=I_{0}, \quad \bar{I}\left(\bar{s}_{f}\right)=I_{f}, \quad \bar{h}=0
\end{aligned}
$$

where

$$
\bar{h}\left(I, p_{I}\right):=\frac{1}{2 \pi} \int_{0}^{2 \pi} h\left(I, \varphi, p_{I}, \varepsilon=0\right) \mathrm{d} \varphi=\frac{1}{2 \pi} \int_{0}^{2 \pi} \frac{K_{0}-1}{\omega}\left(I, \varphi, p_{I}, p_{\varphi}=0, \varepsilon=0\right) \mathrm{d} \varphi .
$$

Let

$$
\bar{S}\left(s_{f}, p_{0}\right)=\left(\bar{I}\left(s_{f}, p_{0}\right)-I_{f}, \bar{h}\left(I_{0}, p_{0}\right)\right)
$$

be the shooting function associated with the average dynamic

$$
\frac{\mathrm{d} \bar{z}}{\mathrm{~d} s}=\overrightarrow{\vec{h}}(\bar{z}(s)), \quad \bar{z}=\left(\bar{I}, \bar{p}_{I}\right)
$$

Remark 4. $\bar{h}$ is smooth outside $\bar{\Sigma}$ where

$$
\Sigma=\left\{\left(I, p_{I}, \varphi\right) \in T^{*} M \times S^{1} \mid p_{I} \cdot F_{i}\left(I, \varphi, p_{I}, \varepsilon\right)=0, i=1,2,3\right\}
$$

in

$$
\bar{\Sigma}=\Pi(\Sigma), \quad \Pi: T^{*} M \times S^{1} \rightarrow T^{*} M
$$

For $\varepsilon>0$, consider

$$
S_{\varepsilon}\left(s_{f}, p_{0}\right)=\left(I\left(s_{f}, p_{0}\right)-I_{f}, \bar{h}\left(I_{0}, p_{0}\right)\right)
$$

be the shooting function associated with the non-average dynamic

$$
\frac{\mathrm{d} z}{\mathrm{~d} s}=\vec{h}(s / \varepsilon, z(s), \varepsilon), \quad z=\left(I, p_{I}\right) .
$$

Remark 5. Note that solutions of $S_{\varepsilon}\left(s_{f}, p_{0}\right)=0$ doesn't define strict extremals in the sense that the true conditions

$$
h\left(\varphi_{0}, z_{0}, \varepsilon\right)=h\left(\varphi_{f}, z_{f}, \varepsilon\right)=0
$$

are replace by

$$
\bar{h}\left(z_{0}\right)=0 .
$$

They are called "quasi-extremals".

Theorem 6. Let $\left(I^{\varepsilon}(.)\right)_{\varepsilon}$ be a family of non average trajectories (with "quasiextremals" lifts) converging as $\varepsilon \rightarrow 0$ with fixed extremities $I_{0}, I_{f}$. Then the limit is solution of the average boundary value problem.

Theorem 7. Let $\bar{I}($.$) be a trajectory of the average system which doesn't have$ conjugate points.
Then, there exists a family of non average trajectories $\left(I^{\varepsilon}(.)\right)_{\varepsilon}$ converging to $\bar{I}($.$) as$ $\varepsilon \rightarrow 0$ satisfying the boundary values: $I^{\varepsilon}(0)=I_{0}$ and $I^{\varepsilon}\left(t_{f}\right)=I_{f}+O(\varepsilon)$ and under further assumptions, there exists $\left(\varphi_{0}, p_{0}\right)$ s.t.

$$
h\left(\varphi_{0}, z(0), \varepsilon\right)=0 \quad \text { and } \quad h\left(s_{f} / \varepsilon+\varphi_{0}, z\left(s_{f}\right), \varepsilon\right)=0
$$

Remark 8. Numerical use: The solution of the average system can be used to initialize the shooting function of the non average system.

Lemma 9. Let $f: \mathbb{R}^{n} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}^{n}$ be a continuously differentiable function with a regular zero at $x=0$, and let $f_{\varepsilon}: \mathbb{R}^{n} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}^{n}, \varepsilon>0$, be continuous functions converging uniformly towards $f$ on a neighborhood of the origin when $\varepsilon \rightarrow 0$.
There exists $\varepsilon_{0}>0$ and $x:\left[0, \varepsilon_{0}\right] \rightarrow \mathbb{R}^{n}$ continuous at $\varepsilon=0$, s.t. $x(0)=0$ and

$$
f_{\varepsilon}(x(\varepsilon))=0, \quad \varepsilon \in\left(0, \varepsilon_{0}\right] .
$$

Proof of the convergence Theorem 7. Let $\left(\bar{s}_{f}, \bar{p}_{0}\right)$ the solution of the average system $\left(\bar{S}\left(\bar{s}_{f}, \bar{p}_{0}\right)=0\right)$.

1. Apply Lemma 9 with $f=\bar{S}$ and $f_{\varepsilon}=S_{\varepsilon}$. Then there exists $p_{0}(\varepsilon) \rightarrow \bar{p}_{0}$ s.t. $\bar{h}\left(I_{0}, p_{0}(\varepsilon)\right)=0$.
2. Assume

$$
\exists \bar{\varphi}_{0} \in S^{1}, \quad h\left(\bar{\varphi}_{0}, \bar{z}_{0}, \varepsilon=0\right)=0, \quad \frac{\partial h}{\partial \varphi}\left(\bar{\varphi}_{0}, \bar{z}_{0}, \varepsilon=0\right) \neq 0, \quad\left(\bar{z}_{0}=\left(I_{0}, \bar{p}_{0}\right)\right)
$$

we construct $\varphi_{0}(p, \varepsilon)$ and we apply again Lemma 9 with $S_{\varepsilon}\left(\varphi_{0}, s_{f}, p_{0}\right)$ associated to

$$
\frac{\mathrm{d} z}{\mathrm{~d} s}=\vec{h}\left(s / \varepsilon+\varphi_{0}, z(s), \varepsilon\right)
$$

to satisfy the condition $\boldsymbol{h}\left(\varphi_{0}, z(0), \varepsilon\right)=0$ for the non average extremals.
3. Assume
$\exists \bar{\varphi}_{f} \in S^{1}, \quad h\left(\bar{\varphi}_{f}, \bar{z}_{f}, \varepsilon=0\right)=0, \quad \frac{\partial h}{\partial \varphi}\left(\bar{\varphi}_{f}, \bar{z}_{f}, \varepsilon=0\right) \neq 0, \quad\left(\bar{z}_{f}=\bar{z}\left(\bar{s}_{f}, p_{0}\right)\right)$,
we construct $\varphi_{f}(\varepsilon)$ (Brouwer fix point theorem) and consider

$$
\widetilde{s}_{f}(\varepsilon)=s_{f}(\varepsilon)+\varepsilon \varphi_{f}(\varepsilon)
$$

so that

$$
h\left(\widetilde{s}_{f} / \varepsilon+\varphi_{0}, z\left(\widetilde{s}_{f}\right), \varepsilon\right)=0 \text { and } I\left(\widetilde{s}_{f}\right)=I_{f}+O(\varepsilon)
$$


(red) Some average orbits of the average system.
(blue) Non average trajectory in Cartesian coordinates.

Finsler norm $\mathcal{F}: T M \rightarrow \mathbf{R}$ smooth on $T M \backslash 0$ s.t.

- $\mathcal{F}(x, \lambda v)=\lambda \mathcal{F}(x, v), \lambda>0$
- $\partial^{2} \mathcal{F}^{2}(x, v) / \partial v^{2}>0$

Finsler co-norm $\quad F^{*}: T^{*} M \rightarrow \mathbf{R}$ smooth on $T^{*} M \backslash 0$ s.t.

- $F^{*}(x, \lambda p)=\lambda F^{*}(x, p), \lambda>0$,
- $\partial^{2}\left(F^{*}\right)^{2}(x, p) / \partial p^{2}>0$

Theorem 10. If rang $\left\{\partial^{j} F_{i}(I, \varphi, \varepsilon=0) / \partial \varphi^{j}, i=1, \ldots, 3, j \geq 0\right\}=6$, then $\bar{K}_{0}$ defined a symmetric Finsler co-norm.

$\mathcal{F}_{0}$ Symmetric Finsler norm
$\mathcal{F}$ Non-symmetric Finsler norm

## Earth oblateness perturbation

$$
\begin{aligned}
H & =p_{\varphi} \omega(I)+\varepsilon_{J_{2}} H_{0}\left(I, p_{I}, \varphi\right)+\varepsilon_{t h} K_{0}\left(I, p_{I}, \varphi, p_{\varphi}, \varepsilon\right) \\
& =p_{\varphi} \omega(I)+\varepsilon[\underbrace{\lambda H_{0}\left(I, p_{I}, \varphi\right)+(1-\lambda) K_{0}\left(I, p_{I}, \varphi, p_{\varphi}, \varepsilon\right)}_{K^{\lambda}\left(I, p_{I}, \varphi, p_{\varphi}, \varepsilon\right)}] \\
& =p_{\varphi} \omega(I)+\varepsilon \quad
\end{aligned}
$$

where $\varepsilon=\varepsilon_{J 2}+\varepsilon_{t h}, \lambda=\varepsilon_{J 2} / \varepsilon$.
We denote by $\bar{K}^{\lambda}$ the average of $K^{\lambda}$ w.r.t. $\varphi$.

Lemma 11. For $I \in M$ fixed, consider the (unique) one-form $\bar{F}_{0}^{\star, \lambda}(I)$ solution of

$$
\bar{F}_{0}^{\star, \lambda}(I)=\underset{p \in \mathbb{R}^{n}}{\operatorname{argmin}}\left[1 / 2(1-\lambda)^{2} \bar{K}_{0}(I, p)^{2}-\lambda\left\langle p, \bar{F}_{0}(I)\right\rangle\right] .
$$

Proposition 12. Let $I \in M$ fixed and $\lambda_{c}$ s.t. $\bar{K}_{0}^{\lambda_{c}}\left(I, \bar{F}_{0}^{\lambda_{c} \star}(I)\right)=1$. For all $\lambda<\lambda_{c}$,

$$
T_{I}^{\star} M \ni p \mapsto \bar{K}^{\lambda}(I, p) \in \mathbb{R}^{+}
$$

is a Finsler co-norm (non-symmetric).
Proposition 13. $\lambda_{c}$ can be computed as

$$
\lambda_{c}(I)=\frac{1}{\bar{K}_{0}\left(I, p^{\star}\right)+1},
$$

where $p^{\star}=\left\langle\pi^{\star}, \bar{F}_{0}(I)\right\rangle \pi^{\star}, \pi^{\star}=\underset{\pi \mid \bar{K}_{0}(I, \pi)=1}{\operatorname{argmax}}\left\langle\pi, \bar{F}_{0}(I)\right\rangle$

Let $I_{f}$ be a fixed extremity. We construct $I_{0}$ by integrating the uncontrolled flow on $\left[0, \tau_{d}\right]$.


## Boundary value problems

Average BVP
Extremal system $\bar{K}^{\lambda}$
Free parameters $\lambda, \tau_{d}$
Boundary values $I(0)=I_{0}, I\left(\tau_{f}\right)=I_{f}$

\bar{K}^{\lambda}=1
$$

$$
\begin{aligned}
& H / \varepsilon=K^{\lambda}+p_{\varphi} \omega(I, \varphi) / \varepsilon \\
& \lambda, \tau_{d}, \varepsilon \\
& I(0)=I_{0}, I\left(t_{f}\right)=I_{f} \\
& p_{\varphi}(0)=0, p_{\varphi}\left(t_{f}\right)=0, H=\varepsilon
\end{aligned}
$$

Settings We take $\varepsilon$ small and analyze the dependance on $\lambda$ when $\tau_{d} \rightarrow 0$ for both systems.


Curves $\lambda \mapsto \tau_{f}(\lambda)$ where $\tau_{d} \in\{1 \mathrm{e}-2,1 \mathrm{e}-3,1 \mathrm{e}-4,1 \mathrm{e}-5\}$ for the average system.


Minimum time w.r.t. to $\lambda$ for the average system and its derivative w.r.t. $\lambda$.


Curves $\lambda \rightarrow \tau_{f}$ for the average and non average system where $\varepsilon=10^{-3}$ et $\tau_{d} \in\{1 \mathrm{e}-4,1 \mathrm{e}-5\}$.

- relate the metric property to controllabilty property
- continuity of the value function at the critical value $\lambda_{c}$.
- averaging with several angles (and other perturbations): resonances
