

- Better small-scale representation : have explicit formulations and interpretations (*v.s. parametrization with ad hoc tuning*)
- Physical consistency : respect a set of conservation laws (*e.g.* energy, circulation) (*v.s. arbitrary Gaussian forcing*)
- Useful in uncertainty quantification (UQ) : provide more reliable ensemble forecasts (EF) and more efficient spread for ensemble data assimilation (*v.s. perturbations of initial condition (PIC)*)

#### • Stochastic flow :



• Functional processs :

$$\boldsymbol{\sigma}(\boldsymbol{x},t)\mathrm{d}\boldsymbol{B}_t = \int_{arOmega} \breve{\boldsymbol{\sigma}}(\boldsymbol{x},\boldsymbol{y},t)\mathrm{d}\boldsymbol{B}_t(\boldsymbol{y})\mathrm{d}\boldsymbol{y}$$

 $B_t$  is a cyclindrical Wiener process of infinite dimension (in some Hilbert space) and  $\breve{\sigma}$  is deterministic symmetric kernel

• Covariance operator :

$$Q(\boldsymbol{x}, \boldsymbol{y}, t, s) = \mathbb{E} \Big[ \boldsymbol{\sigma}(\boldsymbol{x}, t) \mathrm{d} \boldsymbol{B}_t \big( \boldsymbol{\sigma}(\boldsymbol{y}, s) \mathrm{d} \boldsymbol{B}_s \big)^T \Big]$$
$$= \delta(t - s) \mathrm{d} t \int_{\Omega} \boldsymbol{\breve{\sigma}}(\boldsymbol{x}, \boldsymbol{z}, t) \boldsymbol{\breve{\sigma}}^T(\boldsymbol{y}, \boldsymbol{z}, s) \mathrm{d} \boldsymbol{z}$$

• Variance tensor (per unit of time) :

$$\boldsymbol{a}(\boldsymbol{x},t) = \frac{Q(\boldsymbol{x},t)}{\mathrm{d}t} = \boldsymbol{\sigma}\boldsymbol{\sigma}^{\mathrm{T}}(\boldsymbol{x},t)$$

• Turbulent Kinetic Energy (TKE) :

$$\text{TKE} = \frac{1}{2} \frac{\text{tr}(\boldsymbol{a})}{\text{d}t} \quad (m^2 \cdot s^{-2})$$


#### Stochastic Reynolds Transport Theorem (SRTT)

We assume that  $\nabla \cdot \boldsymbol{\sigma} = 0$  in the following.

• Rate of change of a scalar process  $\theta$  within a volume transported by the stochastic flow :

$$\mathrm{d}\int_{\mathcal{V}^{(t)}} \theta(\boldsymbol{x},t) \mathrm{d}\boldsymbol{x} = \int_{\mathcal{V}^{(t)}} (\mathbf{D}_{\boldsymbol{t}} \theta + \theta \, \boldsymbol{\nabla} \boldsymbol{\cdot} \, \boldsymbol{w}^{\star}) \mathrm{d}\boldsymbol{x}$$

Stochastic transport operator :



 $w^{\star}$ : corrected drift – effect of statistical inhomogeneity of the small-scale flow component; generalization of the Stokes drift *IBauer, Chandramouli, Chapron, Li & Mémin 2019al* 

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#### Conservation Laws

We assume that  $\nabla \cdot \boldsymbol{w}^{\star} = 0$  in the following.

• Conservation of extensive scalar :

$$D_t \theta = 0$$

• Conservation of tracer energy : [Resseguier, Memin & Chapron, 2017a]

$$d\int_{\Omega} \frac{1}{2}\theta^{2} = \int_{\Omega} \theta d_{t}\theta + \frac{1}{2} d\langle\theta\rangle_{t}$$
$$= \int_{\Omega} \frac{1}{2}\theta^{2} \nabla \cdot (\boldsymbol{w}^{\star} dt + \boldsymbol{\sigma} d\boldsymbol{B}_{t}) = 0$$

• Energy decomposition of mean and variance fields :

$$0 = \frac{\mathrm{d}}{\mathrm{d}t} \int_{\varOmega} \frac{1}{2} (\mathbb{E}[\theta])^2 + \frac{\mathrm{d}}{\mathrm{d}t} \int_{\varOmega} \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{Var}[\theta]$$



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#### Stochastic Barotropic Vorticity Equation (SBVE)

• Forced-dissipative advection of the potential vorticity (PV) q with source process :

$$D_t q = (\mathbf{S}_1 + F + D) dt + \mathbf{S}_2 d\mathbf{B}_t$$
$$S_1 = \frac{1}{2} \sum_{i,j=1,2} \partial_{ij}^2 (\mathbf{\nabla}^{\perp} a_{ij} \cdot \mathbf{u}), \qquad S_2 d\mathbf{B}_t = -\mathrm{tr} \left( \mathbf{\nabla}^{\perp} (\boldsymbol{\sigma} d\mathbf{B}_t)^T \mathbf{\nabla} \mathbf{u}^T \right)$$

• Kinematic relationship between PV and stream function  $\psi$  :

$$q = \nabla^2 \psi + f, \quad \boldsymbol{u} = \boldsymbol{\nabla}^{\perp} \psi$$

• Conservation of kinetic energy in the absence of D and F: [Bauer, Chandramouli, Chapron, Li & Mémin 2019a]

$$\frac{\mathrm{d}}{\mathrm{d}t} \int_{\Omega} \frac{1}{2} \|\boldsymbol{\nabla}\psi\|^2 = 0$$


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#### Parametrizations of Noise

• Homogeneous in space Stationary in time : [Resseguier, Memin & Chapron, 2017b]



• Homogeneous Non-stationary : [Resseguier, Li, Jouan, Derian, Mémin & Chapron, 2019] Based on estimation of the absolute diffusivity spectral density (ADSD).


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#### Parametrizations of Noise


• Heterogeneous Stationary : [Chandramouli, Mémin, Chapron & Heitz 2019b]

Based on snapshot proper orthogonal decomposition (POD) method from data




#### Parametrizations of Noise


• Heterogeneous Non-stationary [Li, Bauer, & Mémin 2019] : On-line learning 'Pseudo-observations' from effective resolution





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
#### • Results predicted by DNS simulation :












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#### Short-term Verification of Ensemble Forecasts


Observed samples are the filtered DNS PV at each grid point; Ensemble simulations are performed with 30 particles from t = 0 to t = 30, starting from the (perturbed) filtered DNS.



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#### **Ensemble Spreads**



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#### Rank histogram

( How well does the ensemble spread of the forecast represent the true uncertainty of the observations )  $% \left( {{{\rm{D}}_{{\rm{s}}}}_{{\rm{s}}}} \right)$ 


Flat : ensemble represent well the observed probability distribution;

U-shaped : ensemble spread too small, many observations falling outside the extremes of the ensemble;

**Dome-shaped** : ensemble spread too large, most observations falling near the center of the ensemble;

Asymmetric : ensemble contains bias.

#### Reliability of Ensemble Forecasts




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#### Reliability of Ensemble Forecasts

• The mean squared error (MSE) of the ensemble mean forecasts is identical to the average intra-ensemble sample variance (VAR), multiplied by an ensemble-size N – dependent inflation factor :



• Other UQ metrics [Resseguier, Li, Jouan, Derian, Mémin & Chapron, 2019] : Continuous ranked probability score (CRPS), Energy score, Variogram score.

- Better eddy representation based on stochastic tranport;
- Capture better on a coarse mesh the correct long-term time-statistics;
- Spread is more accurate compared to PIC.
