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Improving MCMC convergence diagnostic: a local version of *R*

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- (MCMC) is crucial in Bayesian analysis.
- different initial values.

M chains of size *N*, and $\theta^{(m,n)}$ the *n*th draw from chain *m*. Comparison of the **between-variance** *B* and the **withinvariance** *W* of the chains: if $(\bar{\theta}^{(.,m)}, s_m^2)$ is the mean and variance of $\theta^{(n,m)}$, and $\bar{\theta}^{(.,.)}$ the mean of $\bar{\theta}^{(.,m)}$,

 $\overline{\hat{\mathsf{B}}}$ on indicator variables $\mathbb{I}\{\theta^{(n,m)} \leq x\} \in \{0,1\}$ for a given quantile *x*.

Ways of fooling *R* $\hat{\mathsf{R}}$ **and improvements [2]**

- \bullet Chains with same mean and different variances: \hat{R} ≈ 1 \hookrightarrow **Bulk-** \hat{R} $\hat{\mathsf{B}}$: *R* $\hat{\mathsf{B}}$ on $z^{(n,m)}$, the normally transformed ranks of $\theta^{(m,n)}$.
- \bullet Chains with infinite mean and different locations: \hat{R} \hookrightarrow **Tail-** \hat{R} $\hat{\mathsf{B}}$: *R* $\hat{\mathsf{B}}$ on $\zeta^{(n,m)}$, the deviations from the median.

Assume chain *m* has stationary distribution *Fm*. As $\mathbb{E}[\mathbb{I}\{\theta^{(n,m)} \leq x\}] = F_m(x)$, and $\text{Var}\left[\mathbb{I}\{\theta^{(n,m)} \leq x\}\right]$ within-variance $W(x)$ and between-variance $B(x)$

 \implies population version of \hat{R} $\hat{\mathsf{B}}$ (*x*) is \hat{R} on $\mathbb{I}\left\{ \right.$ *θ* (*n,m*) $\mathbb{C}^{(n,m)}_1 \leq x_1, \ldots, \theta$ (*n,m*) $\frac{d^{(n,m)}}{d} \leq x_d$ \bigcap .

- Eq. (1) remains valid for $R(\boldsymbol{x})$ with $\boldsymbol{x} = (x_1, \ldots, x_d)$. • Invariance to reparametrization: if margins are equal, we can assume uniform margins and compute *R*(*x*) on *M* copulas (instead of *M* CDFs).

- *,*→ Two-step algorithm for multivariate diagnostic:
- 1.Compute the univariate *R* coordinate *i*.
- 2.If *R* $\hat{\mathsf{B}}$ $\alpha_{\infty,i}$ < 1.01 for all *i*, compute the multivariate *R* $\hat{\mathsf{B}}$ [∞] to check convergence of the dependence structure.

• Detects (non-)convergence at different quantiles, •Bernoulli variables =⇒ all moments exist (no

• Detects many false negatives.

Fooling rank-*R* $\hat{\mathsf{R}}$ **, robustness of** *R* $\hat{\mathsf{R}}$ ∞

Idea: find two distributions such that the variables $z^{(n,m)}$ and $\zeta^{(n,m)}$ share the same mean, to fool Bulk-*R* $\hat{\mathsf{B}}$ and Tail-*R* $\hat{\mathsf{B}}$ at the same time \implies Rank- \hat{R} < $\hat{\mathsf{B}}$ 1*.*01, and *R* $\hat{\mathsf{B}}$ $_{\infty} > 1.01.$

\n**Properties: a** > 1, and $R \equiv 1 \iff$ all F_m are equal.

•*R*[∞] invariant with respect to reparameterisation.

Multivariate extension

Idea: compute *R*

Corollary: if *W^d* and *M^d* are the lower and upper Fréchet– Hoeffding copulas in dimension *d*,

(C_1, C_2) \le R_\infty(W_d, M_d) = \sqrt{\frac{d+1}{2}}.
