Model definition

Self-replicator model



The model represents three chemical macroreactions between substrate (S), precursors (P), genetic machinery/ribosomes (R), metabolic machinery (M) and produced metabolite (X):

Model definition

Continuous stirred-tank reactor dynamics

In terms of concentrations s, p, r, x (and using m + r = 1) in the CSTR,

$$S_{1}: \begin{cases} \dot{s} = D(s_{in} - s) - v_{M}(s, 1 - r)\mathcal{V}, \\ \dot{p} = v_{M}(s, 1 - r) - v_{X}(p, 1 - r) - \mu(p, r)(p + 1), \\ \dot{r} = (u - r)\mu(p, r), \\ \dot{x} = v_{X}(p, 1 - r)\mathcal{V} - Dx, \\ \dot{\mathcal{V}} = (\mu(p, r) - D)\mathcal{V}, \end{cases}$$

where \mathscr{V} is the volume of the cell population, D is the dilution rate, s_{in} is the substrate inflow, and

$$\mu(p,r) := \beta v_R(p,r)$$

 $(\beta =$ inverse of cytoplasmic density) is the growth rate of the bacterial population.

Assumption. The synthesis rates v_M , v_R and v_X are monotone increasing kinetics (e.g. Michaelis-Menten, $v_R(p, r) := k_R r p / (K_R + p)$) and

$$v_X(p,1-r)=c(r)\,v_R(p,r).$$

Mass conservation

Proposition. The set

$$\mathsf{\Gamma} = \left\{ \left(\textit{s},\textit{p},\textit{r},\textit{x},\mathscr{V} \right) \in \mathsf{R}^5 \, : \, \textit{s}_{\textit{in}} \geq \textit{s} \geq \textit{0}, \textit{p} \geq \textit{0}, \textit{x} \geq \textit{0}, \textit{1} \geq \textit{r} \geq \textit{0}, \mathscr{V} \geq \textit{0} \right\}$$

is positively invariant for the initial value problem.

We assume $\mathscr{V}(0) > 0$ and r(0) > 0 (no growth otherwise).

Proposition. The ω -limit set of any solution of system S_1 with constant input $u(t) = \overline{u}$ lies in the set

$$\Omega := \left\{ (s, p, r, x, \mathscr{V}) \in \mathbf{R}^5 : s + \left(p + \frac{r}{\overline{u}}\right) \mathscr{V} + x = s_{in} \right\}.$$

This result is used to define a limit system and reduce the dimension by two.

Limiting system

As $r(t) \rightarrow \overline{u}$ when $t \rightarrow \infty$ and since x can be eliminated (Ω), we define

where

We study the local and global stability properties of this reduced system.

Local stability

Theorem. Define

$$\overline{f}(p) := \overline{v}_R(p) + \overline{v}_X(p) + \overline{\mu}(p)p = \overline{\mu}(p)(p + \overline{c} + 1),$$

and let p_w be the solution of $\overline{f}(p) = \overline{v}_M(s_{in})$. Then,

- If $\overline{\mu}(p_w) \geq D$:
 - The interior equilibrium E_i exists, is unique and locally stable.
 - The washout equilibrium E_w exists, is unique and locally unstable.
- If $\overline{\mu}(p_w) < D$:
 - The interior equilibrium E_i does not exist.
 - The washout equilibrium E_w exists, is unique and locally stable.
- ▶ The interior equilibrium $E_i := (s_i, p_i, \mathscr{V}_i)$ with

$$\overline{\mu}(p_i) = D, \quad \overline{\nu}_M(s_i) = \overline{f}(p_i), \quad \mathscr{V}_i := \frac{D(s_{in} - s_i)}{\overline{\nu}_M(s_i)}.$$

• The washout equilibrium is $E_w := (s_{in}, p_w, 0)$.

Sketch of proof. If $\overline{\mu}(p_w) \ge D$,

Global analysis

Proposition. The ω -limit set of any solution of the limiting system S'_1 lies in the set

As $s = s_{in} - \mathscr{V}(p + \overline{c} + 1)$, one can further reduce S_1' to

$$S_1'': \begin{cases} \dot{p} = \overline{v}_M(s(\cdot)) - \overline{\mu}(p)(p + \overline{c} + 1), \\ \dot{\mathscr{V}} = (\overline{\mu}(p) - D)\mathscr{V}. \end{cases}$$

Proposition. Every solution of the limiting system S_1'' converges to

• $E_i^* := (p_i, \mathscr{V}_i)$ if $\overline{\mu}(p_w) \ge D$, • $E_w^* := (p_w, 0)$ if $\overline{\mu}(p_w) < D$.

Sketch of proof. Bendixson-Dulac criterion allows to discard periodic orbits and cycles of equilibria as

Results on asymptotically autonomous systems (Thieme'92) eventually allow to relate the asymptotic behaviour of the 2-dimensional limiting system S_1'' to the behaviour of the full 5-dimensional system S_1 .

Theorem. Every solution of system S_1 converges to

▶ the extended interior equilibrium $\hat{E}_i := (s_i, p_i, \overline{u}, x_i, \mathscr{V}_i), x_i := \overline{c} \mathscr{V}_i$, if $\overline{\mu}(p_w) \ge D$,

▶ the extended washout equilibrium $\hat{E}_w := (s_{in}, p_w, \overline{u}, 0, 0)$ otherwise.

Metabolite production

Maximisation of the metabolite X is considered over a finite time horizon:

maximize
$$D \mathscr{V}_{\text{ext}} \int_0^T x(t) dt$$
,

resorting to $(q := (s, p, r, x, \mathscr{V}) \in \mathbf{R}^5)$

$$(OCP): \begin{cases} \text{maximize} & \int_0^T x(t) dt \\ \text{subject to} & \dot{q}(t) = F(q(t), u(t)), \\ & q(0) = q_0, \quad q(T) \text{ free}, \\ & u(t) \in [0, 1]. \end{cases}$$

Proposition. Existence holds.

Extremal flow

We write the (normal) Hamiltonian in terms of state $q := (s, p, r, x, \mathscr{V})$ and costate $\lambda := (\lambda_s, \lambda_p, \lambda_r, \lambda_x, \lambda_{\mathscr{V}})$:

$$H(q,\lambda,u) = -\lambda^0 x + \langle \lambda, F(q,u) \rangle,$$

where F is the right-hand side of S_1 . As the dynamics is control-affine, $H = H_0 + uH_1$ with

$$\begin{aligned} H_0 &= \lambda_s \left(D(s_{in} - s) - v_M(s, 1 - r) \mathscr{V} \right) + \lambda_p \left(v_M(s, 1 - r) - v_X(p, 1 - r) - \mu(p, r)(p + 1) \right) \\ &- r \lambda_r \mu(p, r) + \lambda_x (v_X(p, 1 - r) \mathscr{V} - Dx) + \lambda_{\mathscr{V}} (\mu(p, r) - D) \mathscr{V} - \lambda^0 x, \\ H_1 &= \lambda_r \mu(p, r). \end{aligned}$$

By virtue of Pontrjagin's maximum principle, a.e. one has

and the control is singular if H_1 vanishes along a whole subarc.

Singular arcs

Along a singular arc

$$0 = \dot{H_1} = \frac{\partial H_1}{\partial q} \dot{q} + \frac{\partial H_1}{\partial \lambda} \dot{\lambda} = \sum_{i=1}^n \left(\frac{\partial H}{\partial \lambda_i} \frac{\partial H_1}{\partial q_i} - \frac{\partial H}{\partial q_i} \frac{\partial H_1}{\partial \lambda_i} \right) = \{H, H_1\} = \{H_0, H_1\} := H_{01}$$

and

$$0 = \dot{H}_{01} = H_{001} + uH_{101}.$$

Proposition. Singular arcs are at least of order two.

$$H_{101} = \mu(p, r) \left[\dot{\lambda}_r \mu_r(p, r) + \lambda_r \frac{\partial}{\partial r} \left(\mu_r(p, r) \dot{r} + \mu_p(p, r) \dot{p} \right) \right]$$
$$- \lambda_r \mu_r(p, r) \frac{\partial H_{01}}{\partial \lambda_r} - \lambda_r \mu_p(p, r) \frac{\partial H_{01}}{\partial \lambda_p}$$

which is also equal to 0 when $H_1 = 0$. \Box

In the case of an order two singular control ($H_{\rm 10001}<0$ along the arc, generalized Legendre-Clebsch condition)

$$u = -\frac{H_{00001}}{H_{10001}}$$

Although the order is *local* (H_{101} is not everywhere zero), one expects connection between bang and singular arcs through Fuller phenomenon.

Static optimisation

Metabolite production vs. biomass maximisation

Maximisation is now performed wrt. the static control \overline{u} plus the dilutation rate D of the CSTR:



Proposition. Any solution of the two static problems lies in the region of existence of the interior equilibrium, $\overline{\mu}(p_w) > D$.

Static optimisation

Discussion



- 20% decrease of biomass (V) but 500% increase of produced metabolite (X)
- Difference between static and "gold standard" dynamic optimisation negligible for large fixed final time (<1%)</p>
- Richer models: ubiquity of Fuller and (singular) turnpike phenomena
- Second order conditions in the Fuller case: preliminary approach in Agrachev-Beschastnyi'2020
