Aammary glands (F)

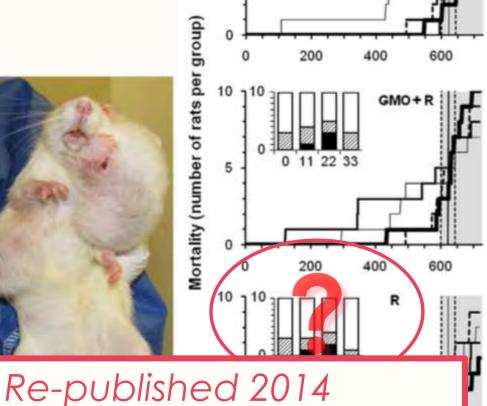

Peer review is fallible

- The peer reviewers' task is not to re-do the work
 - (Whose task is this, really?)
- The editors
 - The peers are not universal experts even in their field
 - The editors urge them to hurry
 - The editors do not request all comments to be eventually addressed
- In any case, peer review will not detect
 - Fabrication or falsification of data / results
 - Plagiarism and other types of inappropriate credit
 - Etc.
- It is still the best quality check one can imagine!
 - Although it can certainly be improved (more openness?)

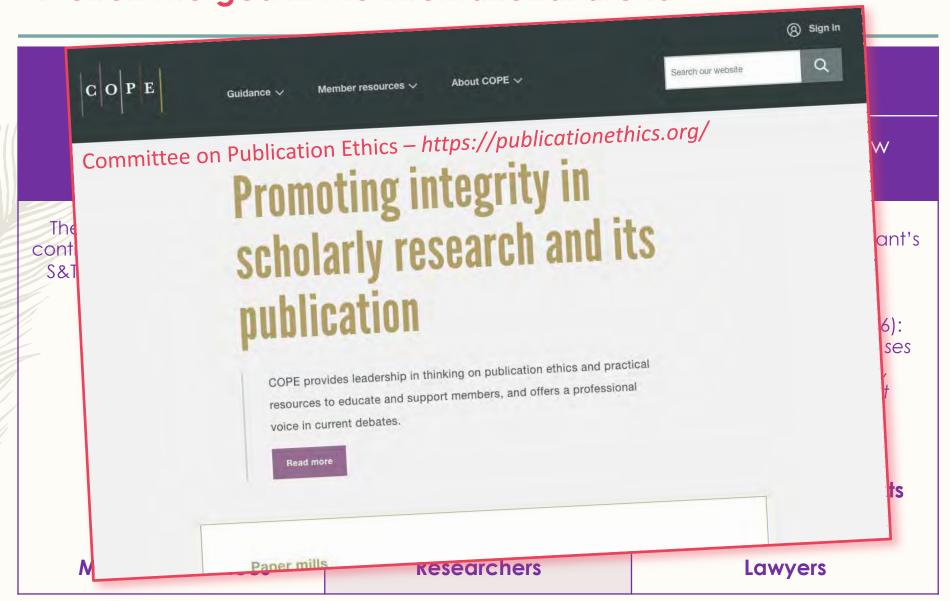

1. Principles

...

Good research practices are based on fundamental principles of research integrity. They guide researchers in their work as well as in their engagement with the practical, ethical and intellectual challenges inherent in research.

These principles are:

- Reliability in ensuring the quality of research, reflected in the design, the methodology, the analysis and the use of resources.
- Honesty in developing, undertaking, reviewing, reporting and communicating research in a transparent, fair, full and unbiased way.
- Respect for colleagues, research participants, society, ecosystems, cultural heritage and the environment.
- Accountability for the research from idea to publication, for its management and organisation, for training, supervision and mentoring, and for its wider impacts.

- 1st version: 2005
- Attempts a POSITIVE definition of Research Integrity
- One that covers all of Scientific Integrity
 - Research Integrity covers more specifically
 - Reliability
 - Accountability

[...] The pixel pattern duplications originate from the incorrect use of image editing software to cover background marks. [...] It involves regions of Figures [...] 61 (TXMV-2b\Delta GFP probe) that are required for assessment of the data.

The identification of 2b as a suppressor of silencing was a valid interpretation of the original experiments, but the original data are not available for correction and the authors accept that integrity of the scientific literature requires retraction of the article. The silencing suppressor role of 2b has been confirmed in different laboratories. The analysis of the HCPro silencing suppressor in this paper is unaffected by the duplications [...]

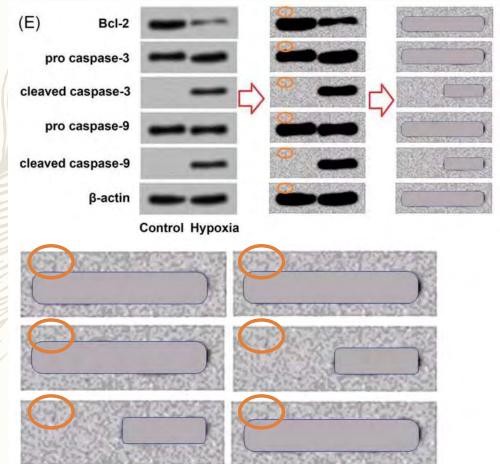

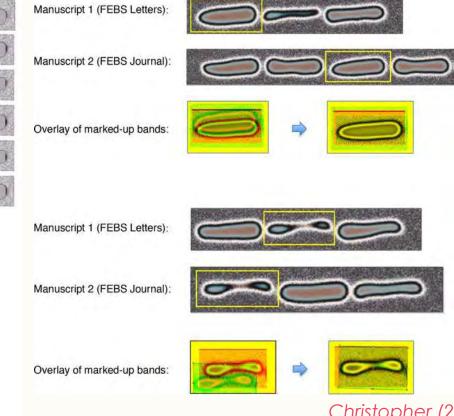

Guidelines for the appropriate use and manipulation of scientific digital images

Ethical guidelines for the appropriate use and manipulation of scientific digital images

- 1. Scientific digital images are data that can be compromised by inappropriate manipulations.
- Manipulation of digital images should only be performed on a copy of the unprocessed image data file (Always keep the original data file safe and unchanged!).
- 3. Simple adjustments to the entire image are usually acceptable.
- 4. Cropping an image is usually acceptable.
- Digital images that will be compared to one another should be acquired under identical conditions, and any post-acquisition image processing should also be identical.
- Manipulations that are specific to one area of an image and are not performed on other areas are questionable.
- Use of software filters to improve image quality is usually not recommended for biological images.
- Cloning or copying objects into a digital image, from other parts of the same image or from a different image, is very questionable.
- Intensity measurements should be performed on uniformly processed image data, and the data should be calibrated to a known standard.
- 10. Avoid the use of lossy compression
- Magnification and <u>resolution</u> are important.
- Be careful when changing the size (in pixels) of a digital image.

Traceability:

 Manipulation of digital images should only be performed on a copy of the unprocessed image data file (Always keep the original data file safe and unchanged!)

Reliability:

- Digital images that will be compared to one another should be acquired and processed under identical conditions
- Intensity measurements should be performed on uniformly processed image data, and the data should be calibrated to a known standard

– (Usually) acceptable:

- Simple adjustments to the entire image
- Cropping

– Questionable:

- Manipulations that are specific to one area of an image
- Use of software filters to improve image quality (compression, sharpness, etc.)
- Cloning or copying objects from other parts of the same image or from a different image

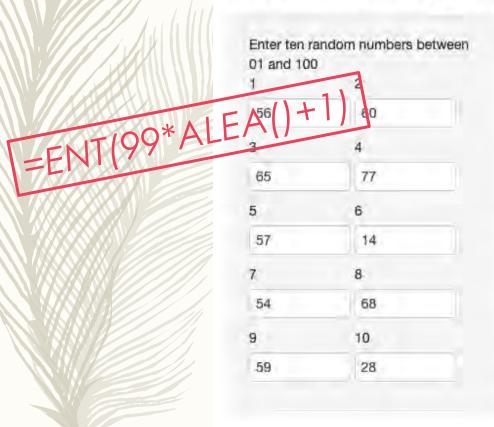

An Exact Fishy Test



Unbelievable!

You chose the numbers 56 60 65 77 57 14 54 68 59 28

But these are clearly not random numbers. We can tell because random numbers do not contain patterns but the numbers you entered show a fairly obvious pattern.

Take another look at the sequence you put in. You will see that the number of exact multiples of '14' is: 3. But the 'expected number' from a random process is just 0.7. How odd is this pattern? Quite odd in fact. The probability that a truly random process would turn up numbers like this is just p=0.02713 (i.e. less than 3%).

Try again (with really random numbers this time)!

ps: you might think that if the p value calculated above is high (for example if it is greater than 12%) that this means that the numbers you chose are not all that odd; but in fact it means that the numbers are really particularly odd since the probability that the fishy test would produce a p values above 12%, when really random sequences are used, is low (p<0.07). 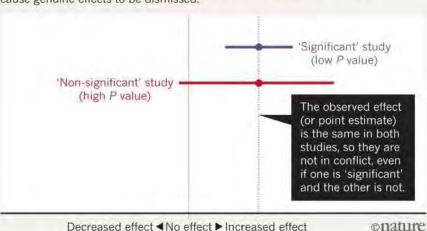
Cure the p<0.05 disease

- discussion of binary outcomes within study and between studies
 - "difference between A and B was significant (p<0.05)"
 - (p=0.07) "borderline significant, approaching significance"...
 - "A and B did not differ (p>0.05)" (not significant...)

BEWARE FALSE CONCLUSIONS

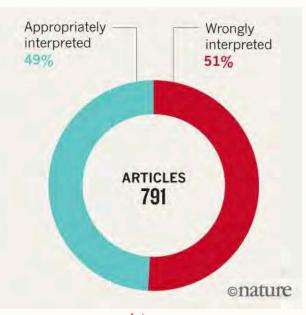
Studies currently dubbed 'statistically significant' and 'statistically non-significant' need not be contradictory, and such designations might cause genuine effects to be dismissed.



WRONG INTERPRETATIONS

An analysis of 791 articles across 5 journals* found that around half mistakenly assume non-significance means no effect.

Authorship & credit: a quintessential issue

- → Actual practices may differ between disciplines
- Every co-author must be ready to account for the entire paper
 - Preferable to define rules in advance
 - Community guidelines may be useful at least as a shared reference
 - e.g. ICMJE's https://rebrand.ly/authorship

Practices differ

- Size
 - Human sciences: often single authors (beware of plagiarism)
 - Physics: sometimes very big consortia (how can solidarity prevail?)
- Order
 - Informatics: often alphabetical order (how to address individual credit)
 - Life sciences: each author's position has a meaning according to unwritten rules
- How to credit less formal contributions (research infrastructures?)

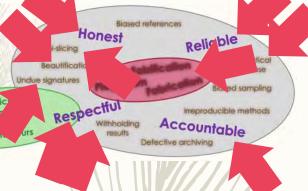

They have been convicted of misconduct, and they say...

- "I did not do it"
 - How dare you?
 - And besides, who are you to put me into this trouble?
- "My results have been reproduced by others"
 - My community know how big a scientist I am
- "My published images are a representation of what I saw"
 - A colony is a colony, a cell is a cell, a band is a band, a background is a background?
- "Put it back in context: at the time, everyone was doing so"
 - That is... everyone in my immediate environment...
 - I learned from my benchmates, because my PI was absent...
- "F[...] the scientific method"
 - It is unethical: quote "the parachute paradigm"
- "Yeah okay maybe I did it, but I intended to soon restore the truth"



Exploring a diversity of misconducts

- A continuum from pure fraud to almost normal behavior
- Motivated by various conditions
 - Publish or perish
 - Sometimes hierarchical injunctions (real or not)
 - Often social / community injunctions (hold the rank)
 - Ease / quickness
 - "More easy to grab controls from other figures than retrieve originals"
 - Ignorance
 - "I represented what I did usually see"









Jan2015: the French Charter

- Covers Scientific Integrity
- Ratified by institutions (8 \rightarrow >60)
- A network of RI officers (4 → >136)
- Jun2016: a 2nd report (Corvol)
 - Graduate schools
 - Ministerial letter to all research operators
- Mar2017: launch of the French Office for RI (OFIS)
- Apr2016: Revision of the LePors act
 - Restricts the Corvol report to Research Integrity sensu stricto
 - Mar2018: Deontology Committee of the Ministry for HE&R
- Dec2020: The research programming act for 2020-30
 - Research integrity enters the French law













- A significant focus on collective prevention / anticipation
 - Except [sometimes] plagiarism and perhaps some authorship matters, RI-related misconduct usually not amenable for lawyers
 - Usually no "victim"
 - Except everybody... since knowledge is a common good
 - Except some colleagues in our "coopetition" system...
 - (similar to doping in sports)
 - This might change with the entry of RI in the French law





The French setup for RI

- A significant focus on collective prevention / anticipation
- Two levels of action in the French set-up for RI
 - Most of all, ensure a shared culture of Integrity
 - Reference texts
 - Coherent with the international landscape
 - e.g. the European Code of Conduct for Research Integrity
 - Trainings
 - At all levels but at least (mandatory) for graduate studies
 - Seminars, etc.
 - Local, national, international
 - **Before all**, treat frauds properly
 - Clear and shared procedures...
 - ... and applied ones!

In the institutions

→ sharing a culture, treating allegations



– 1999: Inserm pioneers

- A resource to prepare the French charter and help other institutions

Recently published: a guide to signatures of scientific publications

2015: the universities join the movement (CPU)

2019: the colleges join as well (CDEFI)

The funding agencies are coming

Ex. ANR ratified the charter, relays its values, punishes frauds

- 2018: CNRS switches gear

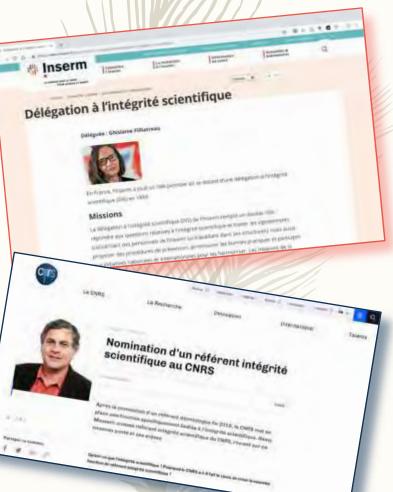
- NB the COMETS has played a historical role

Connects three types of officers

Integrity → French Charter (Jan2015)

Whistleblower → « Sapin 2 » Act (Dec2016)

Deontologist → « Le Pors » Act (1983 revised 2016)

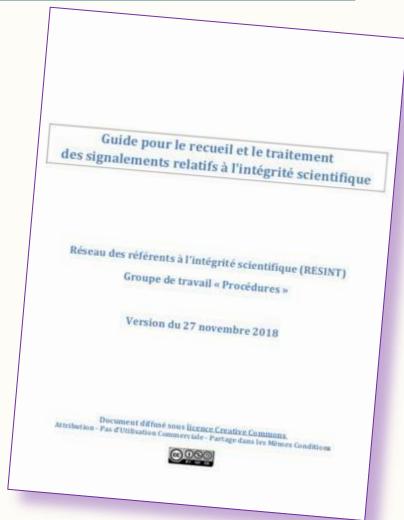

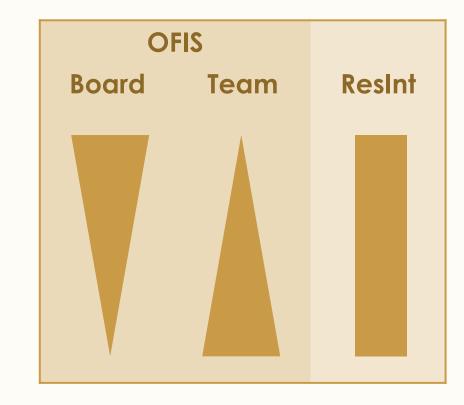

2020: research integrity enters the French law

A definition of research integrity

- An expectation: Research works [...] respect the standards of RI aimed at guaranteeing its honesty and scientifically rigorous character and at consolidating the bond of trust with society
- A definition: RI contributes to guarantee the impartiality of research and the objectivity of its results

An obligation of means for the operators

- They provide the conditions for meeting the RI requirements for the activities and work carried out within them. They put in place the necessary mechanisms to promote the values of the RI and encourage compliance with its requirements. [...] they keep the raw results of the scientific work carried out within them in order to allow their verification.
- They send every other year to [the ministry for research] and to [OFIS] a report on the actions undertaken within the [above] framework.

A mission for Hcéres (i.e. OFIS)

- To contribute to the definition of a national RI policy and promote the harmonization and mutualization of the practices of operators in this field
- To promote RI and make sure it is considered in the evaluation processes of research labs, higher education programs, research organizations, etc.
- An "Hippocrates oath" will be taken during the defense of PhDs



Is this the only possible setup?

→ Certainly not!

e.g. among the 23 ENRIO members in 2019

- 14 have a national body in charge of investigations
 - AT, BE, CH, CZ, DK, ES, FI, HR, IT, LU, NL, NO, SE, SK
- 5 have a national body with other missions (advice, promotion, training, mediation)
 - DE, EI, FR, PL, UK
- 4 are on their way
 - ES, GR, PT, SL
- (Only FR has introduced RI in its national law)

- e.g. North-America

- USA: ORI (1992); NAS-EM (2017, Fostering integrity in research)
 - Long-lasting proposal: to create a Research Integrity Advisory Board
- Canada: CNRC guidelines on RI policy (2018)





- [reminder] A significant focus on collective prevention / anticipation
- For a change in practices and cultural appropriation
 - Harmonize processes: reference documents, recommendations
 - Mutualize returns of experience: a shared referential of misconducts and good practices
 - Education: mutualize, innovate
 - Promote the values of RI: to speak about it
 - Promote a research environment favoring integer science: fair, adequate and transparent evaluation criteria
 - Integrate the challenge of open science: opportunities and risks of opening practices, data and publications







A few words to conclude

- Science is (the archetype of) integrity
 - Finsured by a long-proven approach: the integral application of the scientific method
- However some situations questioned this evidence publicly
 - And rightly so
- Research Integrity
 - Part of Scientific Integrity / distinct from Research Ethics
 - Carries a *positive* connotation
 - Is not the mere lack of absence of integrity (fraud)
- Fraud is probably very rare
 - But emergence of a kind of "industrialization"?
 - But a "grey area" of misconducts of unknown size, and very diverse
- Renovation of basic processes of research are possible and needed
 - Evaluation
 - Publication
 - Opening FAIR data
- The French ecosystem has been organizing itself in the last years to face these challenges
 - Still some way to go!
