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A Result on Controllability with Constrained Controls

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Motivation

Control system with state x in smooth $\mathcal M$ of dimension n:

$$(\Sigma^{U}): \dot{x} = X^{0}(x) + \sum_{k=1}^{m} u_{k} X^{k}(x), \quad u = (u_{1} \dots u_{m}) \in U \subset \mathbb{R}^{m},$$

Theorem (Bonnard, 1981, see also Crouch, Brockett...)

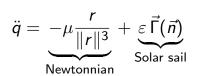
System (Σ^U) is controllable if

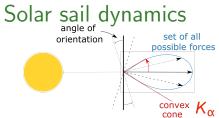
- (i) the vector field X^0 is Poisson stable,
- (ii) the convex hull of the set U is a neighbourhood of 0 in \mathbb{R}^m ,
- (iii) the family $\{X^0, X^1, \dots, X^m\}$ is bracket generating.

What if $0 \in \partial(\text{conv } U)$ instead of (ii)?

Keeping (i), or even: all solutions of $\dot{x} = X^0(x)$ are periodic, assuming U convex for simplicity.

What instead of (iii)?





 \vec{n} : orientation of the sail (control). Approximation:

$$\ddot{q} = -\mu \frac{r}{\|r\|^3} + \varepsilon u$$
, $u \in K_{\alpha}$ cone, $\alpha < \frac{\pi}{2}$

Gauss equations

(*I*: orbital elements (1st integrals), $\varphi \in \mathbb{S}^1 = \mathbb{R}/2\pi\mathbb{Z}$):

$$\dot{I} = \varepsilon \sum_{k=1}^{m} u_k F^k(I, \varphi),$$
 $u \in U.$ Controllable? $\dot{\varphi} = \omega(I) + \varepsilon \sum_{k=1}^{m} u_k f^k(I, \varphi),$

U convex, bounded. $0 \in U$, $0 \notin$ interior of *U*.

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Obviously,

$$\dot{I} = \varepsilon \sum_{k=1}^{m} u_k F^k(I, \varphi),
\dot{\varphi} = \omega(I) + \varepsilon \sum_{k=1}^{m} u_k f^k(I, \varphi),
u \in U$$

is a special case of

$$(\Sigma^{U}): \dot{x} = X^{0}(x) + \sum_{k=1}^{m} u_{k} X^{k}(x), \quad u = (u_{1} \dots u_{m}) \in U \subset \mathbb{R}^{m},$$

with
$$X^0 = \omega \frac{\partial}{\partial \varphi}$$
:

for any
$$x = (I, \varphi)$$
,

$$t\mapsto \exp(tX^0)(x)$$
 is periodic with period $T(x)=2\pi/\omega(x)$.

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Sufficient condition for controllability

Velocity set:

$$E_0^U(x) = \left\{ \sum_{k=1}^m u_k X^k(x), \ u \in U \right\} \subset T_x \mathcal{M}.$$

Pullback along $t \mapsto \exp(tX^0)(x)$:

$$E_{\tau}^{U}(x) = \left\{ \sum_{k=1}^{m} u_{k} \left(\exp(-\tau X^{0})_{\star} X^{k} \right) (x), \ u \in U \right\} \subset T_{x} \mathcal{M}$$

Theorem

 (Σ^U) is controllable if

- (i) $t \mapsto \exp(tX^0)(x)$ periodic with period T(x) for all x,
- (ii) $0 \in U$,
- (iii) conv $\left(\bigcup_{t\in[0,T(x)]}E_t^U(x)\right)$ is a neighbd of 0 in $T_x\mathcal{M}$ for all x.

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Controllability in prescribed time

$$(\Sigma^U): \dot{x}=X^0(x)+\sum_{k=1}^m u_k X^k(x), \quad u\in U\subset \mathbb{R}^m,$$

Accessible sets:

$$\mathcal{A}_{T}^{U}(x_0) = \{x(T), \text{ with } t \mapsto (x(t), u(t)) \text{ solution of } (\Sigma^{U}), x(0) = x_0\}.$$

Let $t \mapsto \overline{x}(t)$, $[0, t_f] \to \mathcal{M}$ be a solution of $\dot{x} = X^0(x)$.

Theorem

If U bounded convex, and $0 \in U$, and

$$\operatorname{conv}\left(\bigcup_{t\in[0,t_f]}E_t^{U}\!(\overline{x}(0))\right) \text{ is a neighborhood of 0 in } T_{\overline{x}(0)}\mathcal{M} \quad (\mathsf{C})$$

then the set $\mathcal{A}_{t_f}^{\varepsilon U}(\overline{x}(0))$ is a neighborhood of $\overline{x}(t_f)$ for any $\varepsilon > 0$.

This is a 1st order condition

If U is a neighbd of the origin, then (C) is equivalent controllability of the linear approximation, i.e. to

$$\operatorname{\mathsf{Rank}}\{\operatorname{ad}_{X^0}^j X^k,\ k\in\{1,\ldots,m\},\ j\in\mathbb{N}\}=n$$

(at least in the analytic case).

However non classical when U is not a neighbd of 0.

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Linear time-varying controlability with constraint

$$\dot{z} = A(t)z + B(t)v, \quad v \in V, \tag{*}$$

V compact, $0 \in V$.

 $(t_1, t_2) \mapsto \phi(t_2, t_1) \in \mathbb{R}^{d \times d}$ transition matrix.

Theorem (Schmittendorf Barmish 1980)

 $A_{t_o,t_f}^V(0)$ is a neighbourhood of the origin if one of the two following equivalent properties hold.

• For $p \in (\mathbb{R}^d)^*$ (line vector),

$$\left(p\,\phi(t_0,s)\,B(s)v\geq 0 \ \text{ for all } v\in V,\,s\in[t_0,t_f]\right) \ \Rightarrow \ p=0\,.$$

• the convex hull of $\{\phi(t_0,s) B(s)v, s \in [t_0,t_f], v \in V\}$ is a neighbourhood of the origin in \mathbb{R}^d .

Linearize along $t \mapsto \overline{x}(t)$:

$$\dot{\delta x} = \frac{\partial X^0}{\partial x}(\overline{x}(t))\,\delta x + \sum_{1}^{m} \delta u_k \, X^k(\overline{x}(t)) \tag{*}$$

or

$$\dot{\xi} = \sum_{1}^{m} \delta u_k \, \exp(-tX^0)_{\star} X^k(\overline{x}(0)) \,,$$

$$\delta x(t) = \exp(tX^0)'(\overline{x}(0)) \, \xi(t) \,.$$
(*)

with initial condition $\xi(0) = 0$.

Condition (C) is exactly condition for previous linear theorem, hence implies controlability of (*).

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Idea of the proof cont'd

 $\overline{x}(.)$ corresponds to control zero, on the border of U, hence it is difficult to use linear approximation.

However, one may built a family of $t \mapsto x^{\varepsilon}(t)$ and corresponding controls $t \mapsto u^{\varepsilon}(t)$ that remain in the interior of U and satisfy $x^{\varepsilon}(0) = \overline{x}(0)$, $x^{\varepsilon}(t_f) = \overline{x}(t_f)$.

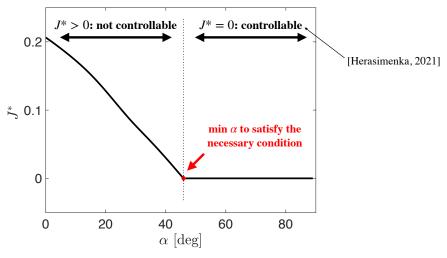
for the linear approximation and for original system.

Then end-point mapping is a submersion around these controls (linear controllability is preserved.

Application to solar sails

In that case, it is also a necessary condition.

Checking condition (C) is more difficult than checking the rank of a family of vector fields: but we manage to set it as convex optimisation problem, computable in that special case.

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Extensions?

If other brackets that $\operatorname{ad}_{X^0}^j X^k$, $j \in \mathbb{N}$ (1st order approximation) are needed for $\{X^0,\ldots,X^m\}$ to be bracket generating, we see no natural extension in terms of a condition of the same type as (C) to replace rank of Lie brackets when U is not a neighborhood of U.

In that case,

$$\operatorname{conv}\left(\bigcup_{t\in[0,t_{\ell}]}E_{t}^{U}(\overline{x}(0))\right)\subset \operatorname{some nontrivial vector} \sup_{t\in[0,t_{\ell}]}E_{t}^{U}(\overline{x}(0))$$

whatever U is.
