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## Social influence

## Standard assumption

"Each individual's preference is independent of the behavior of other agents" $\nu$

Preferences are interdependent.
Classical literature:

- Duesenberry (1949). Relative income hypothesis
- Leibenstein (1950). Comparing consumption
- Conformism. Bandwagon effect. Agents follow the consumption behavior of others.
- Snobism. Agent's desire for exclusiveness.


## Positional concerns

Influence of social context central in modern behavioral econ.


Red Queen effect: Negative consumption externality
Race in conspicuous consumption. Too much expending
Inefficiency $\longrightarrow$ Loss in Social welfare

## Research question

What if the positional good is contribution to a public good?
i) Positional concerns $\Rightarrow$ positive contributions?
if so ...
ii) would it necessary lead to social welfare improvements?

## The one shot model. The static game

- Two players.
- Each player endowed with $w_{i}$ and contributes $x_{i} \in\left[0, w_{i}\right]$ to a public good. Then $w_{i}-x_{i}$ privately consumed.
- Preferences:
intrinsic utility (absolute level of contribution) positional payoffs(associated with relative contribution)

$$
U_{i}\left(x_{i}, x_{j}\right)=u_{i}\left(x_{i}, X\right)+V_{i}\left(x_{i}-x_{j}\right), \quad X=x_{i}+x_{j}
$$

- Global intrinsic utility: $u=u_{i}+u_{j}$
- The global utility or social welfare: $U=U_{i}+U_{j}$.


## The intrinsic utility. Properties

C1 Individual provision always reduces own welfare:

$$
\frac{\partial u_{i}}{\partial x_{i}}\left(x_{i}, X\right)<0, \quad \forall\left(x_{i}, x_{j}\right) \in\left[0, w_{i}\right] \times\left[0, w_{j}\right] .
$$

Nash equilibrium is $(0,0)$.
C2 Individual provision: First unit $\uparrow u$; last unit $\downarrow u$.

$$
C 2 a: \frac{\partial u}{\partial x_{i}}(0,0)>0, \quad C 2 b: \frac{\partial u}{\partial x_{i}}\left(w_{1}, w_{1}+w_{2}\right)<0
$$

Some contribution to the public good and to the private good are socially desirable.
C3 Agents contributions are substitutes

$$
C 3: \frac{\partial^{2} u}{\partial x_{i} \partial X}\left(x_{i}, X\right)<0
$$

## The intrinsic utility + positional concerns

- The intrinsic utility is an additively separable function:

$$
u_{i}\left(x_{i}, X\right)=w_{i}-x_{i}+b_{i}(X), u(X)=w_{1}+w_{2}-X+b_{1}(X)+b_{2}(X)
$$



- Positional payoff

$$
V_{i}\left(x_{i}-x_{j}\right)=v_{i}^{\mathrm{P}} \times\left(x_{i}-x_{j}\right)
$$

Positional concern of player $i: v_{i}^{p} \geq 0$

## Maximization problem

The problem for player $i \in\{1,2\}$ is:

$$
\max _{0 \leq x_{i} \leq w_{i}} w_{i}-x_{i}+b_{i}(X)+v_{i}^{P}\left(x_{i}-x_{j}\right) .
$$

The marginal utility of player $i$ now reads as:

$$
\frac{\partial U_{i}}{\partial x_{i}}=-1+b_{i}^{\prime}(X)+v_{i}^{\mathrm{p}} .
$$

Positionality raises the marginal benefit of private provision.
Private provision can become individually rational for player $i$.

## Nash equilibrium

The FOC condition: $b_{i}^{\prime}(X)=1-v_{i}^{p}$. In equilibrium,

$$
\begin{aligned}
& \text { (1) } v_{i}^{\mathrm{P}}<1 \rightarrow b_{i}^{\prime}(X)>0 \text { : PG. } \\
& \text { (1) } v_{i}^{\mathrm{P}}>1 \rightarrow b_{i}^{\prime}(X)<0 \text { : PB. }
\end{aligned}
$$

Assumption $0 \leq v_{i}^{p}<1$

## Definition (Wished amount)

$$
A_{i}= \begin{cases}0 & \text { if } v_{i}^{\mathrm{p}}<1-\alpha_{i}, \\ \frac{v_{i}^{\mathrm{p}}-\left(1-\alpha_{i}\right)}{\alpha_{i} \varepsilon} & \text { otherwise } \\ w_{i}+w_{j} & \text { if } v_{i}^{\mathrm{p}}>1-\alpha_{i}+\alpha_{i} \varepsilon\left(w_{1}+w_{2}\right) .\end{cases}
$$

Positive contribution $v_{i}^{p}>1-\alpha_{i}$

## Nash equilibrium (continued)

a) If $w_{1}+w_{2} \leq \min \left\{A_{1}, A_{2}\right\}$, then $\left(x_{1}^{\mathrm{N}}, x_{2}^{\mathrm{N}}\right)=\left(w_{1}, w_{2}\right)$.
b) If $w_{1}+w_{2}>\min \left\{A_{1}, A_{2}\right\}$ and
bl) $A_{1}=A_{2}=A>0$, set of Nash equilibria:

$$
\mathcal{N}=\left\{\left(x_{1}, x_{2}\right) \mid x_{1}+x_{2}=A \wedge\left(x_{1}, x_{2}\right) \in\left[0, \min \left\{A, w_{1}\right\}\right] \times\left[0, \min \left\{A, w_{2}\right\}\right]\right\}
$$

$$
\text { bll) If } A_{i}>A_{j} \text { and } A_{i}>0, i, j \in\{1,2\}, i \neq j \text {, }
$$

$$
\left(x_{i}^{N}, x_{j}^{\mathrm{N}}\right)=\left\{\begin{array}{lll}
\left(w_{i}, A_{j}-w_{i}\right) & w_{i}<A_{j}<w_{i}+w_{j} & {[\mathrm{bII} .1]} \\
\left(w_{i}, 0\right) & A_{j} \leq w_{i}<A_{i} & {[\mathrm{bII} 2]} \\
\left(A_{i}, 0\right) & A_{i} \leq w_{i} & {[\mathrm{bll} .3]}
\end{array}\right.
$$

c) $A_{1}=A_{2}=0:\left(x_{1}^{N}, x_{2}^{N}\right)=(0,0)$.

## Welfare analysis. Position and intrinsic utility

$$
\text { bll.1: }\left(w_{i}, A_{j}-w_{i}\right), \quad \text { bll.2: }\left(w_{i}, 0\right), \text { bll.3: }\left(A_{i}, 0\right)
$$

Case of symmetric valuation of PG consumption, $\alpha_{i}=\alpha_{j}=\alpha$.


Figure: Level curves for $u(X): \varepsilon=0.7$ (left), $\varepsilon=0.4$ (right).

## Positional concerns and social welfare

$$
\text { bll.1: }\left(w_{i}, A_{j}-w_{i}\right), \quad \text { bll.2: }\left(w_{i}, 0\right), \text { bll.3: }\left(A_{i}, 0\right)
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Case of symmetric valuation of PG consumption, $\alpha_{i}=\alpha_{j}=\alpha$.


Figure: Level curves for utility: $\varepsilon=0.7$ (left), $\varepsilon=0.4$ (right).

## A simple dynamic model with inertia

We consider the intrinsic utility function of the static model...
(1) At time $t$ a positional agent gets joy from contributions above the other player at time $t-1:+v_{i}^{P}\left(x_{i t}-x_{j t-1}\right)$.
(2) Agents have Inertia from previous actions. Disutility from deviations from the previous action: $-v_{i}^{\prime}\left(x_{i t}-x_{i t-1}\right)^{2} / 2$.
Utility at time $t$ :

$$
\begin{aligned}
U_{i}(\bullet) & =w_{i}-x_{i t}+\alpha_{i}\left[x_{i t}+x_{j t}-\frac{\varepsilon}{2}\left(x_{i t}+x_{j t}\right)^{2}\right] \\
& +v_{i}^{\mathrm{P}}\left(x_{i t}-x_{j t-1}\right)-\frac{v_{i}^{\prime}}{2}\left(x_{i t}-x_{i t-1}\right)^{2}
\end{aligned}
$$

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\end{aligned}
$$

Alternative dynamics based completely in the present (except for inertia) or completely in the past $\rightarrow$ no big differences.

## A simple dynamic model with inertia

The problem of a myopic agent $i \in\{1,2\}$ is:

$$
\begin{aligned}
& \max _{x_{i t}} U_{i}\left(x_{i t}, x_{j t}, \hat{x}_{i t}, \hat{x}_{j t}\right) \\
& \text { s.t.: } \hat{x}_{i t}=x_{i t-1}, \quad i \in\{1,2\} .
\end{aligned}
$$

The first-order conditions for an interior equilibrium are:
$-1+\alpha_{i}\left[1-\varepsilon\left(x_{i t}+x_{j t}\right)\right]-v_{i}^{\prime}\left(x_{i t}-\hat{x}_{i t}\right)+v_{i}^{\mathrm{P}},=0 \quad \forall i \in\{1,2\}$.

## Dynamic problem: Free evolution with inertia

$$
\binom{x_{i t}}{x_{j t}}=\delta t\binom{1}{-1}+\binom{x_{i 0}}{x_{j 0}}+\left(1-\lambda_{2}^{t}\right) \frac{X^{*}-X_{0}}{\alpha_{i} v_{j}^{\prime}+\alpha_{j} v_{i}^{\prime}}\binom{\alpha_{j} v_{i}^{\prime}}{\alpha_{i} v_{j}^{\prime}},
$$

where,

$$
\begin{gathered}
\delta=\frac{\varepsilon \alpha_{i} \alpha_{j}\left(A_{i}-A_{j}\right)}{\alpha_{i} v_{j}^{\prime}+\alpha_{j} v_{i}^{\prime}} \quad \lambda_{2}=\frac{v_{i}^{\prime} v_{j}^{\prime}}{v_{i}^{\prime} v_{j}^{\prime}+\varepsilon\left(\alpha_{i} v_{j}^{\prime}+\alpha_{j} v_{i}^{\prime}\right)} \\
X^{*}=\frac{\alpha_{i} v_{j}^{\prime} A_{i}+\alpha_{j} v_{i}^{\prime} A_{j}}{\alpha_{i} v_{j}^{\prime}+\alpha_{j} v_{i}^{\prime}} . \\
X_{t}=X_{0}+\left(1-\lambda_{2}^{t}\right)\left(X^{*}-X_{0}\right) .
\end{gathered}
$$

## Myopic dynamic problem: $X_{0}=0$ and $A_{i} \geq A_{j}$

Asymptotic behavior of the sequence of contributions:
(1) Static equilibrium: a fixed point of dynamical system,
(2) trajectory of contributions hits the boundary of feasible contributions, where the static equilibrium lies ...
(3) ...then converges monotonically to this static equilibrium.
( ) Without inertia, convergence in one step.

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Asymptotic behavior of the sequence of contributions:
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( trajectory of contributions hits the boundary of feasible contributions, where the static equilibrium lies ...

- ...then converges monotonically to this static equilibrium.
- Without inertia, convergence in one step.

Possible overshooting for player $j$ : contribution increases initially and decreases later on.
(1) Overshooting for player $j$ can lead to overshooting of total contribution when the player who wishes the most contributes her total endowment (cases [bll.1] and [bII.2])

## Conclusions

In the static framework

- Nash equilibrium for an additive separable public good game with positional concerns.
- Different equilibria depending on players positional concern (wished amounts) vs endowments.
- Positional concerns, contributions and social welfare.

In the myopic dynamic framework with inertia

- Convergence to the static case
- Possibility of overshooting in individual and total contribution.


## Extensions

- A positional agent versus a conformist (joy from doing like others). Disutility: $-v_{i}^{c}\left(x_{i t}-x_{j t-1}\right)^{2} / 2$.
- Consider another dynamic: the stock of public good.
- Consider farsighted agents (true dynamic game).
- More than two players.
- ...

## Positional concerns and intrinsic utility

## Proposition

Assume $w_{i}=w$ and $\alpha_{i}=\alpha . \hat{\varepsilon}=\frac{2 \alpha-1}{w \alpha}$. Then:
(1) If $\varepsilon<\hat{\varepsilon}$ (low satiation), IW-I area wider than IW-R area.
(2) If $\varepsilon>\hat{\varepsilon}$ (high satiation), IW-R area wider than IW-I area.

## Positional concerns and social welfare

Bougherara et al. (2019): What if positional concerns of the two player are both higher?

The effect of a joint increment in the positional concerns of both players is (in bll1 and bll3):

$$
\frac{d U^{\mathrm{N}}}{d v_{i}^{\mathrm{P}}}+\frac{d U^{\mathrm{N}}}{d v_{j}^{\mathrm{P}}} \gtreqless 0 \Leftrightarrow v_{i}^{\mathrm{P}}+v_{j}^{\mathrm{P}} \lesseqgtr 1 .
$$

## Simulations: bll. $1\left(w_{i}, A_{j}-w_{i}\right)$ and bll. $2\left(w_{i}, 0\right)$

bll. $1 \quad x^{N}=(1,0.22), \quad X^{\text {SO }}=0.62, \quad X^{\text {E0 }}=1.25$
