These instructions should be used both<br/>for papers submitted for review and for final<br/>versions of accepted papers.

#### 1 Introduction

These instructions are for authors submitting papers to EACL 2023 using LATEX. They are not self-contained. All authors must follow the general instructions for \*ACL proceedings,<sup>1</sup> as well as guidelines set forth in the EACL 2023 call 015 for papers.<sup>2</sup> This document contains additional instructions for the LATEX style files. #### 2 Engines

To produce a PDF file, pdfLATEX is strongly recommended (over original LATEX plus dvips+ps2pdf or dvipdf). XeLATEX also produces PDF files, and is especially suitable for text in non-Latin scripts.

Users of older versions of LATEX may encounter the following error during compilation:

\pdfendlink ended up in different
nesting level than \pdfstartlink.

This happens when pdfIATEX is used and a citation splits across a page boundary. The best way to fix this is to upgrade IATEX to 2018-12-01 or later.

#### 4.4 Citations

Table 2 shows the syntax supported by the style files. We encourage you to use the natbib styles. You can use the command \citet (cite in text) to get "author (year)" citations, like this citation to a paper by Gusfield (1997). You can use the command \citep (cite in parentheses) to get "(author, year)" citations (Gusfield, 1997). You can use the command \citealp (alternative cite without parentheses) to get "author, year" citations, which is useful for using citations within parentheses (e.g. Gusfield, 1997).

#### 4.5 References

The LATEX and BibTEX style files provided roughly follow the American Psychological Association format. If your own bib file is named custom.bib, then placing the following before any appendices in your LATEX file will generate the references section for you:

#### 5 BibT<sub>F</sub>X Files

Unicode cannot be used in BibTEX entries, and some ways of typing special characters can disrupt BibTEX's alphabetization. The recommended way of typing special characters is shown in Table 1.

Please ensure that BibTEX records contain DOIs or URLs when possible, and for all the ACL materials that you reference. Use the doi field for DOIs and the url field for URLs. If a BibTEX entry has a URL or DOI field, the paper title in the references section will appear as a hyperlink to the paper, using the hyperref LATEX package.

### Limitations

EACL 2023 requires all submissions to have a section titled "Limitations", for discussing the limitations of the paper as a complement to the discussion of strengths in the main text. This section should occur after the conclusion, but before the references. It will not count towards the page limit.

The discussion of limitations is mandatory. Papers without a limitation section will be deskrejected without review. ARR-reviewed papers that did not include "Limitations" section in their prior submission, should submit a PDF with such a section together with their EACL 2023 submission.

While we are open to different types of limi-126 tations, just mentioning that a set of results have 127 been shown for English only probably does not re-128 flect what we expect. Mentioning that the method 129 works mostly for languages with limited morphol-130 ogy, like English, is a much better alternative. In 131 addition, limitations such as low scalability to long 132 text, the requirement of large GPU resources, or 133 other things that inspire crucial further investiga-134 tion are welcome. 135

### 136 Ethics Statement

Scientific work published at EACL 2023 must comply with the ACL Ethics Policy. We encourage all authors to include an explicit ethics statement on the broader impact of the work, or other ethical considerations after the conclusion but before the references. The ethics statement will not count toward the page limit (8 pages for long, 4 pages for short papers).
