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Element Variation Innovation Thinking: A Method of Simplifying and Reorganizing TRIZ

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12 Abstract. The industrial environment is undergoing the fourth revolution. TRIZ as an effective in-13 novation method possesses an entire system consists of multiple powerful tools like inventive prin-14 ciples and standard solutions to solve technical problems. Since they were invented, many re-15 searchers have attempted to further develop them, pointing out some difficulties in applying these 16 tools in a simple way and the need to modify these powerful tools. In line with it, this study intro-17 duced Element Variation Innovation Thinking (EVIT), a novelty innovation method, to simplify 18 and reorganize the application system of TRIZ. The variation rules are formed into 9 variation 19 method groups by clustering the existed innovation methods such as the 40 inventive principles in 20 TRIZ. 9 element groups are introduced based on the innovative work practice of Feng's group. By 21 the intervention of variation method groups, the element groups are converted to form new solu-22 tions. To illustrate the proposed method and validate its utility, this study selects the field of coal-23 bed methane (CBM) extraction technology as a use case.

26 **1** Introduction

27 The industrial environment is undergoing the fourth revolution [1]. To effectively solve engineering 28 and scientific challenges on demand, some conceptual design tools as TRIZ [2], SIT [3], and USIT [4] 29 have been introduced. Genrich Altshuller founded the Theory of Inventive Problem Solving (TRIZ) 30 technique in 1956. It rests on the study of resourceful principles used in patents to obtain solution inspi-31 rations [5]. There are four specific approaches to a solution that can be selected through the TRIZ 32 method according to the level of involvement of the problem, which involve 39 engineering parameters 33 and 40 inventive principles [6]. Systematic Inventive Thinking (SIT) was introduced by Genady 34 Filkovsky and his two students Roni Horowitz and Jacob Goldenberg with the aim of simplifying TRIZ 35 so that it could be accepted by more people and allow users to pay more attention to the issues involved [3]. Five innovation strategies are included in SIT. Unified Structured Inventive Thinking (USIT) was
originally developed by Ed. Sickafus [7] at the Ford Motor Company in the 1990s based on TRIZ and
SIT. Nakagawa [8] further developed the system of USIT and proposed five categories of solution
generation methods containing 32 sub-methods, called the "USIT Operators", which were reorganized
from 40 innovative principles in TRIZ.

41 TRIZ, SIT and USIT have proven themselves as powerful tools for solving practical engineering 42 problems. Apart from that, Morphological analysis (MA) was introduced by Zwicky [9]. The core of 43 MA is that the research object is resolved into several fundamental dimensions, which depict the object 44 from a detailed and inclusive perspective. Each dimension can then be divided into several values to 45 depict the characteristics of the entire system [10]. In virtue of morphological analysis (MA), we ana-46 lyzed the inner mechanisms of different innovation methods through the innovative work practice of 47 Feng's group and found that innovation solutions consist of innovation dimensions and corresponding 48 elements, which possess the ability of variation. The variation rules are formed into 9 variation method 49 groups by clustering the existed innovation methods such as the 40 inventive principles in TRIZ. 9 50 element groups are introduced based on the data analysis results and author's experience. By the inter-51 vention of variation method groups, the element groups are converted to form new solutions.

52 With the purpose of simplifying and developing TRIZ, this article introduces a method called Ele-53 ment Variation Innovation Thinking (EVIT) which can be considered as a simplification and develop-54 ment of 76 standard solutions and 40 inventive principles in TRIZ and other innovation methods. In 55 this innovation method, "element" means the innovative elements in various innovation groups while 56 "variation" has the meaning of inventive principles for varying "elements". EVIT consists of three 57 parts: element group, variation method group, and the innovation coupling paths between element 58 groups and variation method groups. The basic scheme of problem solving in EVIT is a six-box 59 scheme covering three phases, which has been represented in a data diagram. The input and output of each diagram could be described by the information of patents, product manuals, or other scientific 60 61 literature. EVIT has been successfully applied into chemical industry, mechanical engineering and 62 coalbed methane mining technology. This study selects coalbed methane (CBM) extraction technology 63 as a case to illustrate the system of EVIT.

This article is composed of 5 parts after the introduction. The second part is dedicated to the components of EVIT and cites the relevant valuable contributions on our study. It is in the third part that the overall structure of problem solving in EVIT is presented. The fourth part is dedicated to the case study with "coalbed methane (CBM) extraction technology", followed by discussions, conclusions, acknowledgments, references and appendix.

69 2 Components of Element Variation Innovation Thinking (EVIT)

70 2.1 Element Group

2

One or a series of technologies or products could be considered as a technical system, which is composed of different components. These components can be divided into several categories according to the roles they play in the system, the disciplines they belong to or common laws. These categories are defined as element groups. On the basis of summarizing and analyzing a large number of innovation cases such as the technological field in coalbed methane extraction, 3D printing and rapid prototyping, fluid transfer equipment and etc., the element groups can be divided into 9 categories, including space dimension, environment dimension, structure dimension, function dimension, mechanism dimension,

- 78 material dimension, dynamic system dimension, time series dimension and human-machine relation-
- ship dimension, following the core ideology of MA. By utilizing the 9 element groups, most technolo-
- 80 gy and product systems could be described. The definition of each element group is listed as Table 1.

8	Time sequence dimension	The time series' appearance and characteristics of the system (machine, product or engineering, etc.), including the processes related to the time sequence in the system, including the operating sequence, process sequence and time sequence, etc.
9	Human-machine relation- ship dimension	The appearance and characteristics of the human-machine relationship of the system (machine, product or engineering, etc.), including the interac- tion between the human and the operating object, tool, and environment in the system.

82 2.2 Variation Method Group

The continuous advancement of science and technology makes the element groups continue to change under a certain law. As TRIZ 40 inventive principles, SIT methods and USIT Operators aim to indicate the law of development and change in technology and product innovation, we summarized and analyzed the common characteristics of these methods in solving innovative problems. In this study, we call the law of development and change as variation method groups. The definition of each variation method group is described as Table 2.

92 On the basis of a large number of case studies, the variation method groups can be divided into 9 93 categories, including decomposition and removal, combination and integration, local optimization, 94 substitution, dynamics, self-service, friendliness, flexibility and intelligence. The relationship between 95 EVIT and TRIZ 40 inventive principles is described in Appendix A. It means TRIZ 40 inventive principles could be expressed in EVIT framework, which is showed in the table A1. The horizontal axis 96 97 means variation method groups while the vertical axis is presented as element groups. According to the 98 cross influence between element groups and variation method groups, TRIZ 40 inventive principles 99 could be explained in an unified way. One thing should be mentioned, considering the target field fea-100 tures and the characteristics of the developing era, we introduced a new inventive principle called "in-101 telligence" for making the innovation process more efficient and significant., which is not contained in classical TRIZ. Thus, in Appendix A, the relationship between "intelligence" with TRIZ inventive 102 103 principles is not listed.

2.3 The Innovation Coupling Paths between Element Groups and Variation Method Groups

105 The concept of coupling originated from physics, and its connotation is a sign that two or more unre-106 lated systems or forms of motion establish a relationship to influence each other until they are united. 107 The process of element transformation and integration is actually the process of combining product 108 elements and other information with processing techniques. Therefore, the meaning of innovation cou-109 pling in EVIT is defined as the process of combining element groups and variation method groups 110 according to certain rules. This process is not a static single intersection and combination between ele-111 ment groups and variation method groups, but the process of mutual penetration and interaction be-112 tween element groups and variation method groups, finally deriving a systematic technological innova-113 tion path map. The coupling relationship map between element groups and variation method groups is depicted as Fig. 1, which is also named as EVIT inventive principle map. 114

117 The process of obtaining the technological innovation path N through EVIT inventive principle map 118 can be expressed as follow.

120 In Equation (1), $E_i (1 \le i \le 9)$ represents element groups. $V_i (1 \le j \le 9)$ represents variation meth-

od groups. The sign of × represents the concept of the coupling between element groups and variation method groups.

When applying this method to a specific field, one or more element groups can be arbitrarily select ed to couple with different variation method groups to obtain technological innovation paths. The equa tion can be adjusted as follow.

127 In Equation (2), m is a set. $m \subseteq \{1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9\}$ Also, n is a set. $n \subseteq \{1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9\}$

In Equation (2), the number of m set is a ($a \le 9$), the number of n set is b ($b \le 9$), then the number of subsets after removing the empty set from the m set is (2a-1), and each subset represents several element groups in one or a fixed combination. In the same way, the number of subsets of the n set excluding the empty set is (2b-1), and each subset represents one or a fixed combination of several variation

132 method groups. Therefore, C_N , the number of technological innovation paths, can be obtained by ap-

133 plying coupling when target for specific fields. The equation (3) is listed as follow.

For example, if a is 3 which means there are 3 element groups and b is 3 which means there are 3 variation method groups, the number of technological innovation paths would be 49.

In summary, the coupling of each type of element group and each variation method group may form
 one or more innovative ideas, thereby constructing a systematic innovation plan in a certain industry

- 140 field to reveal potential technological innovation opportunities and guide enterprises Plan the innova-
- 141 tion strategy in a targeted manner.

142 **3** The Overall Structure of Problem Solving in EVIT



143 The overall structure of problem solving in EVIT consists of six steps, which is presented in Fig. 2.

146 The basic scheme of problem solving in EVIT is a six-box scheme covering three phases, which has 147 been represented in a data diagram. The input and output of each diagram could be described by the 148 information of patents, product manuals, or other scientific literature. In Phase 1, there are two steps to 149 extract key element groups. First, problem division means 9 element groups are utilized as navigation 150 to deconstruct the technological system in a structural and systematic way. Second, the basic innova-151 tive elements of the technical system are extracted with the aid of multiple tools such as patent mining, 152 knowledge mining, expert interviews, group discussions, functional analysis, knowledge cross-border 153 transfer and other methods. In Phase 2, two steps witness the process of constructing innovation paths 154 based on the coupling between element groups and variation method groups. Third, 9 variation method 155 groups are dedicated to transform and innovate the acquired innovative elements to generate new solu-156 tion elements. Fourth, 9 variation method groups are further utilized to reorganize and reconstruct in-157 novative elements to generate numerous new restructured solution elements. Phase 3 consists of two 158 steps with the aim of designing feasible innovative plans. Fifth, all of the generated numerous innova-159 tive solutions are evaluated and selected, and technically and economically infeasible solutions are 160 excluded. Finally, a satisfactory technical solution is selected for implementation and the effect of in-161 novation is tested to iteratively improve the technical innovation solution.

162 **4** Case Study

163 CBM is an efficient, clean and environmentally friendly new energy and has become one of the 164 emerging industries with huge development potential in the energy industry, identifying possible technological opportunities in CBM extraction is greatly significant for the industry, the nation, and all of society in that it can reduce air pollution and harness mine gas hazards [11]. CBM development and treatment is a comprehensive problem with complex structure and multiple dimensions. It is difficult to solve the problems in CBM treatment from only one dimension or one way. In view of this, EVIT is utilized to conduct in-depth analysis of the structure and internal mechanism of CBM extraction technology from multiple dimensions.

171 Since the proposed method is executed based on the patent documents in CBM extraction technical fields, structured data must be extracted to explore their inner logic and law. WIPO PatentScope is 172 selected as the data source, which records many countries' patents, including China, the Russian Feder-173 174 ation, the United States, etc. The PatentScope database provides access to international Patent Coopera-175 tion Treaty (PCT) applications in full-text format on the day of publication, as well as the patent docu-176 ments of participating national and regional patent offices. Thus, numerous patent documents from 177 worldwide patent databases can be collected in WIPO PatentScope, and valuable information can be 178 derived automatically. The time window was set from 2009 to 2018, and 1385 patent documents were 179 collected by searching the keyword "coalbed extraction" in the WIPO PatentScope database with crosslingual expansion. With the aid of experts' knowledge, 100 high relevant patent documents were 180 181 screened as the innovative source.

182 4.1 Phase 1: Key Element Group Extraction

183 In Phase 1, 9 element groups are utilized to deconstruct the CBM extraction technology field. It means the overall features of the field could be described through the framework consisting of 9 ele-184 185 ment groups. Then, to extract the innovative elements, computerized program wis conducted to prepro-186 cess the unstructured patent documents by Python. Word segmentation is executed to divide the patent 187 documents into single words and function words and stop words are removed to eliminate unnecessary 188 impact. TF-IDF, a term weighting scheme, was utilized to extract keywords of each patent documents. 189 It was believed the keywords possessed the capability of representing the valuable information of pa-190 tent documents. 2930 keywords were originally derived and then 168 keywords were extracted from 191 those to express the most valuable information. In this study, Word2Vec algorithm was utilized to deal 192 with the ambiguous relation of the keywords from different patent documents. All of keywords are 193 transformed into a keyword vector and then clustered into 40 groups. The relationship between differ-194 ent keywords was depicted in Fig. 3.



Fig. 3. Co-occurrence network: semantic distances between keywords in CBM extraction technology

According to clustering results, 3 key element groups and corresponding keywords could be classi-fied as Table 3.

4.2 Phase 2: Innovation Paths Establishment Based on the Coupling between Element Groups and Variation Method Groups

Based on the classification of innovative elements, each element group is mapped to a spatial coordinate system, where the X-axis is the space dimension, the Y-axis is the material dimension, and the Z-axis is the mechanism dimension. Then the variation method groups and the element groups are coupled to form innovation paths of CBM extraction. The process is depicted in Fig. 4.

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4.3 Phase 3: Innovative Plans Design and Implementation

209 Based on the established innovation paths, we can obtain new ideas for depressurizing and eliminat-210 ing outbursts in CBM extraction. Then combining the actual conditions of the current mine site and 211 mining equipment, the equipment and methods of depressurizing and eliminating outbursts in CBM 212 extraction are further improved by systematic design, resulting in the generation of targeted technical 213 solutions. For example, through the coupling between space dimension, mechanism dimension, materi-214 al dimension and the variation method group of local optimization, the technology opportunity could be 215 described as follow: Due to the good sand carrying performance of liquid nitrogen and the obvious 216 effect of increasing production, liquid nitrogen can be used as fracturing medium to unblock and sup-217 port the formed fractures, optimize the fracture conductivity, and then increase gas production through 218 repeated fracturing. Furthermore, another technology opportunity could be derived from the coupling 219 between space dimension, mechanism dimension and the variation method group of local optimization 220 and friendliness. The content of this opportunity is described as follow: The coal reservoir is drilled 221 from the surrounding rock by rotary percussion method to increase the drilling speed and reduce the 222 mining cost, and then use air scouring to release the pressure of the acupuncture points. Using the high-223 pressure air shock wave as the power source, it performs a nearly cylindrical rotating impact on the 224 well wall to cut off the acupoints so that the coal around the well bore gradually breaks from the well 225 wall, forming pressure and releasing space. Then, perform gas drainage in the coal seam according to 226 the conventional method.

227 **5 Discussions**

This study introduced the components and the framework of EVIT, and analyzed patent information to resolve the technical problems in the field of CBM extraction by EVIT. In the first technology opportunity, we can know that the scheme is set in coal reservoir, which belongs to the space dimension. The related mechanism is fracture, paving the way for thinking about the fracturing medium in material

dimension. After determining the structure of the technology opportunity, the variation method group 232 233 of local optimization plays a role in varying the specific details. Similarly, the second technology op-234 portunity indicates the innovative plan occurs in coal reservoir and surrounding rock. The target mech-235 anisms are selected as drill hole and scour. With the guide of variation method groups of local optimi-236 zation and friendliness, the opportunity is derived by changing the structure and relationship between 237 each innovative element in the element group framework. In the application of EVIT, the variation 238 method groups are selected based on the inner characteristics of each innovative element, which re-239 quires the analysis of conventional CBM extraction methods. This study doesn't cover all the technolo-240 gy opportunities, but list part of the opportunities to prove the effectiveness of the EVIT application.

241 The simplicity of EVIT compared to TRIZ and other similar methods could be generalized in three 242 aspects: core ideology, innovation process and innovation tools. First, the core ideology of EVIT is the 243 innovation coupling paths between element groups and variation method groups, which provide the 244 direction for developing technical solutions to problems. Second, the innovation process of EVIT starts 245 from analyzing the demands of users, and then it comes to the establishment of innovation coupling 246 paths between element groups and variation method groups, and the final step means generating specific innovative plans design. Compared to the Four-Box Scheme of Problem Solving in TRIZ, this 247 248 framework is easier for engineers to understand and provides concrete ways of processing the infor-249 mation between the adjacent boxes. Third, compared to the multiple tools in TRIZ including 40 in-250 ventive principles, 76 standard solutions, 39 engineering parameters and etc., the innovation tools in 251 EVIT are conciser and easier to be understood and applied into R&D projects.

252 6 Conclusions

253 In this study, we put forward a novelty innovation method called EVIT with the aim of simplifying and reorganizing TRIZ tools and other innovation methods. 9 element groups are generalized from 254 255 different engineering & technology areas and 9 variation method groups are simplified and reorganized 256 from 40 inventive principles and 76 standard solutions and other innovation methods. This study aims 257 to summarize and analyze the TRIZ, SIT, USIT and MA to propose a systematic method which possess 258 the potential to realize the unified expression of the above methods. However, there could be other 259 element and variation method group to develop in the future researches. The proposed element and 260 variation method group are defined with the aim of indicating the inner relationship between the above 261 methods. The overall technological features are described with the aid of 9 element groups and the technical problems could be solved by the guide of 9 variation method groups. The process of coupling 262 element groups and variation method groups is defined as innovation coupling. Then, the matching 263 264 mechanism between element groups and variation method groups is defined in a mathematical form. In conclusion, EVIT could promote the process of generating various creative solutions effectively, mean-265 266 ing it is easy to understand and apply for experts and ordinary engineers. It has been successfully ap-267 plied into chemical industry, mechanical engineering and CBM extraction technology.

However, this innovation method still has some limitations. First, the matching mechanism between element groups and variation method groups is still established in a semi-autonomous approach, which may decrease the efficiency of solving problem. Second, the comprehensive evaluation system of technical plans, which is located in the end of the application process, still have some room for improvement in the evaluation index setting and the process of calculating the index. The future studies could focus on the application of artificial intelligence to achieve the automation of constructing matching

- 274 mechanism and generating conceptual technical solutions for problem solving. Besides, a more intelli-
- 275 gent and comprehensive evaluation system could be developed to improve the quality of technology
- 276 opportunities.
