Computational reproducibility

Ability to reproduce the exact same results using the **same data** and the **same methods**.

It's not only about the source code but also the **environnement** (versions, OS, etc.) docker, guix

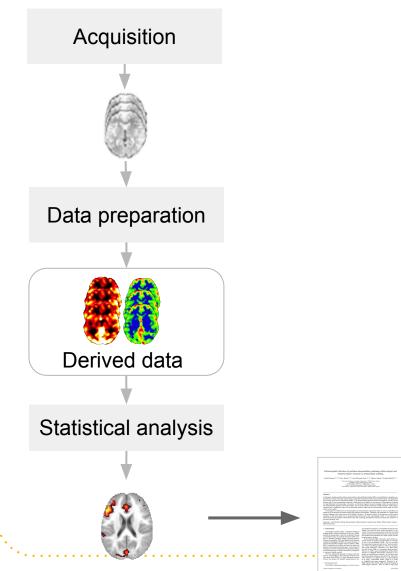
10 years computational reproducibility is an open question!

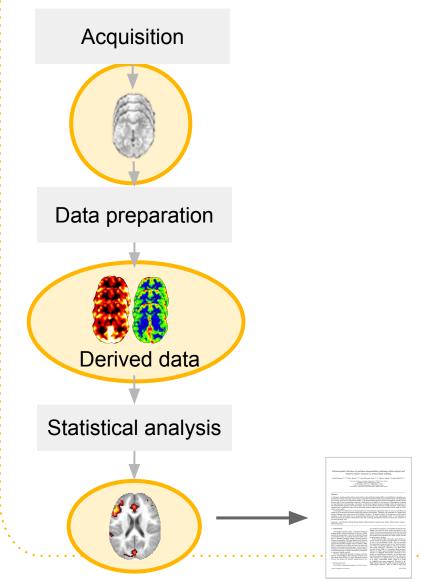

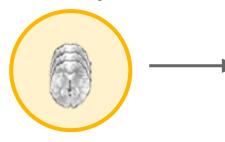

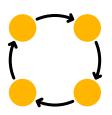




Interoperable Using a common standard/format across tools



Findable we can search for open datasets in each repository

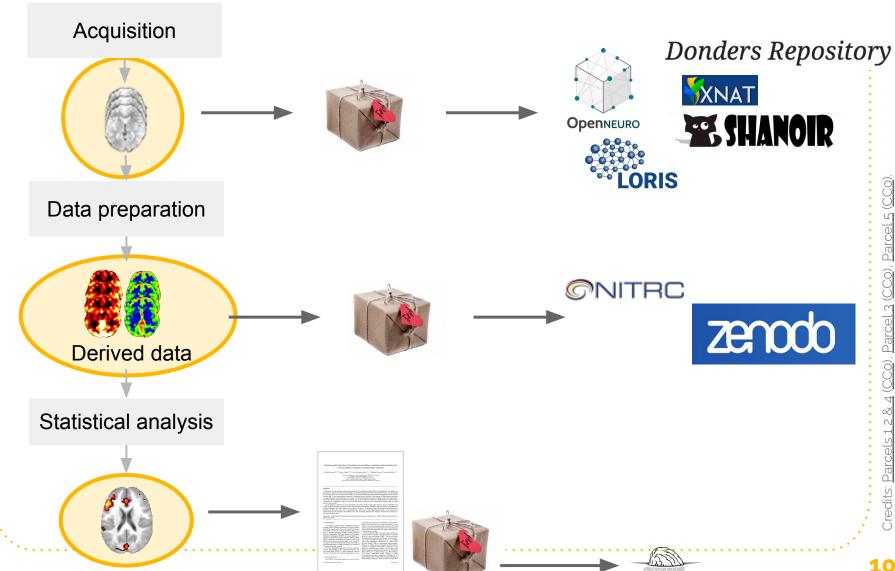


Reusable Including enough metadata to enable reuse. e.g. onsets of the task for task-based fMRI.



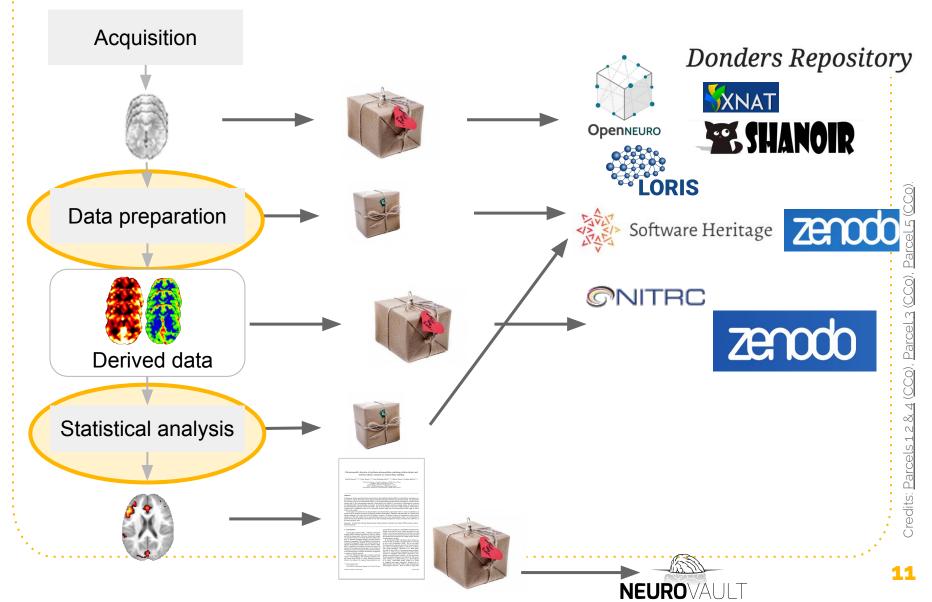
Accessible Direct download (e.g. Openneuro) or with Data User Agreement (e.g. Donders)

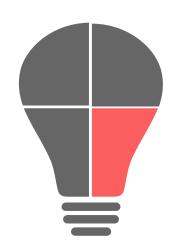
