Making your project **reproducible**



Computational reproducibility

Ability to reproduce the exact same results using the **same data** and the **same methods**.

docker, guix

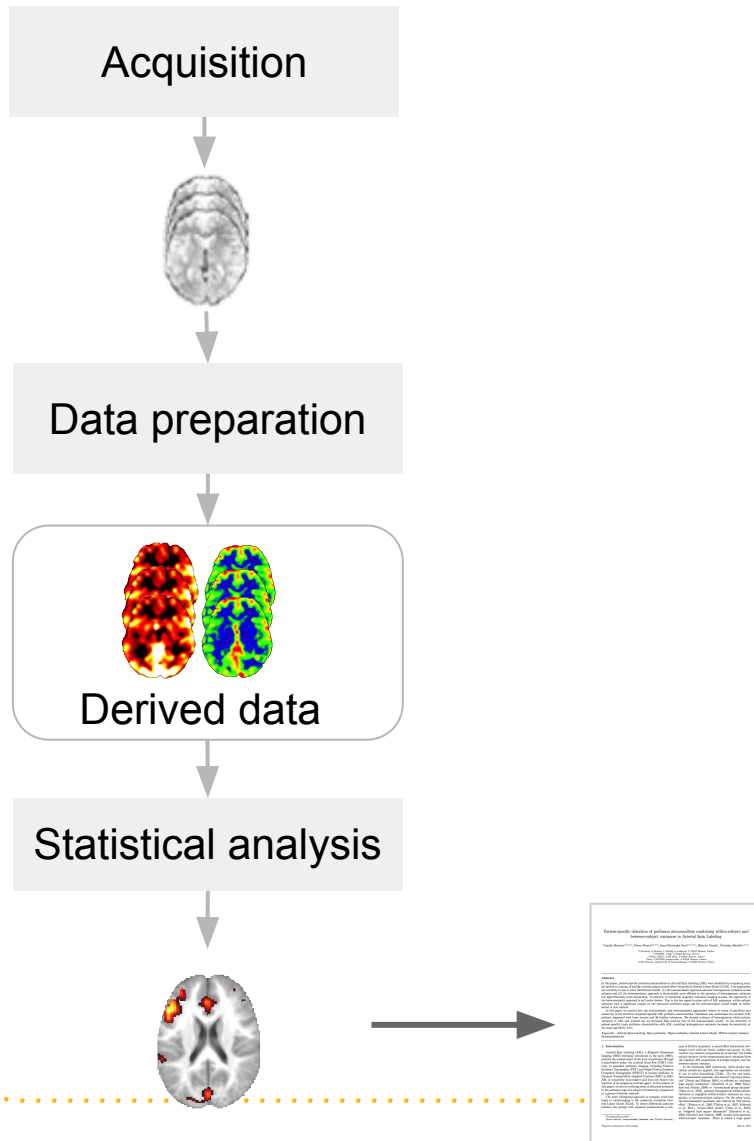
**10 years computational

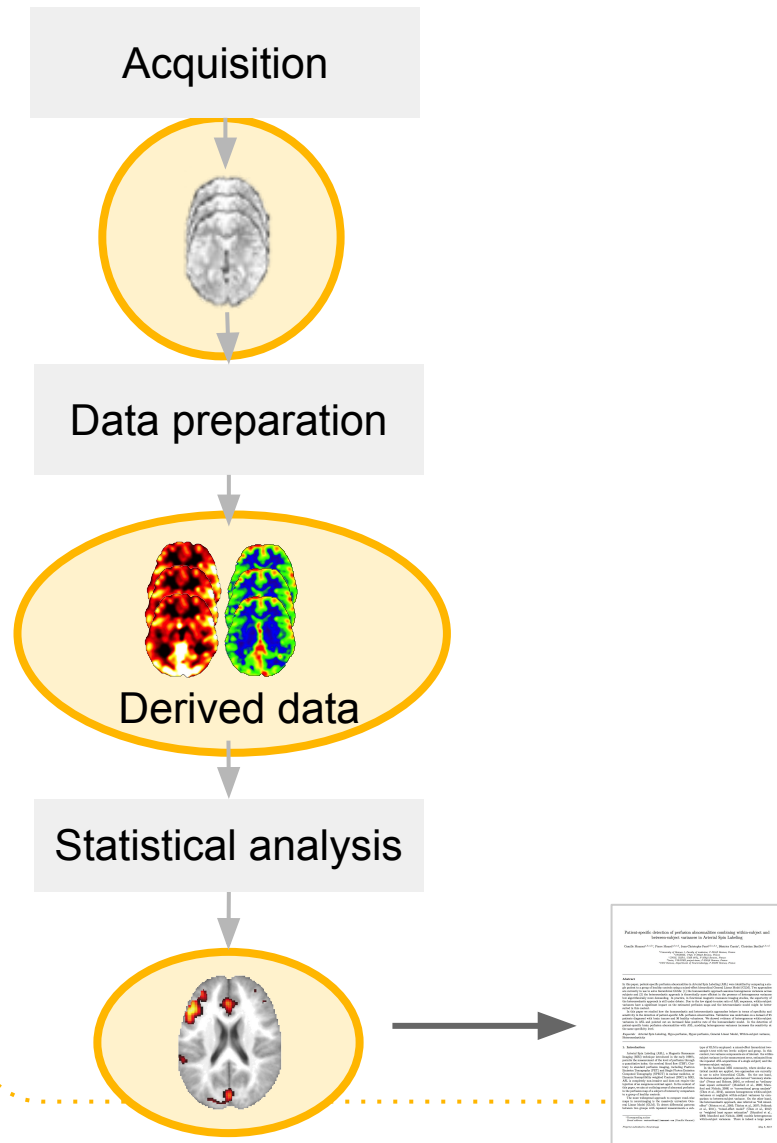

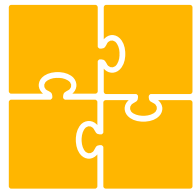

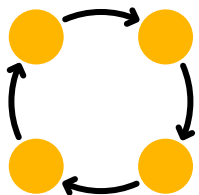
Good practices: **FAIR** principles



Interoperable Using a common standard/format across tools



Findable we can search for open datasets in each repository

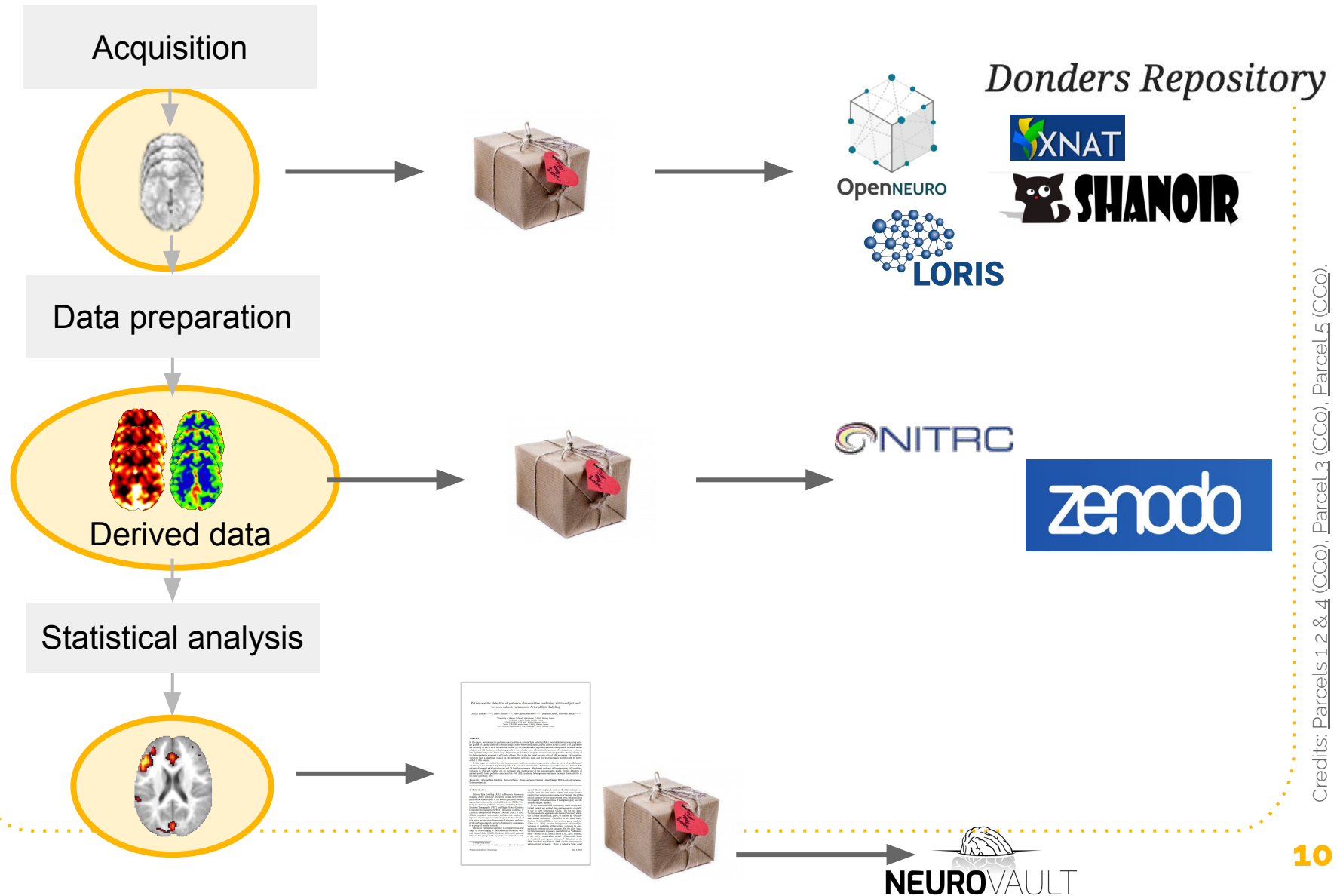


Reusable Including enough metadata to enable reuse. *e.g. onsets of the task for task-based fMRI.*

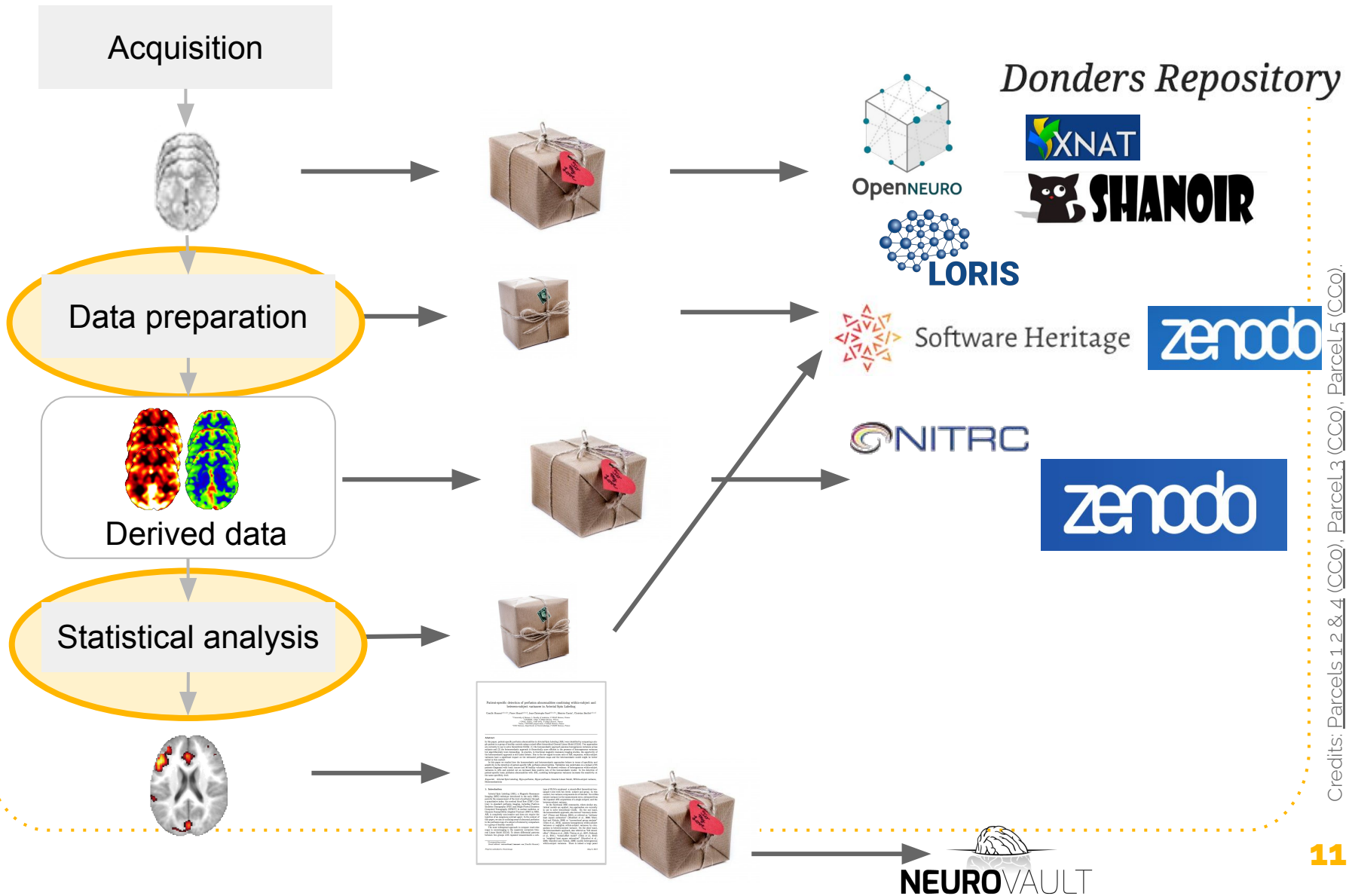


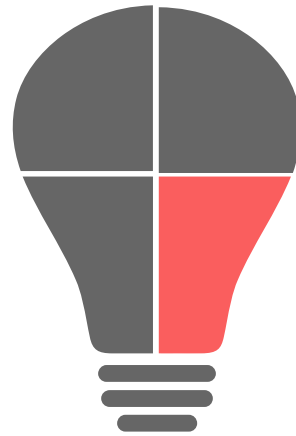
Accessible Direct download (*e.g. Openneuro*) or with Data User Agreement (*e.g. Donders*)

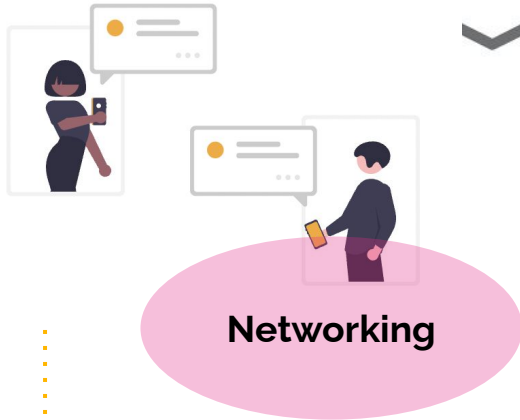
