IFIP – The International Federation for Information Processing

IFIP was founded in 1960 under the auspices of UNESCO, following the first World Computer Congress held in Paris the previous year. A federation for societies working in information processing, IFIP's aim is two-fold: to support information processing in the countries of its members and to encourage technology transfer to developing nations. As its mission statement clearly states:

IFIP is the global non-profit federation of societies of ICT professionals that aims at achieving a worldwide professional and socially responsible development and application of information and communication technologies.

IFIP is a non-profit-making organization, run almost solely by 2500 volunteers. It operates through a number of technical committees and working groups, which organize events and publications. IFIP's events range from large international open conferences to working conferences and local seminars.

The flagship event is the IFIP World Computer Congress, at which both invited and contributed papers are presented. Contributed papers are rigorously refereed and the rejection rate is high.

As with the Congress, participation in the open conferences is open to all and papers may be invited or submitted. Again, submitted papers are stringently refereed.

The working conferences are structured differently. They are usually run by a working group and attendance is generally smaller and occasionally by invitation only. Their purpose is to create an atmosphere conducive to innovation and development. Refereeing is also rigorous and papers are subjected to extensive group discussion.

Publications arising from IFIP events vary. The papers presented at the IFIP World Computer Congress and at open conferences are published as conference proceedings, while the results of the working conferences are often published as collections of selected and edited papers.

IFIP distinguishes three types of institutional membership: Country Representative Members, Members at Large, and Associate Members. The type of organization that can apply for membership is a wide variety and includes national or international societies of individual computer scientists/ICT professionals, associations or federations of such societies, government institutions/government related organizations, national or international research institutes or consortia, universities, academies of sciences, companies, national or international associations or federations of companies.

Preface

The Theory of Inventive Problem Solving (TRIZ) is popular creative thinking and systematic organizing knowledge methodology. It is a scientifically grounded and structured approach for forecasting the evolution of technological systems, and includes numerous tools and methods for product and process innovation, enabling an increase in creative and inventive productivity.

The European TRIZ Association (ETRIA) World Conference TRIZ Future (also known as the International TRIZ Future Conference, TFC) is traditionally a fundamental venue for disseminating information about TRIZ. TFC has reached its 22nd edition (TFC22) which took place in Warsaw, Poland, during September 27–29, 2022. The conference was organized at the Faculty of Electronics and Information Technology, Warsaw University of Technology, in Warsaw, Poland by the Artificial Intelligence Division. The conference motto is ‘Systematic Innovation partnerships with AI and IT’, which highlights the main idea of this event: to join TRIZ with Information Technology (IT) and Artificial Intelligence (AI).

Information Technology (IT) and Artificial Intelligence (AI) achieve many goals. It is worth noting that thoughtlessly comparing artificial intelligence to human intelligence may be a source of misunderstandings and confusion. Computers are only machines that, to some extent, should be viewed as fast-acting calculators that can only perform simple operations on binary numbers. Despite the huge successes, scope and scale of their applications, it is not without reason that computers are sometimes called ‘stupid automatons’. It is impossible for any program executed by a computer to become a unit autonomous enough to execute something other than its creator, a computer scientist, originally designed. The success of IT and AI is the success of the creativity of computer scientists, which now needs the support of TRIZ.

After disrupting the traditional format of the TFC 2020 and TFC 2021 conferences, TFC 2022 was provided in a hybrid form, which included seeing each other face-to-face as well as participating online.

Despite the focus on joining TRIZ and IT and AI, other topics typically linked with TRIZ and protagonists of previous TFC editions were still accepted. All 39 papers published in this book were at least triple peer-reviewed by several members of the Scientific Committee, and the authors had the chance to improve their papers based on these reviews before the final decision. The papers were presented during the TRIZ Future Conference 2022, a lively discussion followed the presentation.
