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An ant colony optimization with turn-around-time reduction mechanism for the robust aircraft maintenance routing problem

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Abstract. The robust aircraft maintenance routing problem (RAMRP) is adopted by airlines to determine aircraft routes with better withstanding for possible disruptions. This can be achieved using a common approach called the buffer time insertion approach (BT). From the literature, it was observed that this approach has a pitfall of reducing the fleet productivity while inserting long buffer times. Besides, it cannot accommodate flight delays while inserting short buffer times. These disadvantages were the motivation to conduct this study to propose a RAMRP solution that incorporates a novel robustness approach, called turnaround-time reduction (TR), in which all the previous drawbacks are avoided. An ant colony-based algorithm (AC) was developed to solve the proposed RAMRP. To demonstrate the viability and effectiveness of the proposed approach, experiments are conducted based on real data obtained from a major airline company located in the Middle East. The results show that the proposed TR outperforms the existing BT in terms of fleet productivity and delay accommodation.

1 Introduction

The aircraft maintenance routing problem (AMRP) is essential for airlines because it constructs the aircraft routes and schedules the aircraft maintenance visits. The AMRP has been addressed in the literature through three different variants: tactical (TAMRP) [1, 2], operational (OAMRP) [3-7], and robust (RAMRP) [8-11]. The focus of this

research is the RAMRP, which adopts the robustness idea to create flexible routes that can withstand unpredictable events [8-11]. In RAMRP, the flight delays are considered besides the operational maintenance requirements. Usually, the robustness can be achieved using an approach, called the buffer time insertion approach (BT). This approach is used to insert buffer or slack time between flight legs to deal with the expected flight delays. Indeed, the BT approach was widely adopted in the literature [12, 13]. However, there are significant drawbacks of the BT approach. On the one hand, imposing a large buffer time among flight legs reduces the number of flight legs covered by each aircraft, henceforth reducing fleet productivity, mainly when covering many flight legs. On the other hand, inserting a short buffer time may not be enough to absorb the expected delays. The recent survey in [14] provides further details about the AMRP.

This study makes the following contributions; first, in contrast to the BT robustness approach, we propose a novel robustness approach, called the TR. Before proposing this approach, it is essential to define the turn-around time (TRT) as the time required by the airlines, or other service companies, to help the aircraft complete the operations related to the last covered flight legs and to finalize the operations associated with the next flight legs. These operations are called ground handling operations and include unloading the luggage of the previously covered flight leg, loading the luggage for the next flight leg, moving the aircraft between gates, and fueling the aircraft. The main idea of the TR is to speed up or to reduce the normal TRT by allocating more ground resources (i.e., workforce and facilities) while observing any delay. Consequently, the accumulated propagated delay can be mitigated, avoiding the delay propagation for the downstream flight legs, leading to significant recovery cost savings for the airlines company. Before designing the TR, several interviews were made with experts in a major Middle Eastern airlines company, they mentioned that allocating more ground resources can contribute to speeding up some ground operations, resulting in a 30-50% reduction in the normal TRT. Based on this remark, three types of TRT were addressed: the normal TRT, the reduced TRT (i.e., 30% reduction of the normal TRT), and the extra-reduced TRT (i.e., 50% reduction of the normal TRT). The first TRT is applied when the accumulated propagated delay does not appear, whereas the rest of the TRTs are used when the delay appears.

The remainder of this paper is organized as follows. In Section 2, the model formulation is presented. The solution method for the RAMRP and the computational experiments are provided in Section 3. Finally, Section 4 gives the conclusions of the study.

2 Model formulation

The RAMRP is formulated based on the connection network [3]. The node sets of the network include the flight legs set (*I*) and the maintenance stations set (*MT*), whereas the arc sets of the network include the normal TRT coverage arc set (*COVN*), the reduced TRT coverage arc set (*COVR*), the extra-reduced TRT coverage set (*COVE*), the visiting maintenance arc set (*VMA*), and the leaving maintenance arc set (*LMA*). The normal TRT coverage arc $covn(i, j) \in COVN$ is used to link two consecutive flight legs, such that the TRT is normal, i.e. when there is no accumulated

propagated delay. On the other hand, when the accumulated propagated delay appears, $covr(i, j) \in COVR$ and $cove(i, j) \in COVE$, are used, depending on the severity of the accumulated propagated delay. The visiting maintenance arc $vma(i, m) \in VMA$ is designed to prepare maintenance visits for the aircraft, whereas the leaving maintenance arc $lma(m, j) \in LMA$ is incorporated in the network to let the aircraft leave the maintenance stations and resume covering the subsequent flight legs.

The objective function stated in (1) is to minimize the expected propagated delay cost over the planning horizon. Constraints (2) express the propagated delay calculations. Constraints (3) are cast to cover all the flight legs, which indicates covering each flight leg strictly by one aircraft. Balance constraints (4) and (5) are formulated to keep the aircraft's circulation throughout the network. To connect two flight legs by using the same aircraft, that connection should be feasible in terms of time and space considerations, as described by constraints (6) and (7). As mentioned earlier, one of the distinctive features of the proposed model is using the TR as a robustness approach. This approach is indicated in constraints (8) – (11). To prepare a maintenance visit for the aircraft, constraints (12) are formulated to consider the locations of the maintenance stations. After finishing the maintenance operation, the aircraft should resume covering its route. For this purpose, constraints (13) - (15) are developed.

3 Solution method and Computational experiments

Since the RAMRP is modeled as a network-based problem, the ACO has been selected as it has been successfully applied in solving large and complex network-based problems [15-18]. The ACO based-algorithm proposed by Eltoukhy, et al. [5] was used to solve the RAMRP model. In addition, this algorithm employs a neural network algorithm for flight delay prediction [19]. The adopted ACO algorithm has two main parts; route construction with the help of an ant that simulates an aircraft moving throughout the network, and updating the pheromone trail to improve the solution quality through several iterations.

To demonstrate the effectiveness of the proposed TR approach, computational experiments were conducted based on real data obtained from a major Middle Eastern airline. A summary of the data is given in Table 1.

3.1 Performance analysis

To test the superiority of the proposed TR over the BT approach, our experiments are conducted to compare the performance of the TR with the BT approach proposed by Liang, et al. [12]. The performance of the robustness approaches is shown in Table 2.

Regarding the TR and the BT, Table 2 shows that the structure of the TR enables it to outperform the BT by about 7.65 - 12.20% and 8.75 - 13.58% while handling the propagated delay costs and fleet productivity, respectively. The proposed approach was able to reduce the TRT times by allocating more ground resources when the propagated delay appears. This results in accommodating the propagated delay, leading to significant savings in the propagated delay costs. In contrast to the TR, the BT sometimes inserts short buffer times, which may not be enough to absorb the propagated delays, increasing the propagated delay costs. Moving to the reason for the outperformance in terms of fleet productivity. Indeed, the BT sometimes imposes a long buffer time between the flight legs, which reduces the number of flight legs that should be covered by each aircraft. Consequently, the BT suffers from reduced fleet productivity, mainly when covering many flight legs. Opposite to the BT, the TR does not include those large-time slots, so the fleet productivity reduction can be easily avoided.

4 Conclusions

This study investigates the RAMRP and sought to propose a novel robust approach, called the TR. The effectiveness of the proposed TR approach is demonstrated through computational experiments using real data acquired from a major Middle Eastern airline. In our computational experiments, we demonstrate the importance of the TR, which is included in the RAMRP, by making a comparison with the BT approach. The results reveal an outperformance of the TR over the BT by about 7.65 - 12.20% and 8.75 - 13.58% while handling the propagated delay costs and fleet productivity, respectively. The results of this study indicate that the novel TR has excellent potential for implementation in the airline industry. Since the airlines have high uncertainty levels, it could be fruitful to develop an AMRP model while considering stochastic parameters such as arrival and departure times [20-22]. For future research, it is recommended to carry out further tests to assess the superiority of the new approach over the existing ones, particularly in different real-life scenarios. Besides, the sensitivity of the obtained results against changes in external parameters might be another avenue for future research.

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
