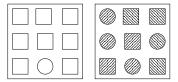

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# How the brain may processes the visual information

- The brain extracts basic features from the visual information. Two modes of visual search are distinguished:
  - feature search : the time to find the target doesn't depend on the number of stimuli
  - conjunction search : the time to find the target depends on the number of stimuli

- This information follows two pathways :
  - What pathway : extracts and processes the features information
  - Where pathway (or How pathway) : extracts and processes the spatial information

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#### Visual search and visual attention

Visual search is closely linked to visual attention.

**Visual attention** can be defined as the property to select the relevant informations from what is perceived.

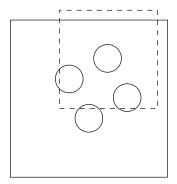
Two modes of visual attention are considered:

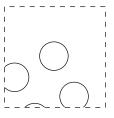
- Feature attention
- Spatial attention
  - → covert mode : no eye movement is initiated
  - ightarrow overt mode : involves an eye movement to center an object on the fovea

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# The current approaches

Over the past few years, several models of visual attention relies on two central notions

- Saliency map (Koch et Ullman): represents the behavioral relevance of the locations in the visual field
- inhibition of return (Posner): memorizes the scanned locations and inhibits them in saliency map

In general, the current models do not take into account **the eye** movements.

- → static visual input
- → covert mode of attention

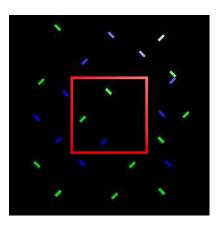
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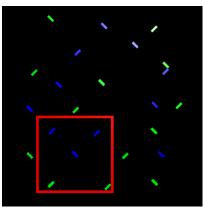
- Feature Integration Theory
  - → filters for basic features
- Two processing pathways
  - → feature information
  - $\rightarrow$  spatial information
- Two kinds of attention
  - $\rightarrow$  feature attention
  - $\rightarrow$  spatial attention
- Saliency map, inhibition of return
  - → Spatial competition among relevant locations
  - $\rightarrow$  scanned locations memorized to bias that competition
- Anticipatory update of spatial representations
  - $\rightarrow$  efferent copy of the eye movement to update the memory

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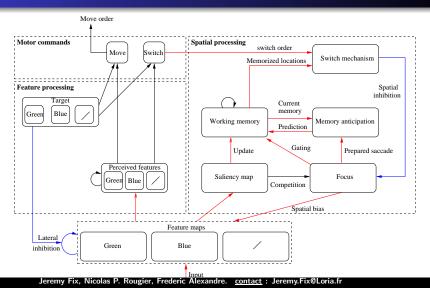
#### The model combines three computational models :

- A computational model of visual attention proposed by [Hamker, 2005]
- A computational model of working memory and dynamic switch [Vitay et Al., 2005]
- An extension of the previous model that anticipates the visual consequences of an eye movement [Fix et al., 2006]

The maps in the model consist of basic units, called neurons, whose activity satisfies (1).

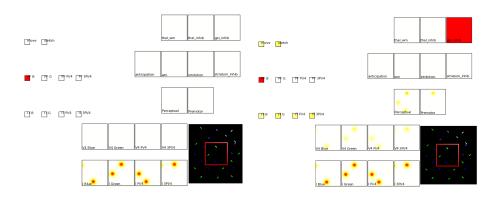
We also use Sigma Pi units in the anticipation map, whose activity satisfies (3).

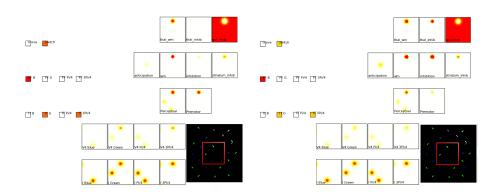

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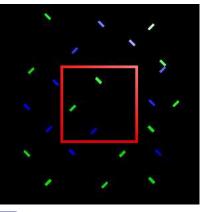
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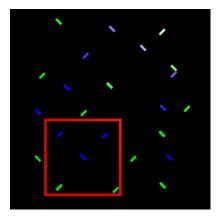
# Conclusion - Perspectives
