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Timed Automata [Alur & Dill'94]

Timed Automata = Finite Automata + timing constraints given by clocks



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A run:
$$(\ell_0, 0) \xrightarrow{0.78} (\ell_0, 0.78) \xrightarrow{a}$$

Motivation For Studying the Problems for TPNs

• Universality Problem

checking a TPN against a spec. given by a TPN $\mathcal{L}(A) \subseteq \mathcal{L}(B)$ if undecidable then Language Inclusion Problem undecidable

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e.g. every Bounded-PN is equivalent to a one-safe PN What about TPN ?

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e.g. every Bounded-PN is equivalent to a one-safe PN What about TPN ?

• TA or TPN as a specification language ? precise comparison of expressive power

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- Timed Bisimilarity: B-TPN_ε(≤,≥) (original class defined by Merlin) and TA_ε(≤,≥) are equivalent w.r.t. timed bisimilarity

Definition (Semantics of TA)

• States: $(\ell, v) \in Q = L \times (\mathbb{R}_{\geq 0})^X$

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$$(\ell, v) \in Q = L imes (\mathbb{R}_{\geq 0})^{\lambda}$$

Discrete transition: (I, v) ^a→ (I', v') iff there is a transition (I, g, a, R, I') in A s.t. {
 the guard is true in (I, v)
 v' is v with the clocks in R equal to zero
 The invariant of I' holds for v'

Timed Automata

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• Discrete transition: $(I, v) \xrightarrow{a} (I', v')$

• Time transition:
$$(I, v) \xrightarrow{t} (I', v')$$

iff $\begin{cases} I = I' \text{ and } v' = v + t: \text{ the clocks are updated} \\ The invariant of I holds for all $v + t', t' \leq t \end{cases}$$

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- semantics of a TA A is a Timed Transition System S_A

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Weakly Timed Bisimilar: allows ε -moves

- discrete step: $s \stackrel{a}{\Longrightarrow} s'$ if $s \stackrel{\varepsilon^*}{\longrightarrow} \stackrel{a}{\longrightarrow} \stackrel{\varepsilon^*}{\longrightarrow} s'$
- time step: $s \stackrel{\delta}{\Longrightarrow} s'$ if $s \stackrel{\varepsilon^*}{\longrightarrow} \stackrel{\delta_1}{\longrightarrow} \stackrel{\varepsilon^+}{\longrightarrow} \cdots \stackrel{\varepsilon^+}{\longrightarrow} \stackrel{\delta_n}{\longrightarrow} \stackrel{\varepsilon^*}{\longrightarrow} s'$ and $\sum \delta_i = \delta$

Theorem (TA are strictly more expressive than TPNs)

Definition (Timed Word & Timed Language)

A timed word over Σ is a sequence $w = (a_0, \delta_0)(a_1, \delta_1) \cdots (a_n, \delta_n) \cdots$ with $a_i \in \Sigma$; $\delta_i \in \mathbb{R}_{\geq 0}$.

A timed language is a set of timed words.

A TTS A with final and repeated states accepts a timed language $\mathcal{L}(A)$.

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Two TTS A and B are equivalent w.r.t. Timed Language Acceptance if $\mathcal{L}(A) = \mathcal{L}(B)$.

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Theorem ([C. & R., AVoCS'04])

A timed language accepted by a bounded TPN is accepted by a TA.

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Theorem

- **2** for $\mathcal{L}(\mathcal{N}) \subseteq \mathcal{L}(\mathcal{A})$: Design \mathcal{A}' s.t. $\mathcal{L}(\mathcal{A}) = \mathcal{L}(\mathcal{A}')$ and prove that \mathcal{A}' simulates \mathcal{N}

- Invariants are increasing: between two resets of a clock x, the sequence of invariants encountered from any location is of the form x ≤ c₁ and later on x ≤ c₂ with c₁ ≤ c₂ etc

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Theorem (For Timed Bisimilarity)

 $B\text{-}TPN_{\varepsilon}(\leq,\geq)$ and $TA_{\varepsilon}(\leq,\geq)$ are equally expressive.

- From TA_ε(≤, ≥) to B-TPN_ε(≤, ≥)
 Extension of the previous construction for Timed Language

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New Results for TPNs

Theorem (One is enough)

One-safe B-TPN $_{\varepsilon}$ and B-TPN $_{\varepsilon}$ are equally expressive

w.r.t. timed language acceptance.
New Results for TPNs

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The universal problem is undecidable for B-TPN $_{\varepsilon}$.

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Language Inclusion in undecidable for B-TPN $_{\varepsilon}$.

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Theorem

One-safe B-TPN_{ε}(\leq , \geq) and B-TPN_{ε}(\leq , \geq) are equally expressive w.r.t. weak timed bisimilarity.

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Timed Automata [Alur & Dill'94]

A Timed Automaton \mathcal{A} is a tuple $(L, \ell_0, \operatorname{Act}, X, \operatorname{inv}, \longrightarrow)$ where:

- *L* is a finite set of locations
- ℓ_0 is the initial location
- X is a finite set of clocks
- Act is a finite set of actions
- \longrightarrow is a set of transitions of the form $\ell \xrightarrow{g, a, R} \ell'$ with:
 - $\ell, \ell' \in L$,
 - *a* ∈ Act
 - a guard g which is a clock constraint over X
 - a reset set R which is the set of clocks to be reset to 0

Clock constraints are boolean combinations of $x \sim k$ with $x \in C$ and $k \in \mathbb{Z}$ and $\sim \in \{\leq, <\}$.

Semantics of Timed Automata

Let $\mathcal{A} = (L, \ell_0, \operatorname{Act}, X, \operatorname{inv}, \longrightarrow)$ be a Timed Automaton.

A state (ℓ, v) of \mathcal{A} is in $L \times \mathbb{R}^{X}_{\geq 0}$

The semantics of \mathcal{A} is a Timed Transition System $S_{\mathcal{A}} = (Q, q_0, \operatorname{Act} \cup \mathbb{R}_{\geq 0}, \longrightarrow)$ with:

- $Q = L \times \mathbb{R}_{>0}^X$
- $q_0 = (\ell_0, \overline{0})$
- $\bullet \longrightarrow \text{consists in:}$

discrete transition:
$$(\ell, v) \xrightarrow{a} (\ell', v') \iff \begin{cases} v \models g \\ v' = v[r \leftarrow 0] \\ v' \models inv(\ell') \end{cases}$$

delay transition: $(\ell, v) \xrightarrow{d} (\ell, v + d) \iff d \in \mathbb{R}_{\geq 0} \land v + d \models inv(\ell)$

Time Petri Nets

A Time Petri Net \mathcal{N} is a tuple $(P, T, \Sigma_{\varepsilon}, \bullet(.), (.)^{\bullet}, M_0, \Lambda, I)$ where:

- $P = \{p_1, p_2, \cdots, p_m\}$ is a finite set of places
- $T = \{t_1, t_2, \cdots, t_n\}$ is a finite set of transitions and $P \cap T = \emptyset$;
- Σ is a finite set of actions
- •(.) ∈ (ℕ^P)^T is the backward incidence mapping; (.)[•] ∈ (ℕ^P)^T is the forward incidence mapping;
- $M_0 \in \mathbb{N}^P$ is the initial marking;
- $\Lambda: \mathcal{T} \to \Sigma_{\varepsilon}$ is the labeling function;
- $I : T \to \mathcal{I}(\mathbb{Q}_{\geq 0})$ associates with each transition a firing interval;

Semantics of Time Petri Nets

Let $\mathcal{N} = (P, T, \Sigma_{\varepsilon}, \bullet(.), (.)^{\bullet}, M_0, \Lambda, I)$ be a Time Petri Net.

A state (M, ν) of \mathcal{N} is a pair with in $\mathbb{N}^{\mathcal{P}}$ and $\nu \in \mathbb{R}^{Enabled(M)}_{\geq 0}$. $ADM(\mathcal{N})$ is the set of states of \mathcal{N} .

The semantics of \mathcal{N} is a Timed Transition System $S_{\mathcal{N}} = (Q, \{q_0\}, T, \rightarrow)$:

$$Q = ADM(\mathcal{N})$$

$$q_0 = (M_0, \mathbf{0}), \ F' = \{(M, \nu) \mid \ M \in F\}$$
 and

• $\longrightarrow \in Q \times (T \cup \mathbb{R}_{\geq 0}) \times Q$ is the transition relations:

• the discrete transition relation is defined $\forall t \in T$ by:

$$(M,\nu) \xrightarrow{\Lambda(t)} (M',\nu') \text{ iff } \begin{cases} t \in \text{Enabled}(M) \land M' = M - {}^{\bullet}t + t^{\bullet} \\ \nu(t) \in I(t), \\ \forall t \in \mathbb{R}^{\text{Enabled}(M')}_{\geq 0}, \nu'(t) = \begin{cases} 0 \text{ if } \uparrow \text{enabled}(t',M,t), \\ \nu(t) \text{ otherwise.} \end{cases}$$

Semantics of Time Petri Nets

$$(M,\nu) \xrightarrow{d} (M,\nu') \text{ iff } \begin{cases} \nu' = \nu + d \\ \forall t \in \textit{Enabled}(M), \nu'(t) \in I(t)^{\downarrow} \end{cases}$$
