## Inverse EEG source problems and approximation

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## Inverse EEG (electroencephalography) Problem:

From measurements by electrodes of the electric potential $u$ on the scalp, recover a distribution of $m$ pointwise dipolar current sources $C_{k}$ with moments $p_{k}$ located in the brain (modeling the presence of epileptic foci).


Macroscopic model + quasi-static approximation of Maxwell equations $\rightarrow$ Spatial behavior of $u$ in $\Omega[1]:(P)\left\{\begin{array}{l}\operatorname{div}(\sigma \nabla u)=\sum_{k=1}^{m} p_{k} . \nabla \delta_{C_{k}} \text { in } \Omega \\ u=g \text { and } \partial_{n} u=\phi \quad \text { on } \partial \Omega\end{array}\right.$
where $g$ and $\phi$ denote the given potential and current flux on the scalp (or approximate interpolation of these quantities).

The resolution of this inverse problem can be divided into 3 main steps

## 1. Data propagation (Cortical mapping step)

Since $C_{k} \in \Omega_{0}$, the function $u$ is harmonic in the outer layers $\Omega_{1}$ and $\Omega_{2}$, where boundary conditions are given by the continuity relations

$$
[u]_{i}=\left[\sigma \partial_{n} u\right]_{i}=0 \text { on } S_{i},
$$

[ ] ${ }_{i}$ denotes the jump across the surface $S_{i}$
Based on these boundary conditions, data propagation can be achieved by using boundary element methods [2] , or by using robust harmonic approximation techniques and expansions on appropriate basis [3].

## 3. Best rational approximation on planar sections (Source localization):

- Slice $\Omega_{0}$ along a family of planes $\Pi_{p}: \Pi_{p} \cap S_{0}=\Gamma_{p}$ (circles or ellipses).
- From pointwise values of the singular part $u_{a}$ on $\Gamma_{p}$, approximate $f_{p}=\left(P_{-} u_{a}\right)^{2}$ the square of the anti-analytic projection on $\Gamma_{p}[3,5]$
Ellipses may then preliminary be mapped by a conformal rational transformation onto circles.
- $f_{p}$ is a meromorphic function, analytic outside $D_{p}=\Pi_{p} \cap \Omega_{0}$ with singularities $\zeta_{k, p}$ inside $D_{p}$ which are strongly and explicitely linked with the sources $C_{k}$
- Approximate the $\zeta_{k, p}$ by $\widetilde{\zeta}_{k, p}$ the poles of the best $L^{2}$ or $L^{\infty}$ rational approximation to $f_{p}$ on $\Gamma_{p}$ (degree $\geq m$ for a sphere, $2 m$ for an ellipsoid), the poles $\widetilde{\zeta}_{k, p}$ accumulate to the singularities $\zeta_{k, p}$, [5].
- Varying $p$, this allows us to approximately locate the $m$ sources $C_{k}$ in $\Omega_{0}$.


## Numerical results:

## Spherical model:

In this case the relation between $\zeta_{k, p}$ and $C_{k}$ when the slice $p$ varies is the following
$-\left(\zeta_{k, p}\right)$ are aligned together and also with the complex coordinates $\zeta_{k}$ of $C_{k}$
$-\left|\zeta_{k, p}\right|$ is maximum at $\zeta_{k, p}=\zeta_{k}$ (the $k^{t h}$ source's section).


1 source

3 sources


The error estimate is around $10^{-4}$ for the 1 source case and around $10^{-2}$ for the 3 sources case.
2. Anti-harmonic projection (Signal space separation):

From these data on $S_{0}$, the solution $u$ to equation $(P)$ in $\Omega_{0}$ :

$$
\begin{cases}\triangle u=\frac{1}{\sigma_{0}} \sum_{k=1}^{m} p_{k} \cdot \nabla \delta_{C_{k}} & \text { in } \Omega_{0} \\ u \text { and } \partial_{n} u & \text { given on } S_{0}\end{cases}
$$

assumes the form: $u(x)=h(x)+\sum_{k=1}^{m} \frac{\left\langle p_{k}, x-C_{k}\right\rangle}{4 \pi\left\|x-C_{k}\right\|^{3}}=h(x)+u_{a}(x), \quad h$ harmonic function in $\Omega_{0}$.
In order to recover the $C_{k}$ inside $\Omega_{0}$, the knowledge of the singular function $u_{a}$ is required on $S_{0}$. This can be deduced from available boundary data by expanding $u$ on bases of spherical or ellipsoidal harmonics [3, 4].

Illustrations (Spherical model):


2 sources
above view
The error estimate is around $10^{-2}$

## Ellipsoidal model:

In each slice $p$ we construct a real valued polynomial $q_{k, p}(\zeta)$ whose coefficients are related to the conformal rational transformation from ellipse to circle, $q_{k}, p(\zeta)$ is minimum for $\zeta=\zeta_{k}$, [3].
These numerical results represent exact sources $*$ and approximated ones $\diamond$.


1 source


The error estimate is around $10^{-4}$ for the 1 source case and around $10^{-1}$ for the 2 sources case .
