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$$\dot{x} = f(x, u), \qquad x \in \mathbb{R}^n, \qquad u \in \mathbb{R}^m$$
 (1)

f smooth with sublinear growth

$$|f(x,u)| \leq c(1+|x|) \quad \forall x,u$$

(I) Asymptotic Feedback Stabilization: Seek feedback control u = U(x) s.t. all trajectories of

$$\dot{x} = g(x) \doteq f(x, U(x)) \tag{2}$$

approach the origin as $t \to \infty$ (and the origin is Lyapunov stable).

(II) Optimal Feedback Control: Given compact set K ⊂ Rⁿ, seek feedback control u = U(x) s.t. all sol'ns of (1) reach given target set S in minimum time.

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- Smooth feedback controls that solve (I)-(II) in general may not exist
 - (I) Topological obstructions may prevent the existence of smooth (or even continuous) stabilizing feedback

Ex: Brockett's nonholonomic integrator

$$\begin{vmatrix} \dot{x}_1 = u_1 \\ \dot{x}_2 = u_2 \\ \dot{x}_3 = x_1 u_2 - x_2 u_1 \end{vmatrix} \doteq f(x, u)$$
 (x₁, x₂, u₁, u₂) \rightarrow f(x, u) not open at zero: (0,0,x₃) \notin Im(f) when $x_3 \neq 0$

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 Discontinuous stabilizing (or optimal) feedback in general are not robust w.r.t. (inner and outer) perturbations

$$\dot{x} = f(x, U(x + e_1(t))) + e_2(t)$$
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 $(e_1 : measurement error, e_2 : external disturbance)$

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Two possible approaches

in dealing with stabilization and optimization problems for

$$\dot{x}=f(x,U(x)).$$

- 1. Allow arbitrary discontinuous feedback controls u = U(x) and work with weak or generalized solutions of discontinuous ODEs.
- 2. Use a particular class of feedback controls U(x) whose discontinuities are sufficiently tame so to guarantee the existence of Carathéodory solutions

$$x(t) = \overline{x} + \int_0^t f(x(s), U(x(s))) ds$$

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How to interpret solutions to discontinuous ODEs?

Define weaker concept of solution
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$$\dot{x} \in G(x) \doteq \bigcap_{\varepsilon > 0} \overline{co} \Big\{ g(y); |y - x| < \varepsilon \Big\}, \qquad g(y) \doteq f(x, U(x)).$$
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Drawback: too many sol'ns are obtained. Not all enjoy desired properties.

Introduce suitable generalized solutions:

"Sample-and-hold-solutions" & "Euler solutions": successfully implemented for problems (I)-(II)

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S-a-h solutions & Euler solutions of $\dot{x} = f(x, U(x))$

S-a-h solution x(t) recursively defined as follows.

- 1. fix a time mesh $t_0 = 0 < t_1 < \ldots < t_i < \ldots$, with size $\delta \doteq \sup |t_{i+1} t_i|$;
- 2. sample $U(x(t_i)) \doteq u_i$ and compute $x(t) \doteq x_{i+1}(t), t \in]t_i, t_{i+1}]$ solving

$$\dot{x}_{i+1} = f(x_{i+1}, u_i), \ x_{i+1}(t_i) = x_i(t_i)$$
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Euler solution is a (uniform) limit of S-a-h solutions as size $\delta \to 0$.

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- Introduce a class of discontinuous, piecewise smooth vector fields "Patchy Vector Fields" (PVF) which admit (forward) Carathéodory solutions, and analyze their properties.
- 2. Construct piecewise smooth stabilizing or optimal feedback U = U(x) so that corresponding vector field $g(x) \doteq f(x, U(x))$ belongs to such class of PVF.
- Establish robustness properties of stabilizing or optimal feedback in this class, relative to external disturbances and internal measurement errors



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Patches

 (Ω, g) is said to be a patch if:

- $\Omega \subset \mathbb{R}^n$ is open domain with (piecewise) smooth boundary $\partial \Omega$
- g smooth vector field on a neighborhood of $\partial\Omega$, that points strictly inward at each point $x\in\partial\Omega$

$$\langle g(x), \mathbf{n}(x) \rangle < 0 \qquad \forall \ x \in \partial \Omega$$

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$$g_{i}(x) \iff x \in \Omega_{i} \setminus \bigcup_{j>i} \Omega_{j}$$

$$\Omega_{1}$$

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$$\implies g(x) = g_{i^*(x)}(x), i^*(x) \doteq \max\{i \in \mathbb{Z} : x \in \Omega_i\}$$

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$$\dot{x}=g(x)=g_{i^*(x)}(x)$$

ODEs with patchy right hand side (A. & Bressan '99)

Let g be a patchy vector field on $\Omega \subset \mathbb{R}^n$. Then the following holds.

i) For every $\overline{x} \in \Omega$

$$\begin{cases} \dot{x} = g(x) \\ x(0) = \overline{x} \end{cases}$$
 has

at least 1 (local) forward at most 1 backward

- ii) sol'ns x(t) are piecewise smooth, with derivatives having finite set of jumps on any compact time interval. The map $t \mapsto i_*(x(t))$ is piecewise constant, non-decreasing.
- Set of Carathéodory sol'ns is closed in the topology of uniform convergence.

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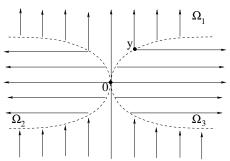
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Properties of Patchy Vector Fields ... continued

Note: in general, the set of Carathéodory solutions to a Cauchy problem is not connected, not acyclic.

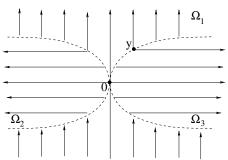
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$$\dot{y} = g(y + \mathbf{e}_1(t)) + \mathbf{e}_2(t) \tag{5}$$

Flow stability of a Patchy Vector Field (A. & Bressan 2003, 2004)

Let g be a patchy vector field on $\Omega \subset \mathbb{R}^n$. Given any compact subset $C_0 \subset \Omega$, and any $T, \varepsilon > 0$, there exists $\delta > 0$ such that the following holds.

If $v : [0, T] \mapsto \Omega$ is a solution of the perturbed system (5), with $v(0) \in C_0$, and

$$\left\| \boldsymbol{e}_{1} \right\|_{BV} \leq \delta \,, \qquad \left\| \boldsymbol{e}_{2} \right\|_{\mathsf{L}^{1}} \leq \delta \,,$$

then there exists a solution $x : [0, T] \mapsto \Omega$ of the unperturbed equation

$$\dot{x} = g(x)$$

$$|x(t) - y(t)| < \varepsilon \quad \forall \ t \in [0, T]$$

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If $y:[0,T]\mapsto\Omega$ is a solution of the perturbed system (5), with $y(0)\in C_0$, and

$$\left\| \mathbf{e}_{1} \right\|_{BV} \leq \delta \,, \qquad \qquad \left\| \mathbf{e}_{2} \right\|_{\mathsf{L}^{1}} \leq \delta \,,$$

then there exists a solution $x : [0, T] \mapsto \Omega$ of the unperturbed equation

$$\dot{x} = g(x)$$

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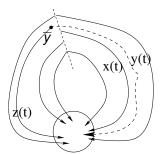
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Note: Since Cauchy problem for PVF lacks of forward uniqueness & continuous dependence, one cannot expect to have single sol'ns of PVF be stable w.r.t. perturbations.

Here we have stability property involving whole Carathéodory solution set: upper semicontinuity property of the solution set.



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$$\dot{x} = f(x, u), \qquad x \in \mathbb{R}^n, \quad u \in K \subset \mathbb{R}^m$$

A piecewise smooth map $U: \Omega \to \mathbb{R}^m$ is a patchy feedback control on open domain $\Omega \subset \mathbb{R}^n$ if:

- there exist $U_i: \Omega_i \to \mathbb{R}^m$, $i \in \mathbb{Z}$, smooth maps, with $\{\Omega_i\}_{i \in \mathbb{Z}}$ locally finite covering of Ω ;
- (Ω_i, g_i) , with

$$g_i(x) \doteq f(x, U_i(x)), \qquad x \in \Omega_i,$$

is a patch for every $i \in \mathbb{Z}$;

$$U(x) = U_i(x) \qquad \forall \ x \in \Omega_i \setminus \bigcup_{j>i} \Omega_j$$

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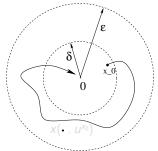
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$$\dot{x} = f(x, u), \qquad x \in \mathbb{R}^n, \qquad u \in K \subset \mathbb{R}^m$$
 (6)

Assume: (6) is globally asymptotically controllable to the origin

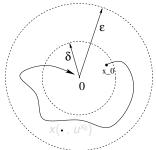
- 1. Attractiveness: $\forall x_0 \in \mathbb{R}^n \; \exists$ admissible open-loop control $u^{x_0}(t)$ s.t. the trajectory $x(\cdot, u^{x_0})$ starting at x_0 is defined $\forall t \geq 0$ and satisfies $x(t, u^{x_0}) \to 0$ as $t \to \infty$.
- 2. Lyapunov stability: $\forall \ \varepsilon > 0 \ \exists \ \delta > 0 \ \text{s.t.} \ \forall \ x_0 \in \mathbb{R}^n, \ |x_0| \le \delta,$ $\exists \ \text{admissible control} \ u^{x_0}(t) \ \text{as in 1., with} \ |x(t, u^{x_0})| \le \varepsilon, \ \forall \ t \ge 0.$



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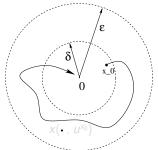
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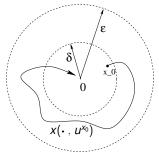
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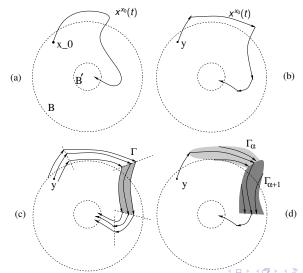
Stabilization by Patchy Feedback ... continued

Then: there exists a patchy feedback control U(x) that makes asymptotically stable the closed-loop system

$$\dot{x} = f(x, U(x)) \tag{7}$$

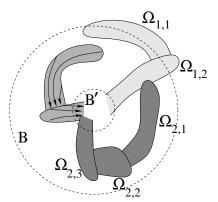
every Carathéodory solution of (7) either tends asymptotically to the origin, or reaches the origin in finite time. System enjoys (7) Lyapunov stability.

Construction of a stabilizing patchy feedback by patching together open-loop controls



Semi-global practical stabilization by a patchy feedback

Construct a patchy feedback that steers every point of a ball B inside a smaller ball $B' \subsetneq B$, within finite time.



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- f smooth with sublinear growth
- $T(y) \doteq \text{ minimum time to steer the system from } y \text{ to the origin}$

(A. & Bressan 2007; Bressan & Priuli 2008)

Given $\varepsilon > 0$, $\tau > 0$, there exists a sub-optimal patchy feedback u = U(x) defined on sub-level set

$$R_{\tau} = \{ y : T(y) \leq \tau \},$$

such that $\forall y \in R_{\tau}, |y| > \varepsilon$, any (Carathéodory) solution of

$$\dot{x} = f(x, U(x)) \qquad x(0) = y,$$

reaches the ε -ball $B_{\varepsilon} = \{|x| \leq \varepsilon\}$ within time $T(y) + \varepsilon$



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Nearly Time Optimal Patchy Feedback

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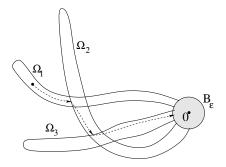
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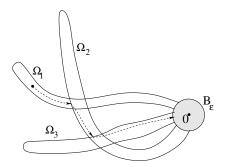


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Alternative construction: work with the value function

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Construction of Nearly Time Optimal Patchy Feedback

 Approximate the minimum time function T(·) with a semi-concave, piecewise quadratic function:

$$\widetilde{T}(x) = \min_{j=1,...,N} \left\{ a_j + \mathbf{b}_j \cdot x \right\} + M \cdot |x|^2.$$

- Set of points where \widetilde{T} not differentiable is contained in finite union of hyperplanes

$$\Gamma_{i,j} \doteq \left\{ a_i + \mathbf{b}_i \cdot x = a_j + \mathbf{b}_j \cdot x \right\}.$$

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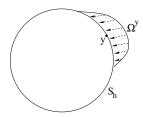
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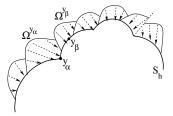
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Construction of Nearly Time Optimal Patchy Feedback ... continued

• Construct the patchy feedback by induction, progressively working on larger sub-level sets of $\widetilde{\mathcal{T}}$





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ISS Stability: robustness of stabilization in presence of large external perturbations (SONTAG 1989)

- In presence of large external disturbances, solutions remain in a ball around the origin of the same size of the L^{∞} -strength of the perturbation
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Consider affine system

$$f_0(x) + \sum_{i=1}^m u_i f_i(x)$$

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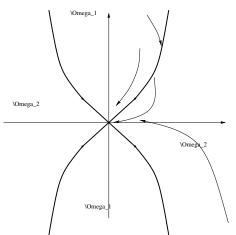
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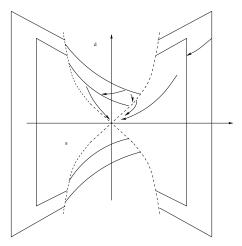
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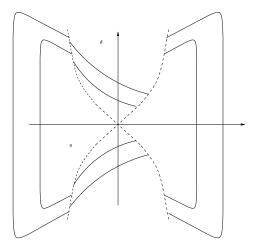
Stabilizing Patchy Feedback for Nonholonomic Integrator
