Prediction of the Inter-Observer Visual Congruency (IOVC) and Application to Image Ranking

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Problematic and context

Definition (Inter-observer visual congruency)

Inter-observer visual congruency (IOVC) reflects the visual dispersion between observers or the consistency of overt attention (eye movement) while observers watch the same visual scene.

Do observers look at the scene similarly?









Measuring the IOVC

To measure the visual dispersion, we use the method proposed by [Torralba et al., 2006]:



one-against-all approach

- IOVC = 1, strong congruency between observers.
- IOVC = 0, lowest congruency between observers.



Measuring the IOVC

Examples based on MIT eye tracking database





Measuring the IOVC

Factors impacting the visual dispersion:

Bottom-up factors (stimulus-dependent)

- Scene complexity
- Scene consistency
- Human face
- Color
- o ...

Top-down factors (observer-dependent)

- Task at hand
- Cultural difference
- Prior knowledge
- Prior experience
- ...



IOVC computational model

Global architecture of the proposed approach:



Feature extraction

6 visual features are extracted from the visual scene:

Mixture between low and high-level visual features

- Color harmony [Cohen et al., 2006]
- Scene complexity:
 - \rightarrow Entropy *E* [Rosenholtz et al., 2007]
 - \rightarrow Number of regions (Color mean shift)
 - → Amount of contours (Sobel detector)
- Faces [Lienhart & Maydt, 2002] (*Open CV*)
- Depth of Field



E = 14.67 dit/pel, NbReg = 103



E = 14.72 dit/pel, NbReg = 72

Feature extraction

Depth of Field computation inspired by [Luo et al., 2008]:

The horizontal/vertical derivatives histogram is modified after a blurring operation

I the input picture and f_k the blurring kernel of size $k \times k$ ($k = \{3, 5, 7\}$).

• The vertical and horizontal derivatives are given by:

$$p_{xk} \quad \alpha \quad hist(I * f_k * d_x)$$
$$p_{yk} \quad \alpha \quad hist(I * f_k * d_y)$$

where $d_x = \begin{bmatrix} 1 & -1 \end{bmatrix}$ and $d_y = \begin{bmatrix} 1 & -1 \end{bmatrix}^T$. **2** For a pixel (i, j) and for a kernel k,

$$D_k(i,j) = \sum_{(n,m) \in W_{ij}} KL(p_{xk}|p_{x1})(n,m) + KL(p_{yk}|p_{y1})(n,m)$$

The DoF value is finally computed as follows:

$$DoF = \sum_{(i,j)\in I} \sum_{k} D_k(i,j)$$



Feature extraction

Depth of Field computation inspired by [Luo et al., 2008]:

(b) DoF=0.12



After the learning, we can now predict:



Predicted IOVC:



IOVC=0.96



IOVC=0.52



IOVC=0.94 IOVC=0



IOVC=0.82

Conclusion





Two tracking databases are used to evaluate the performance:

- MIT's dababase (1003 pictures, 15 observers)
- Le Meur's database (27 pictures, up to 40 observers)

We compute the Pearson correlation coefficient between predicted IOVC and 'true' IOVC:

- MIT's dababase:
 r(2004) = 0.34, p < 0.001
- Le Meur's database:
 r(54) = 0.24, p < 0.17

Goal: to sort out a collection of pictures in function of IOVC scores.



Application to image ranking

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Application to image ranking

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 can be combined with other factors to evaluate the interestingness or attractivness of visual scenes.



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- Performance
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Contributions:

- Main contribution: A new approach to evaluate the visual dispersion between observers
 - \rightarrow based on low-level visual features
 - ightarrow it outperforms the visual clutter approach [Rosenholtz et al., 2007]
- Side contributions:
 - $\rightarrow\,$ A new method to estimate the DoF
 - \rightarrow IOVC-based image ranking

A number of tracks for the future:


- Time-dependent IOVC
