Instantaneous dense motion field over a 3D surface

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Instantaneous dense motion field over a 3D surface

Motivations: Strong Low-level information for

- Tracking, segmentation
- Gesture recognition, real-time interactions

Available data:

Expected Output

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N image streams

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- ► 3D surface stream (independent in time)

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Expected Output

Instantaneous dense motion field at each point of the surface



Context

Dense Motion Recovery: Strategies

Monocular case strategy: Optical Flow [Horn & Shunch], [Lukas-Kanade], ...

- \implies Image intensity variations + Smoothing constraint
- \implies Usually no prior on the observed scene

Multiocular case strategy: Scene flow [Vedula 2001]

[Vedula 2005]

Multiple optical flow merging

 \Longrightarrow Regularization is performed in the image space

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 \Longrightarrow Limited to small motions

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[Huguet 2007] and [Li 2008] and [Rabe 2010]

Stereovision + Flow estimation

 \Longrightarrow Limited to the binocular case

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Variational approach: shape + scene flow approximation

 \implies Non-linear framework

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Variational approach: shape + scene flow approximation

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Shape Matching or Tracking

Scene Flow provided as a by-product

 \implies Assumption on the scene observed

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Dense Motion Recovery: Strategies

Our strategy:

Exploit surface information, mesh processing tools

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Our contribution:

A linear framework:

that combines

visual constraints surface deformation constraints

► that allows:

for coarse to fine refinement

to recover large motion as well as motion details

Visual cues constraints: **Regularization constraints:**

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Dense normal flow

By pixel Only for small motion Not enough constraint



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Sparse temporal feature matching

On the image or the surface Handle Large motion Still not enough constraint

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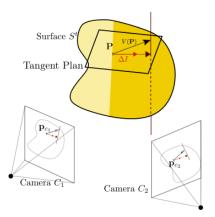
Regularization constraints:

Smoothness of the motion field



Visual Cues : Normal Flow

Flow hypothesis:



► 2D **dense** constraints:

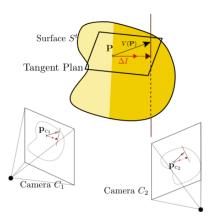
One constraint by visible point by camera

$$\nabla I_c^t \cdot v_c^t + \frac{\mathrm{d}I_c^t}{\mathrm{d}t} = 0$$

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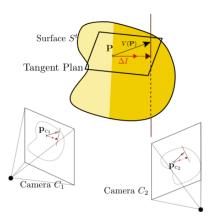

Constraints

Visual Cues : Normal Flow

Flow hypothesis:



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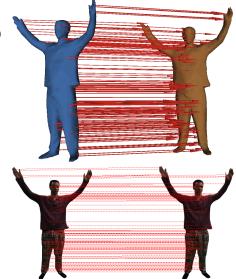
- Aperture problem even in 3D [Vedula 2005]
 - ⇒ Need some sort of regularization
- ⇒ Only small displacement estimation

$$\nabla I_c^t \cdot v_c^t + \frac{\mathrm{d}I_c^t}{\mathrm{d}t} = 0$$

Visual cues: Feature points

Sparse constraints: 2D and 3D Feature points

- Detection
- Description
- Correspondence matching in time.
 - $\implies \text{Large displacement} \\ estimation$



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- Global: Horn & Schunck
 - \implies Smoothness hypothesis **usually not satisfied** in 2D
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2D Strategy

Global: Horn & Schunck

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Local: Lucas-Kanade

3D Strategy

- Smoothness on the surface is global
- Extension of Horn & Schunck to 3D

 \implies Smoothness hypothesis **usually satisfied** in 3D

Analogy with standard mesh deformation

Both look for the best displacement field that satisfies all the constraints. But constraints are different.

Standard mesh deformation:

Constraints:

- Anchors
- User displacement inputs

Regularization:

- "As-Rigid-As-Possible" [Sorkine 2005]
- \Longrightarrow Laplacian framework

Surface flow:

Constraints:

- Dense normal flow constraints
- Sparse 2D and 3D feature points

Regularization:

- Smoothness term
- \implies Laplacian framework

Resolution

Optimization

$$\underset{V}{\operatorname{arg\,min}} \left[\lambda_{\mathit{fe}}^{2} \mathbf{E}_{\mathit{Features}} + \lambda_{\mathit{fl}}^{2} \mathbf{E}_{\mathit{Flow}} + \lambda_{\mathit{s}}^{2} \mathbf{E}_{\mathit{Smooth}} \right]$$

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Data term differentiation yields:

 $\mathbf{A}\mathbf{V}^t + \mathbf{b} = \mathbf{0}$

Smoothness term differentiation yields:

 $\mathbf{L}\mathbf{V}^t = \mathbf{0}$

with **L** the Laplacian matrix (mesh connectivity matrix).

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Final linear system of equation:

$$\begin{bmatrix} \mathbf{L} \\ \mathbf{A} \end{bmatrix} \mathbf{V}^t + \begin{bmatrix} \mathbf{0} \\ \mathbf{b} \end{bmatrix} = \mathbf{0}$$

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⇒ Highly **sparse linear** system

Implementation

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Iterative strategy : 2 successive minimizations

- 1 Constraints given by the 2D and 3D feature points
- 2 First minimization and creation of a **flowed** surface S'
- 3 Back-projection of S' onto the images
- 4 Normal flow computation
- 5 Second minimization (feature points = anchors)

- Comparison
- Qualitative : Real data

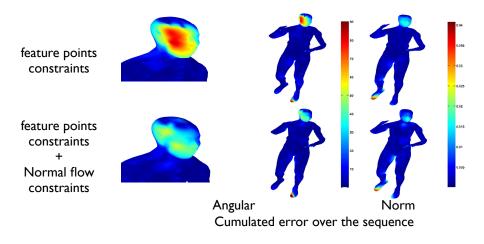

on synthetic data for quantitative evaluation

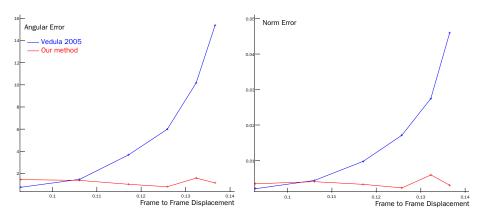
10 video streams

Error measure in orientation (degrees) and amplitude between ground truth and estimated displacements.

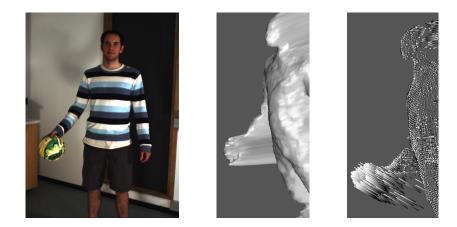

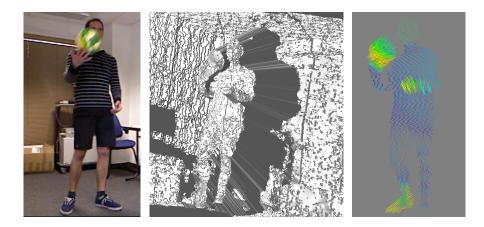
Extension to Point Clouds

Conclusion

Contribution:

- Unified framework for dense flow estimation on a surface
- ► Linear formulation ⇒ Efficient and fast
- Handle both large and small displacements

Limitation:

Good texture information required

Perspectives:

- Real-time implementation
- Multi-scale approach for a better normal flow integration
