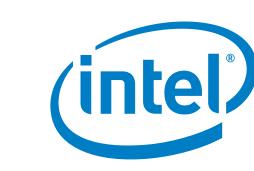
Highlighting the Influence of Artifact Signals on the Equilibrium State of the Feedback Structure

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INTRODUCTION

This work aims at providing useful relations and a new vision based on experimental observations for further analyzing the convergence and steady-state properties of the adaptive noise cancelling feedback scheme in the presence of crosstalk.

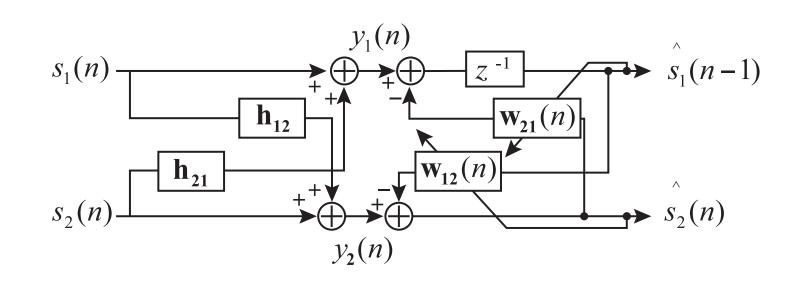


Fig. 1: Adaptive feedback structure

Our approach relies on the analysis of the relationships between the useful signals $s_i(n)$ and their artifacts $\Delta s_i(n)$ at the system outputs. Then, based on energy conservation arguments [1], we define the equilibrium point observed experimentally.

RELEVANCE OF THE PROBLEM

Inherent cross-coupling of the feedback structure

- introduces an IIR filter which can lead to potential instability
- leads to closed-form expressions for learning curves that are difficult to exploit [2]
- brings an Hessian matrix that is time-varying even if the input signals are stationary
- renders the independence theory almost void, see the following analysis

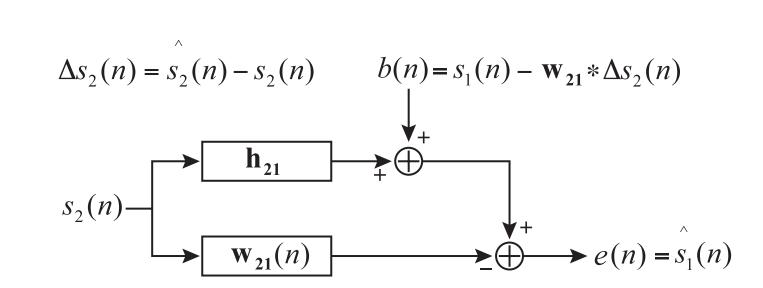


Fig. 2: Equivalent adaptive plant identification of $oldsymbol{h}_2$

According to the equivalent adaptive plant identification of **Fig. 2**, we see that in contrast with [3]

- 1. the sequences $\{s_2(n)\}$ and $\{b(n)\}$ are mutually dependent
- 2. the noise sequence b(n) depends on $\mathbf{w}_{21}(n)$ and is not stationary

ARTIFACT ANALYSIS ON THE OUTPUT SIGNAL

According to the mixing and separation models of **Fig.1**, the artifact signals $\Delta s_1(n)$ on $s_1(n)$ can be formulated as

$$\Delta s_1(n) = y_1(n) - \mathbf{w}_{21}^T(n) \mathbf{s}_2(n) - s_1(n)$$

$$= \mathbf{h}_{21}^T(n) \mathbf{s}_2(n) - \mathbf{w}_{21}^T(n) \mathbf{y}_2(n) + \mathbf{w}_{21}^T(n) diag \left\{ \mathbf{W}_{12}^T(n) \mathbf{S}_1(n-1) \right\}$$

Where diag operator denotes diagonal elements of matrix and

$$\mathbf{S}_{1}(n-1) = \begin{bmatrix} \hat{\mathbf{s}}_{1}(n-1) \hat{\mathbf{s}}_{1}(n-2) \dots \hat{\mathbf{s}}_{1}(n-L) \end{bmatrix}$$

$$\mathbf{W}_{12}(n) = \begin{bmatrix} \mathbf{w}_{12}(n) \mathbf{w}_{12}(n-1) \dots \mathbf{w}_{12}(n-L+1) \end{bmatrix}$$

Assumptions:

- 1. $\mathbf{w}_{12}(n-j) = \mathbf{w}_{12}(n) \ \forall \ j=0,...,L-1 \Rightarrow$ slowly time varying
- 2. $h_{12}(0) = 0 \Rightarrow$ causality constraint that is a stability condition

Definitions:

- $\Delta \mathbf{h}_{21}(n) = \mathbf{h}_{21} \mathbf{w}_{21}(n) \Rightarrow \text{ weight deviation vector}$
- X ⇒ truncated version of X
- $\Delta S_1(n) = S_1(n) S_1(n) \Rightarrow \text{ artifacts matrix}$

Thus, expressions of artifact signals on each estimated signal are:

$$\Delta s_1(n) = \Delta \mathbf{h}_{21}^T(n) \mathbf{s}_2(n) - \mathbf{w}_{21}^T(n) \left[\mathbf{\tilde{S}}_1(n-1) \Delta \mathbf{\tilde{h}}_{12}(n) + \Delta \mathbf{S}_1^T(n-1) \mathbf{w}_{12}(n) \right]$$

and

$$\Delta s_{2}(n) = \Delta \mathbf{h}_{12}^{T}(n-1)\mathbf{s}_{1}(n-1) - \mathbf{w}_{12}^{T}(n) \left[\mathbf{S}_{2}^{T}(n-1)\Delta \mathbf{h}_{21}(n-1) - \Delta \mathbf{S}_{2}^{T}(n-1)\mathbf{w}_{21}(n-1) \right]$$

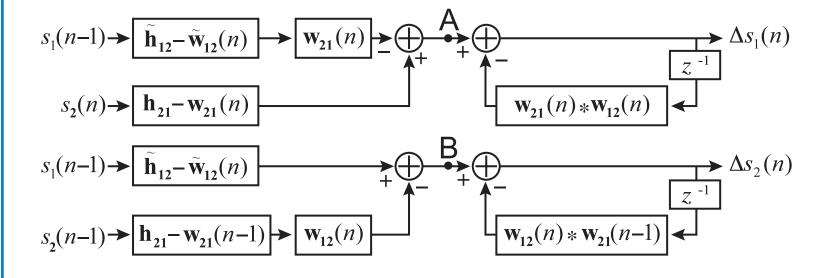


Fig. 3: Global network for getting the artifact signals on each channel

EQUILIBRIUM STATE

Let us assume that the equilibrium state of the feedback structure given in **Fig.1** is obtained when the energy of the artifacts on the output signal is the same on each channel:

$$E(\Delta s_1^2(n)) = E(\Delta s_2^2(n))$$

By considering that the filters are slowly time varying, i.e. $\mathbf{w}_{21}(n) * \mathbf{w}_{12}(n) = \mathbf{w}_{12}(n) * \mathbf{w}_{21}(n-1)$ equal output artifact energies ensure identical correlation properties (**) of the signals present at points A and B (see **Fig.3**).

Assumptions:

1. (**) is equivalent to the equality of the power spectral densities (not universally correct):

$$\Theta_{AA}(e^{j\omega}) = \Theta_{BB}(e^{j\omega}) \Rightarrow \text{Equality principle}$$

2. $s_1(n)$ and $s_2(n)$ are independent and stationary random variables with zero mean and variance $\sigma_{s_1}^2$ and $\sigma_{s_2}^2$ respectively

Applying the usual spectral analysis of time-invariant system for some fixed $W_{12}(z)$ and $W_{21}(z)$ on the artifact signals leads to the following equilibrium relationship:

$$\frac{\left|\Delta \tilde{H}_{12}(e^{j\omega})\right|^{2}}{\left|\Delta H_{21}(e^{j\omega})\right|^{2}} = \frac{\Theta_{S_{2}S_{2}}(e^{j\omega})}{\Theta_{S_{1}S_{1}}(e^{j\omega})} \cdot \frac{\left|W_{12}(e^{j\omega})\right|^{2} - 1}{\left|W_{21}(e^{j\omega})\right|^{2} - 1}$$

Let us define the signal to artifact ratio (SAR) as:

$$rac{\Theta_{S_iS_i}(e^{j\omega})}{\Theta_{\Lambda S_i\Lambda S_i}(e^{j\omega})}$$

$$SAR_{1}(e^{j\omega}) = \Theta_{S_{1}S_{1}}(e^{j\omega}) \cdot \frac{\left|1 - W_{12}(e^{j\omega})W_{21}(e^{j\omega})e^{-j\omega}\right|^{2}}{\Theta_{AA}(e^{j\omega})}$$

$$SAR_{2}(e^{j\omega}) = \Theta_{S_{2}S_{2}}(e^{j\omega}) \cdot \frac{\left|1 - W_{12}(e^{j\omega})W_{21}(e^{j\omega})e^{-j\omega}\right|^{2}}{\Theta_{BB}(e^{j\omega})}$$

According to the stated equality principle, we get:

$$\frac{SAR_1(e^{j\omega})}{SAR_2(e^{j\omega})} = \frac{\Theta_{S_1S_1}(e^{j\omega})}{\Theta_{S_2S_2}(e^{j\omega})}$$

This important relation describes the behavior of the feedback structure and defines its equilibrium point.

RESULTS WITH SYNTHETIC SIGNALS

Let us define the frequency average SAR noted SAR^{fb} and given by

$$SAR_i^{fb} = \int_{-\pi}^{\pi} SAR_i(e^{j\omega})d\omega$$

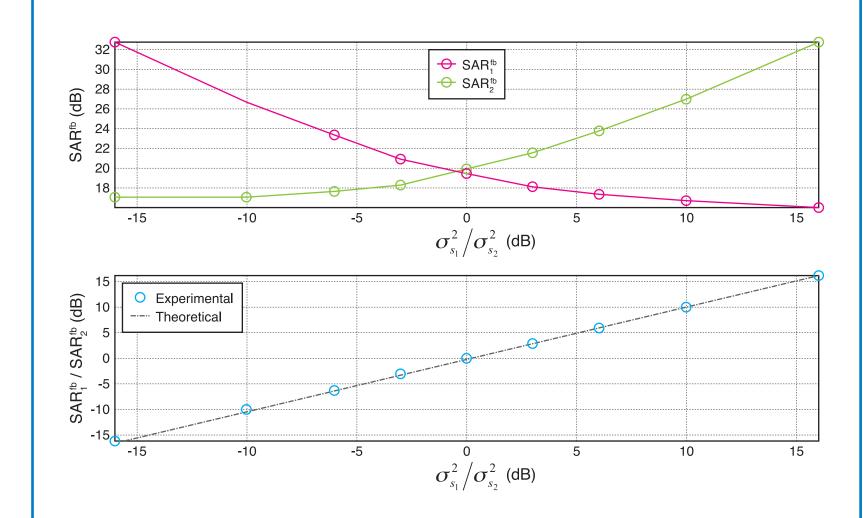


Fig. 4: Frequency average SAR obtained for two white Gaussian noises

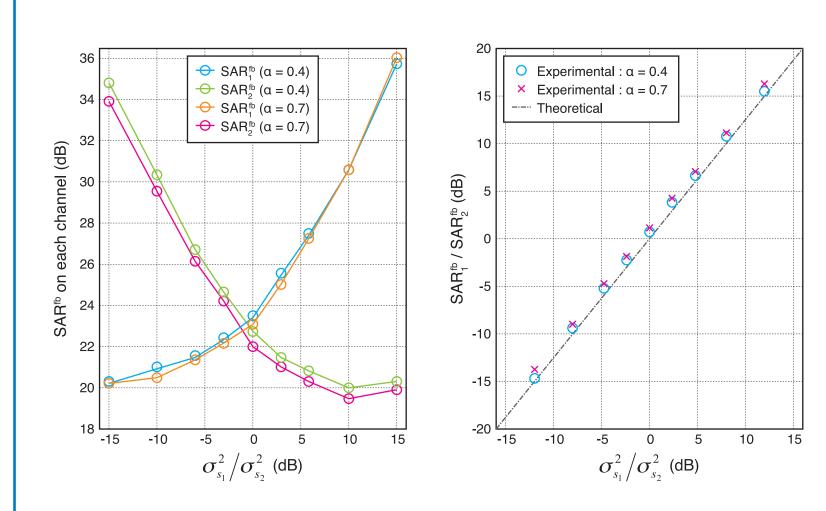


Fig. 5: Frequency average SAR obtained for AR(1) signals with pole $\alpha = 0.4$ and $\alpha = 0.7$

The full-band SAR values obtained during the steady-state convergence phase for different configurations of the input sources power ratio $\sigma_{s_1}^2/\sigma_{s_2}^2$ are plotted in **Fig.4** and **Fig.5**.

• In all considered cases, the ratio between the experimental $SAR^{f\,b}$ of each channel is equal to $\sigma_{s_1}^2/\sigma_{s_2}^2$

The two adaptive filters of the feedback structure adjust their time-varying impulse responses according to the following rule: the energies of the artifact signals on each output are equal.





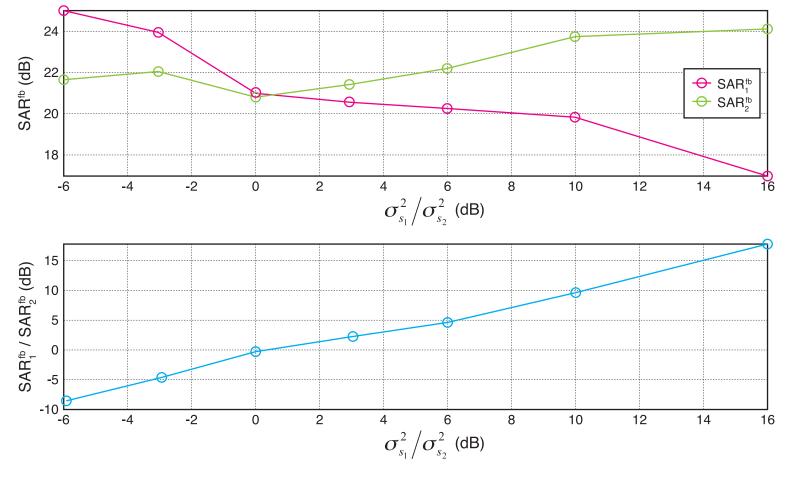


Fig. 6: Frequency average SAR obtained for two speech sources

 The proposed equilibrium state seems to be consistent even with speech signals.

CONCLUSIONS

Based on the analysis of the relationship between output signals and their artifacts, we bring up the following contributions:

- 1. new relations for further analyzing the convergence and steady-state properties of the feedback structure
- 2. equilibrium state of the adaptive feedback structure obtained when the energy of the artifacts on the output is the same on each channel

More accurate theoretical description is needed to discuss uniqueness of this equilibrium point
